


Use the **three-bars** menu and choose **Help>>About Firefox**".





You can also choose “options” and then scroll down to see the Firefox updates section;





Chrome


Mac computer

Firefox

On a mac, click on the “**Firefox**” menu at the top and choose “**About Firefox**”




A new window will open. Just opening this window will initiate any updates that are needed or it will state that it's already up to date. If an update is needed, after installing, it may ask you to restart the browser.



If you have not updated the browser in a while, you can go to [firefox.com](https://www.firefox.com) and download the latest version. When it installs it will ask you what to do with the previous version and you can tell it to “**Replace**”. After installation, open the browser and check again to confirm that it is up to date.

Google Chrome

Similar to Firefox, go to the **Chrome** menu at the top and choose “**About Google Chrome**”

This will show you that version and the status. If it is not up to date it will automatically start downloading the newest version to update Chrome and may ask you to restart the browser to apply the update.
