





Congratulations to our school winners! You all did an amazing job each week, especially in the district competition the week before vacation.



Randolph Public Schools is excited to announce that we have been awarded the




Investigating History grant from the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE). This grant will directly support our social studies instruction in grades 5 through 7.

This month at the JFK School has been filled with engaging learning experiences, hands-on activities, and exciting community partnerships that have enriched our students' education. Here are some highlights from our school.

🎨 Art Night Extravaganza

Our annual Art Night was a resounding success! Students immersed themselves in a variety of arts and crafts activities, showcasing their creativity and artistic talents. The evening was filled with color, imagination, and joy as families joined in to celebrate the artistic expressions of our young learners.



Booster Fun Run

We held our annual Booster Fun Run, a high-energy event that combines fitness, character education, and fundraising. Students enthusiastically ran an average of 30-35 laps around the Boosterthon Speedway, cheered on by teachers and families. This event not only promotes physical activity but also instills valuable leadership and character principles in our students. Our school raised over \$12,000, which helps our school have more enriching activities.

5th Grade Field Trip to Mass Audubon

Our 5th graders embarked on an educational field trip to a Mass Audubon Sanctuary, where they explored local ecosystems and wildlife. Guided by Teacher Naturalists, students engaged in hands-on activities, learning about the adaptations and interactions of Massachusetts wildlife. This immersive experience deepened their understanding of environmental science and fostered a greater appreciation for nature.

MCAS Assessments

Students in grades 3-5 have completed the English Language Arts (ELA) portion of the MCAS assessments. Additionally, our 5th graders have finished the Science section. We are proud of their hard work and dedication. The Mathematics assessments are scheduled for next week, and we encourage students to continue preparing diligently.

Waste Warrior Project

Our 4th graders participated in the "Be a Waste Warrior" project in the cafeteria, learning about food waste reduction and sustainability. This initiative, part of Randolph Food Services' Discovery Kitchen program,



empowers students to combat food waste both at school and at home. Through nutrition education, students explored food sustainability concepts and sampled plant-forward recipes, promoting healthier and more environmentally friendly eating habits.

We are incredibly proud of our students' accomplishments and the enriching experiences they've had this month. Thank you for your continued support in making the JFK School a place of learning, growth, and community.

North Randolph School (North Randolph)

Mass Audubon Field Trip: Our fifth graders took the opportunity to get outside and explore nature with a trip to the Museum of American Bird Art in Canton.



Our visit provided insight into New England habitats and native species and the rich natural history we have right next door. Science lessons enhanced students' connections to the environment. The weather was a little tricky, but a little sleet never hurt anybody.



Students investigated which type of soil is the best at filtering runoff with a hands-on experiment. They tested the water for pollution, and looked up close at indicator species like frogs and dragonflies. They also discussed the similarities and differences of late season foliage. Afterwards, they drew images of leaves they collected, mixed them up, and challenged each other to match the leaves to the drawing. They had amazing powers of observation!






After collecting water samples from a vernal pool, they even did a little shrimp fishing.



First grade ML students





Waste Warrior Project in Gr 4

On April 8th, students at North Randolph Elementary School got creative by transforming repurposed milk cartons into basil planters. During the activity, they learned about the importance of growing their own food and how simple actions, like reusing materials, can help reduce food waste. After planting, students had the opportunity to sample a pesto penne dish. While many were initially hesitant, most gave it a try and shared positive feedback.

Before returning to their classrooms, each student received a basil plant care tips and recipe card to continue the fun at home!



Young Elementary School (Young School)

Although shortened by a break April was a busy month here at the Young School. Students worked and continue to work hard on MCAS testing. We had a visit from some beekeepers. Students completed many projects and end of the year planning is in full swing. We had a lovely book fair and ice cream social and loved seeing so many of our friends playing together in the early evening.





Second grade students studied the art of beekeeping, which is so vital to ensuring a steady food supply and healthy environment. We were very fortunate to have a local beekeeper come to classes and demonstrate the equipment needed to be a successful beekeeper. Students were able to ask questions and touch the equipment. Curiosity was piqued and we may have some budding beekeepers in our midst.



Our third grade students held their annual Frog Fest early in April. Students worked in teams to research a wide variety of frog species. They created projects with colorful displays, scientific facts, creative



writing and 3D models to share their knowledge about their frog with families and fellow students. Parents came to visit and learn about frogs and other classes stopped in as well. Frog Fest was a wonderful celebration of learning for our third grade scholars.

We held another amazing family event in conjunction with our Fabulous PTO. We partnered with a local book vendor to hold a spring book fair and social event. While people perused and purchased books, they were treated to ice cream and snacks and played on our playground. Bubbles, sidewalk chalk, and other items were available for students and many children enjoyed the playground. We are thankful for such a supportive community here at the Young School.



Randolph Community Middle School (RCMS)

Our leaders met with State Representative Bruce Ayers who was amazing with them. While our leaders were invested in educating about what they are seeing in their communities around vaping, they found a way to introduce the topics for their student-led civics project. The main theme of the program was to promote the understanding of unique cultural and ethnic heritage. Silk Routes Economy Game

For this adapted Investigating History Lesson, students were tasked with exploring and evaluating the different goods and ideas that traveled along the ancient Silk Routes throughout Asia, Africa, and Europe. Before our culminating activity the following day, both Mr. Goodman and Mr. R-C's classes met each period to play the "Economy Game".





In this activity, students are asked to reflect on the experiences, challenges, and benefits of Silk Route trade by engaging in a simulation where they created trade routes between themselves, other students, and designated "markets". The students then engaged in a multi-class reflection where they shared their findings from the activity.



Silk Routes Interactive Exhibit

Over the course of a week, Mr. Goodman and Mr. R-C's classes researched and synthesized information from multiple sources to create historically-based characters in an Interactive Exhibit. Students built upon their learning from class, as well as their participation in the




"economy game" to help them choose roles and embody different historical people that may have traveled on the ancient Silk Routes. The classrooms were set up to reflect different "Oasis Towns" where a variety of travelers, traders, and officials would have traveled and exchanged goods and ideas. The students "played" these characters using historical empathy to show what they had learned about the experiences of ancient people groups.



Polynesian "Wa'a" Des



Students in Mr. Goodman and Mr. R-C's Social Studies classes also got an opportunity to apply what they learned about indigenous science through the Polynesian cultural practices of "wayfinding" and voyaging canoe design. In Unit 4, the students learned how we can use native sustainability and cultural practices to better inform our present relationship with each other and the environment. We put this into practice by designing and building our own Polynesian "wa'a", or voyaging canoes, and then testing them out to see what challenges ancient mariners would have faced crossing the pacific ocean without modern technology!





Our **Math & Financial Literacy Community Night** was such a success. The student presentations were outstanding, showcasing their knowledge, confidence, and enthusiasm. It was clear that their hard work throughout the year paid off in the depth of their discussions. 



Global Accessibility Awareness Day's purpose is to get everyone talking, thinking and learning about digital access and inclusion, and people with disabilities/impairments.

Common Disabilities/Impairments



Visual

People who are blind need alternative text descriptions for meaningful images and use the keyboard and not a mouse to interact with interactive elements.



Hearing

People who are deaf or hard of hearing will need captioning for video presentations and visual indicators in place of audio cues.



Motor

People with motor impairments may need alternative keyboards, eye control or some other adaptive hardware to help them type and navigate on their devices.



Cognitive

An uncluttered screen, consistent navigation and the use of plain language would be useful for people with different learning disabilities/impairments.


