that the only that the the third 12:38 presidential impeachment in u.s history ranks about the 10th biggest story of 12:42 the year 12:43 but now 2020 is hindsight a new year has 12:47 dawned 12:48 and it looks a little bit like the old 12:49 year but give it time 12:51 we are on the cusp of a brighter year 12:53 many years we hope 12:55 already we have ministered millions of 12:58 doses of vaccine that hold the promise 13:00 of controlling this pandemic the economy 13:03 is slowly rebounding 13:04 and will get better as the virus recedes 13:07 we have shined a brighter spotlight on 13:09 racial and economic inequities 13:12 and we will hopefully see those gaps 13:13 narrowed 13:15 in a few minutes during community 13:17

candles we're going to open the virtual 13:19 floor for all of you 13:20 to offer your hopes for 2021 and beyond but let me prime the pump first by 13:25 telling you one of mine 13:28 as a science journalist i have devoted my life to the belief that finding and 13:32 broadcasting truth 13:34 are noble and necessary pursuits in the past few years i have been dismayed by 13:39 the declining respect for science 13:41 and the continued attacks on a free 13:43 press 13:44 but i am optimistic that new national 13:46 leadership in a new year 13:48 will begin to restore our trust in 13:49 science i hope that saying someone 13:52 listens to the scientists becomes not an 13:54 insult but a compliment 13:57 i hope the journalists are no longer 13:58

called the enemy but as the watchdogs we 14:01 are 14:02 holding the powerful accountable and 14:04 amplifying the voices of those who have 14:06 been shunted 14:07 to society's back corners in a few 14:10 minutes carol will give 14:11 her hopes for 2021 and when it's time to 14:14 hear community candles 14:16 we'd like you to offer yours but first melissa will bring us a message of hope 14:20 and inspiration 14:24 so i am here to talk to our young and young at heart wherever you might fall 14:30 on that spectrum 14:31 about something that's really really 14:34 powerful 14:35 and that's hope but first i want you to 14:38 think about 14:40 have you ever hoped for something 14:44

be 15:40 oak trees so we could say acorn hopes to 15:42 be an oak tree 15:43 but now here's why acorns remind me of hope what if i just take the acorns 15:50 and i put them right here on a table and 15:54 i just left it 15:54 i walked away from it would it have any 15:57 hope of becoming an 15:58 oak tree from the bottom of my from the 16:01 top of my table 16:04 now i know we don't have a lot of our 16:06 young folks on here 16:08 but think about it and you can shake 16:10 your head at me what do you think do you 16:11 think an 16:11 oak an acorn can become an oak tree from 16:13 a table 16:15 oh i don't think so either corns aren't 16:17 becoming an oak tree from a table 16:18

so acorns need more things than that 16:21 they can hope to become an oak tree but we got to give it some place to live it's got to have a good 16:28 grassy soil to find its place into 16:32 when it starts to grow it's gonna need 16:36 rain water to help it start to 16:39 pick up and have the nutrients 16:43 that it needs we need to make sure it 16:47 has 16:47 plenty of sunshine to give it energy 16:52 and then once it gets all of those 16:55 things 16:58 then it gets to become an oak tree 17:01 and like acorns our hope needs other 17:03 things to come to life 17:05 we start with our imaginations which 17:07 what we're doing today we are 17:08 imagining the things that we're hoping 17:11 for 17:12

that we've seen this past year and we'll 20:39 likely see in the week ahead 20:41 i hope we begin to create a community a 20:44 country 20:45 a world that is based on uu principles 20:47 such as inherent worth and dignity 20:49 each person justice equity and 20:52 compassion in all human relations 20:55 peace a respect for the interdependent 20:57 web of existence 21:00 i hope that i find the energy and the 21:02 commitment to do this work 21:04 and that you will too that is what i 21:07 hope 21:09 after some music we will practice 21:11 community candles which is an 21:12 opportunity for the congregation to be 21:14 with one another as we mark notable 21:16 things happening in our lives 21:18 and as part of this new year service we 21:20

and many of us um as we have already 24:31 heard are 24:32 all too eager to leave uh 2020 behind 24:37 interestingly enough that the name for 24:40 this month 24:41 january comes from the roman god janus 24:44 and janice is two-faced um 24:48 not in the negative way but um janice's 24:51 one face looks to the past 24:54 and the other face looks to the future 24:57 um and the time-honored traditions that 25:00 we have around new year's with new 25:02 year's resolutions 25:04 is to look to the past to to assess 25:07 where we are um how we've done 25:10 um whether or not we you know 25:13 made it through our to-do list and then 25:17 to set it right to uh 25:20 to begin again and get committed 25:23 to making changes but psychologists will 25:27

