

# In Memoriam Robert E. Melican



Robert E. Melican, inducted into the Algonquin Regional Athletic Hall of fame on November 24, 2007, passed away on Wednesday, October 28, 2009. First hired in the Northborough school system in 1969 as a teacher in the Peaslee School, he was appointed as the superintendent of schools for the Northborough-Southborough Regional District in 1996. During his tenure, he encouraged and promoted the expansion of the Algonquin athletic programs (boys' and girls' lacrosse, co-ed swimming, alpine skiing, boys' volleyball and girls' ice hockey particularly.) Mr. Melican said at the time of his induction-in a written statement-that he always believed that one of my main responsibilities was not only to provide for the academic challenges of our students, but also to provide... many sporting opportunities for the young adults of our two towns."

Moreover, Mr. Melican oversaw several successful building projects. His open and progressive management style promoted innovative curriculum initiatives as well as consensus-building strategic planning. In 2002, the Northborough middle school was re-named in his honor; the Robert E. Melican Middle School. In 2004 he was named superintendent of the year. That same year, Worcester State College conferred its Distinguished Alumni Award upon him for his educational contribution to the greater Worcester community.

In his personal statement in the 2007 Hall of Fame booklet, Mr. Melican said he was honored to be inducted into such a "prestigious group" and ended his remarks by saying that "the coaches, student-athletes, and athletic directors that I have worked with over those years have never let me down." That may have been true, but the same could be said about him. He never let them down. He loved watching the teams play whenever he could and took a personal interest in the athletes and the coaches. It is he who is deserving of thanks.



## **Dennis Wrenn**

Dennis F. Wrenn, the chairman of the fine and performing arts department and director of the school's bands, orchestras, and small ensembles for the past 28 years, passed away February 20, 2009 in Athens, Greece. He was there with his award-winning Algonquin jazz band. Mr. Wren's jazz groups performed many times at the Hall of Fame induction ceremonies. His marching bands performed at the school's football games and in community parades.

Additionally, Mr. Wrenn was an avid fan of Algonquin's sports-as well as those of his own children (and their other activities-dance, music, and the arts). Moreover, he was a fine athlete himself-playing well into his adult years whenever he could. Furthermore, he was a dedicated fan of the Boston Bruins and a seasons' ticket holder for over twenty years. Mr. Wrenn was a positive personality—tireless as an educator and a performer himself in local communities, winning many awards for his directorial duties. He loved Algonquin and the students he served.

# Mark Fidrych

## **Accomplishments**

- Major League baseball player, rookie of the year in 1976, Detroit Tigers
- Starting pitcher for the American league in the 1976 All-Star game; 1977 All-Star
- Finished second to Jim Palmer of the Baltimore Orioles (and a member of baseball's Hall of Fame) in 1976 in CY Young Award voting for the best American League pitcher
- Earned run average of 2.34 led the league in 1976
- Competed 24 games for the Tigers that year with six shutouts (fifth in the Majors in 1976)
- On the cover of <u>Sports Illustrated</u> twice, 1977 and 1978
- On the cover of the <u>New York Times Magazine</u> as well as <u>Rolling Stone Magazine</u> (the first athlete to be so honored)
- Articles in People Magazine and the Wall Street Journal
- Featured on ESPN Sports Century Show, biographical sketch, showing the economic impact he had on the city in 1976 and in other cities as well (voted by fans in 2003 in the top five of over 200 sports Century shows they wanted to view)
- Rookie season ranked fifth by ESPN on list of all-time greatest rookie seasons
- Ranked eighth on list of most electrifying athletes of all-time by ESPN, December 9, 2003

#### **Statement**

Mark was a national phenomenon. People accorded him rock star status—cutting their hair like his, naming babies after him, and even collecting his hair after his trips to the barber shop. President Gerald Ford, Frank Sinatra, Elton John and the Beach Boys were among celebrities who sought him out—wanting to meet him. He was successful beyond belief, and he represented our towns and Algonquin well—making the communities of Northborough and Southborough proud of him. Yet in the glory years—1976, the pinnacle of Mark's fame, he was the same approachable kid as he was when he pumped has at Pierce's gas station. He never turned down a request for an autograph. Instead of staying in Detroit—with the prospect of making a lot of money, Mark returned to Northborough (officially retiring from baseball in 1983). He led the annual opening day parade of the local little league, let boy scouts camp out at his farm, and gave away free coloring books to the grade schools. He started as one of us and never forgot us as he shot up to stardom.

After his untimely death last April, hundreds of people paid their respects—some waiting for hours in long lines to do so. Very few were there because of Mark's celebrity status. All seemed to have the same feeling about him as I did: when talking to Mark, he made people feel as though they were celebrities—not him. He gave them his undivided attention and was genuinely interested in them as individuals—even those people he might have known casually. Someone said that if you knew Mark Fidrych, you were his

friend. Mark's spirit lives today in the hearts and souls of all his friends, all those people who were touched by his genuineness and his zest for living—for enjoying every day.


