The **Overview of Findings** is a **brief, high-level synthesis** of the results you present later in Chapter 4. It is *not* interpretation, discussion, or recommendations—those belong in Chapter 5.

Think of this section as a **map** that orients the reader before they read the detailed results.

🎯 Purpose of the Overview of Findings

Your Overview of Findings should:

- ✓ Summarize the main results by research question
- ✓ Highlight the patterns, trends, or major differences revealed in your data
- ✓ Provide a non-interpretive, factual summary
- ✓ Serve as a bridge from methods to detailed results
- ✓ Follow the same structure as your RQs for alignment

It should **NOT**:

- ✗ Interpret meaning
- ✗ Explain why findings occurred
- ✗ Connect to literature
- ✗ Provide recommendations
- ✗ Introduce new data

Those belong in **Chapter 5**.

Recommended Structure

A strong Overview of Findings includes 4 parts:

1. Restate the Purpose of the Study

1–2 short sentences reminding the reader what the study aimed to investigate.

Example:

The purpose of this applied research project was to examine whether instructional coaching improved reading comprehension outcomes for 5th-grade students and to explore teachers' perceptions of the coaching model.

2. Restate Your Research Questions

List them exactly as they appear in Chapter 1 and 3.

This reinforces alignment and sets the stage for the summary that follows.

3. Provide a High-Level Summary of Findings for Each Research Question

For each research question, give **2–4 sentences** summarizing what the data showed—**only what, not why**.

Template:

Research Question 1: *To what extent did X change as a result of Y?*

Summary of Findings: The analysis showed that [...]. Data from [...], [...], and [...] consistently indicated [...]. Overall, results demonstrate [...].

Example:

Research Question 1: *What impact did the coaching model have on student reading comprehension scores?*

Summary of Findings: Analysis of pre- and post-assessment data showed an average gain of 12.4 percentage points across participating classrooms. All teachers demonstrated improvement, although the magnitude varied. Overall, results indicate that the coaching model was associated with increased reading comprehension scores.

Repeat for each RQ.

4. Conclude With a Cross-Cutting Synthesis (Optional but Strong)

A 1–2 sentence paragraph that identifies overarching patterns.

Example:

Across all data sources, a consistent trend emerged: classrooms receiving structured coaching showed measurable improvement in student outcomes, and teachers reported greater confidence in implementing targeted instructional strategies.

What Makes an Overview of Findings “High Quality”?

A strong section:

- ✓ Is concise (1–3 pages)
- ✓ Mirrors the structure of the RQs
- ✓ Provides clear alignment between RQs and data
- ✓ Uses only factual statements, not interpretation
- ✓ Prioritizes clarity over detail

A weak section:

- ✗ Reads like a full discussion (too much interpretation)
 - ✗ introduces new findings not in the results
 - ✗ Is disorganized or not aligned to RQs
 - ✗ Repeats raw numbers without synthesis