tell us that 25:28 this kind of self-reflection 25:30 self-knowledge 25:32 has its limits that knowledge um in is is insufficient alone 25:38 for any kind of real change which is 25:41 kind of an interesting thing we 25:43 usually believe that if we if we learn 25:45 about something and we know it and we 25:47 integrate it that 25:48 you know that is that is going to be 25:51 enough 25:52 but knowledge as expertise as 25:55 skill building or theoretical or 25:58 practical 25:58 understanding is really only one form of 26:02 knowing 26:04 it was out it was albert einstein 26:08 of all people who said imagination 26:12 is more important than knowledge 26:16

for knowledge defines our current 26:18 understanding 26:19 but imagination points to what we might be what we might create 26:28 so this time of year 26:31 um as we've moved out of the holiday season of christmas and hanukkah the christian tradition of epiphany 26:42 continues 26:43 because the story the nativity story 26:45 continues 26:47 the wise ones the wise men the magi um 26:52 do not find chris the christ child 26:56 on christmas eve they actually find 26:59 um baby jesus in the manger um 27:02 many days months who knows maybe even 27:05 many years 27:06 later but they finally come upon baby 27:09 jesus 27:10 and um it marks a celebration 27:13

epiphany is the recognition 27:17 of the divine nature of that child 27:22 an awareness an aha moment that they 27:25 came away from 27:27 and departed and could never be the same 27:30 again the experience of epiphany has 27:34 broad implications 27:36 um it is defined by a sudden realization 27:40 a um some kind of the essence of meaning coming from an event and this can be 27:48 it doesn't have to even be something 27:49 special it can be a mundane event 27:52 pouring a cup of coffee and and smelling 27:55 and having this great awareness about 27:58 something much larger than just that cup 28:00 of coffee 28:01 the aha moments are comprehension of 28:04 perception 28:05 of something that provides us with an 28:08 intuitive insight 28:09

and in a sense a profound meaning 28:14 you know many of us have had 28:17 something like an epiphany moments of 28:21 revelation 28:22 sudden realizations um but 28:26 the the thing that distinguishes 28:28 epiphany 28:30 from personal revelation or just um 28:34 personal insight is that it carries a 28:36 responsibility 28:38 to share epiphany 28:41 is meant to be shared 28:47 new orleans i learned a little bit more 28:49 about the celebrations and traditions 28:51 around 28:51 epiphany because after 28:55 um in new orleans um 28:58 this this epiphany is celebrated all the 29:01 way to mardi gras 29:03 by the baking of king cakes and so there 29:06

these are sweet breads that are in a 29:08 ring 29:09 and they're baked and there's a little 29:12 plastic 29:13 baby jesus baked into the bread and then 29:17 the cake is decorated with uh purple and green sprinkles and a little 29:22 frosting and 29:23 you were invited to a king cake party it could be in a home it could be 29:29 in an office 29:31 um these things just go on it is 29:34 it's something that just goes on and on and on so you could be eating king cake 29:39 basically right after christmas all the 29:42 way through to lent 29:45 the idea of this um 29:50 is that if you are the one who is lucky 29:53 enough 29:54 to get this baby jesus in your piece of 29:58

cake you become responsible 30:01 for hosting or hostessing the next king 30:04 cake party 30:05 and it should happen within a few days 30:08 or 30:09 within that week so the idea of epiphany is is a bit of fun that speaks to the 30:16 elements of 30:17 both surprise and revelation and also 30:21 obligation of sharing what is revealed 30:27 epiphany is not confined to the 30:30 christian 30:31 tradition and story we know from the 30:34 story of buddhism 30:36 with the enlightenment moment siddhartha 30:38 gautama had 30:40 as he became the buddha under the tree 30:43 the bodhi tree with 30:45 with what is now called nirvana 30:48 is very similar to um what 30:52

people call an epiphany judaism 30:56 we have moses goes up to the mountain he brings down the ten commandments and 31:02 while he's there he has 31:04 this moment of awe and wonder in 31.07 revelation 31:08 and we see that the prophet muhammad in 31:11 islam 31:12 same kind of thing this kind of 31:14 revelatory 31:16 moment where there's this reception he 31:18 goes on to write the quran 31:20 in each one of these experiences 31:24 these um religious leaders 31:27 are compelled to share what they 31:30 what they know the kind of knowing that 31:34 comes 31:34 from epiphany but you know we don't 31:38 really need 31:38 religious traditions or religious 31:42

