They lived a very rewarding life in Heatherwood Retirement Community, where Minot was the bingo caller and started an annual celebration each year for Veterans Day and Memorial Day. He was a member of the Quiet Birdmen and the Veterans of Battle of the Bulge. Minot was loved and respected by all whose lives he touched.

His beloved wife Bette passed away in March of 2000. He met Vera Davies many years later and they married on August 31, 2018. Together they lived very happily until his passing.

He was preceded in death by his wife Elizabeth (Bette) Jane Richardson and a sister Patricia Lucht.

CORPORAL WOUNDED IN LUXEMBOURG JAN. 4

Mr. and Mrs. Myles L. Richardson, 26 Ashland avenue, were informed by a war department telegram late last week that their son, Cpl. Minot N. Richardson, was seriously wounded in action Jan. 4 in Luxembourg. The message also stated that his mail address will follow directly from the hospital where he is being cared for, with further details.

In six months the young Oshkosh soldier has re ceived a promotion, a transfer and the injury. He was promoted from private first class to corporal and then was transferred from the engineers to the infantry. Corporal Richardson has been in service a year and a half, entering in July of 1943. Cpl. Mir.ot N. Richardson, 80 Powers avenue, was with the combat engineers of the infantry and was awarded the victory medal, American theater service ribbon, ETO service ribbon with four bronze stars, good conduct medal, purple heart and one overseas service bar. He entered service June 24, 1943.

The purple heart medal awarded Cpl. Minot, Richardson for wounds received in action Jan. 4 has been forwarded to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Myles Richardson, 26 Ashland avenue. Corporal Richardson is now in a hospital in England.
