Abstract is written in italics in English within 150-250 words. Purpose, in simple words tell readers about the aim of this research. Research methods, give name, brand, type of tools, methods, software, review, and survey that have been used to do this research. Results and discussion, write only main results and discussion in few words. A summary of your key findings. An explanation of why your findings and key message contributes to the field/s. No formula needed and avoid quotes and extensive references.

Keywords: it contains 3- 5 important words that are taken from the title and the content of the paper

INTRODUCTION

The writer has to state the broad theme or topic of the study. Provide a convincing answer to the question: Why is this article important. Summaries the available literature and cites the most important previous studies. Indicate the most important gaps in the literature that the current study will address. Reviews the existing literature also shows what gap this paper fills. Outline the competing theories and show the gap in the research that you fill or how your paper advances theories of a specific issue. State research problem, objectives, context, and units of analysis. Provide an outline of the structure of the rest of the article. The maximum number of words in the article is 5000-7000 words. It does not include references.

METHODOLOGY

Present the materials, methods, survey, questionnaire etc. used for the study. Author should explain whether this study is experimental, or review study, or simulation based or survey based. Discuss software, hardware's used during study with their brand names. Mention all research conditions, assumptions, theories followed. This section should be easy enough for any reader to repeat the study under similar conditions.

RESULT AND DISCUSSION

It contains the results and analysis done with an emphasis on the answer to the problems. Results can include images, charts, tables, etc. are placed in the middle of the page, and described in the paper.

Tables and figures

The table follows the text. All tables should explain in the text. Prepare the Table with three horizontal line forms without vertical lines (see Table 1). The numbering of the table starts from 1 and the caption is self-explain. All abbreviations should be clarified. A Table should provide in one page.

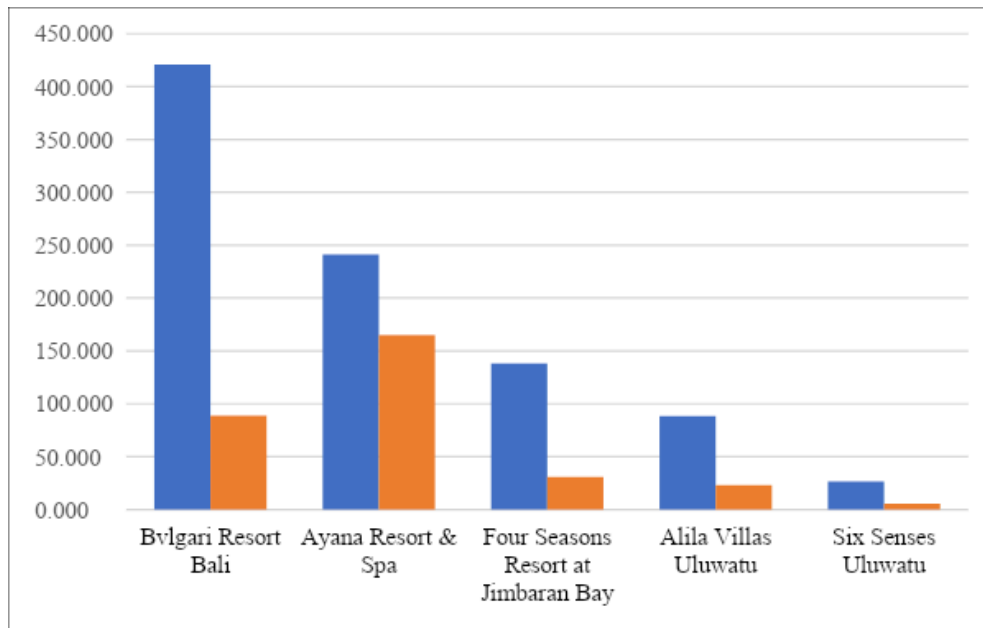

Do not separate references, put them all together under list of references.