observances to enter into these kinds of 31:46 awareness 31:46 in fact annie dillard uh is a nature 31:50 writer 31:51 and she points to these the special 31:54 moment of awareness 31:56 in her book pilgrim at tinker creek and she starts out by telling us about a 32:03 a child who was born blind who had 32:06 operation to correct her vision 32:09 and she says this she says when the 32:12 doctor took the bandages off 32:14 and led her into the garden 32:18 the girl who was no longer blind 32:21 saw the trees with the lights in it 32:26 she saw not only the tree but every 32:28 varying 32:29 shade of green and the glimmer of light 32:32 that played upon 32:33 each leaf 32:37

annie dillard goes on to say this it was 32:40 for 32:40 this tree i searched through the peach 32:43 orchards of summer 32:46 in the forests of fall and down winter 32:48 and spring 32:49 for years 32:54 until one day i was walking along 32:58 tinker creek thinking of nothing 33:01 in particular at all when i saw 33:04 the tree with the lights in it 33:08 and it was less like seeing than being 33:12 seen for the first time and i was 33:15 not breathless by a powerful grace 33:26 most of us yearn to be knocked 33:28 breathless 33:29 by something so profoundly beautiful 33:34 barbara brown taylor wrote in the 33:36 christian century she said 33:37 when i resist the economy and despair 33:40

the dominant world 33:42 that we live in i resist from a minority viewpoint that i learned in church there 33:52 are many kinds of evangelism i know but here is one i can embrace in a 33:57 culture of fear 33:59 addicted to bad news to sin to death 34:04 to keep telling stories of human 34:06 kindness 34:08 and divine grace without commercials of 34:11 any kind 34:13 in a world like ours the church may be 34:17 the only corporate sponsor that it can afford to deliver such good news for 34:22 free 34:24 and i do believe that's why we are here 34:27 together this morning 34:29 to keep that kind 34:32 of space alive 34:38 and perhaps you're showing up here this 34:40

morning 34:41 without much enthusiasm for that maybe 34:45 this past year has 34:47 in and even the year before has taken so much from you that it's hard to even 34:52 muster 34:53 any sense of hope or any sense of 34:57 opening to wonder or to joy 35:01 and it's the faith community you have 35:03 had to say goodbye to 35:05 your new minister and all of the promise 35:09 and the hope that you invested in the 35:12 process 35:14 of coming together and then the grief of 35:17 that departure 35:19 but it's ministry that brings me here 35:22 with you in the time that we'll have 35:26 together 35:28 um the targeted ministry program is new it's a way of just having a short 35:35

term relationship which targets 35:39 very specific elements of ministry 35:43 and relationship to the minister to 35:45 explore 35:46 and to see and to lift up 35:51 so i think that this idea of 35:55 of epiphany is very pertinent to 35:59 the kind of thing that we will be doing 36:01 together 36:03 seeing one another in this congregation 36:07 with the lights on 36:11 in addition to doing that kind of 36:13 ministry 36:14 i am also here to be your pastor i'm 36:18 here to stand with you walk with you 36:20 and be with you during joys and sorrows 36:24 during anxiety times of great questions 36:27 and i have posted my home phone 36:31 and my home email address and you can 36:34 certainly contact me through the church 36:36

website as well but i 36:39 want us to make this time 36:42 matter because i do think it matters i 36:46 think it matters 36:47 not only for right now it matters for 36:49 the future hope 36:51 for this congregation for your community and you we really don't know but we do 36:58 know 36:58 that the impact of a small group of 37:01 people can have 37:02 impact upon the world 37:05 so let us lend our hope 37:08 and all the possibility that we can 37:14 to come together and and do that 37:17 kind of imagining 37:21 so unlike the god janice whose gaze 37:24 is only to the past to the future we 37:27 will be 37:28 taking a soulful look at right now 37:34

you know moses and the buddha and 37:36 muhammad and the three kings 37:38 were all transformed by their moments of 37:41 deep 37:42 insight and revelation 37:46 and so as we journey together into this 37:49 year 37:50 into target ministry together i hope 37:53 that we 37:54 are all transformed that we will never 37:57 be the same again and we can only do 38:00 that together 38:02 if we open ourselves to the possibility 38:05 and the imagination of 38:07 what we are and what we can be 38:11 to the end that each shall know 38:13 wholeness and all 38:15 shall live as one so may it be 38:19 please join in our closing hymn number 38:22 346 38:23
