Evan Lawson: A Life Cut Short, A Legacy of Compassion

Evan Lawson, son of Mayor Cecilia Lawson, passed away unexpectedly on February 18th, at the age of 28. Born and raised in Asheville, Evan was a vibrant and compassionate figure, leaving a lasting mark on the city he called home.

Evan's life was defined by a fierce commitment to social justice and a deep-seated empathy for those in need, a trait perhaps inspired by his late uncle, renowned journalist Casey Lawson, whose recent passing deeply affected Evan. Arson Attempt at Historic Grove Park Inn Foiled; Minor Damage Reported

Asheville, NC – A late-night arson attempt at the iconic Grove Park Inn was thwarted early this morning, leaving behind minor damage and prompting an investigation by local authorities. The incident occurred around 2:00 AM, when a small fire was reported on the hotel's grounds.

Responding quickly, the Asheville Fire Department extinguished the blaze, which caused minimal damage to an exterior section of the building. Hotel security personnel were credited with initially containing the fire and alerting emergency services.

"We are grateful for the swift response of our security team and the Asheville Fire Department," stated a Grove Park Inn spokesperson. "Thanks to their efforts, the damage was contained, and no guests or staff were injured."

While the exact cause of the fire is still under investigation, authorities have confirmed that it was intentionally set. "Evidence at the scene indicates this was an act of arson," said a representative from the Asheville Police Department. "We are currently reviewing security footage and interviewing witnesses to determine the identity of the perpetrator or perpetrators."

This arson attempt marks the latest in a series of similar incidents that have plagued Asheville businesses in recent months. The string of fires began with the Downtown Book and News store, followed by smaller incidents at several other local establishments. This pattern has caused growing concern among business owners and residents, prompting increased patrols and heightened vigilance.

The escalating series of arson attempts has triggered a wave of concern among Asheville residents, who are now pressuring the City Council to take immediate action. Frustrated by the perceived lack of progress in apprehending the perpetrators, many residents are demanding increased funding for law enforcement, enhanced security measures for local businesses, and a more visible police presence throughout the city.

In a show of coordinated effort, the Asheville Police Department has confirmed that they are working hand-in-hand with the Grove Park Inn's security team to investigate the incident. This collaborative approach aims to leverage the hotel's internal resources and security expertise in conjunction with the police department's investigative capabilities.

The incident has raised concerns about the security of the historic landmark, which is a popular destination for tourists and locals alike. The Grove Park Inn has assured the public that they are cooperating fully with the investigation and are reviewing their security protocols.

"The safety of our guests and staff is our top priority," the hotel spokesperson emphasized. "We are taking this incident very seriously and are working to ensure that such an event does not happen again."

The investigation is ongoing, and authorities are urging anyone with information about the arson attempt to come forward.

Local Firefighter Arrested on Arson Charges

Asheville, NC - Police have arrested Michael Kiedrzynek on four felony arson charges. The arrest follows public outcry over what locals feared was a serial arsonist.

Kiedrzynek has been with the Asheville Fire Department for three years, and was stationed at the West Asheville fire station. He graduated from UNCA with a degree in computer science during the pandemic, and "signed up to be a fire fighter to help his community" according to his social media posts from that time.

"Michael Kiedrzynek is currently suspended, consistent with AFD policy," said a county spokesperson. "ADF cannot comment on an individual ongoing criminal investigation. All firefighters go through extensive background checks before and during their service to our community."

The Grand Bohemian Hotel, Grove House, the Grove Park Inn, and at least one private residence appear to have been targeted by a serial arsonist in recent nights. Although police have not detailed the pattern, locals quickly deduced that the fires were related.

The local community is now afraid that their taxes will go up as a result of this. "Any insurance company will tell you that exposure to risk increases costs," says Arlo Alexander, an insurance agent based in Weaverville. "Now that the AFD has seen that one of their own is an [alleged] arsonist, the insurance companies are going to factor that in."

Fire at Innsbrook Mall Part of Safety Exercise

Asheville, NC - Utility workers started a controlled fire at the Innsbrook Mall off of Tunnel Rd this week, and the building owners are suing the city.

The controlled burn was part of a safety exercise to demonstrate the risks of exposed wiring. The burn was originally scheduled to be at a demonstration site set up by Asheville Fire Department, but it was moved to the mall at the last minute.

No injuries were reported, but property damage is estimated to be in the thousands of dollars.

Local Music Scene Rocked by Bold Heist at Citizen Vinyl

Asheville, NC – The city's music scene is abuzz following a brazen break-in at Citizen Vinyl, the popular downtown record store and vinyl record manufacturing facility. Authorities are investigating the incident, which resulted in the theft and destruction of a significant quantity of vinyl records, studio equipment, and specialized vinyl and tape manufacturing equipment.

According to preliminary reports, the perpetrators gained entry late last night, bypassing the building's security systems. Once inside, they reportedly ransacked the premises, destroying a large portion of the store's record stock. Sources close to the investigation suggest that the destruction was deliberate, indicating a targeted attack rather than a random act of vandalism.

"It was a scene of utter chaos," stated one anonymous source familiar with the investigation. "Records were smashed, equipment was damaged... it was clear that whoever did this wanted to send a message."

The theft of the manufacturing equipment has raised concerns among local music enthusiasts, as Citizen Vinyl is one of the few facilities in the region capable of producing vinyl records. The loss of this equipment and studio space could have a significant impact on the local music scene.

This latest incident comes on the heels of a string of recent fires and thefts plaguing Greater Asheville businesses, prompting Mayor Cecilia Lawson to take decisive action. In an emergency proposal slated for review mid-March by the City Council, Mayor Lawson announced plans to revitalize and bolster security measures for local businesses.

"We will not tolerate these acts of vandalism and theft," declared Mayor Lawson in a press conference earlier today. "We are committed to protecting our downtown businesses and ensuring the safety of our community. This emergency proposal will provide increased funding for night patrols and city-wide security upgrades, sending a clear message that criminal activity will not be tolerated in Asheville."

Law enforcement officials are currently interviewing witnesses in an effort to identify the perpetrators. They are also investigating possible connections to criminal organizations, as the incident bears the hallmarks of an organized crime. The sheer size and weight of the stolen vinyl record press, estimated to be several tons, suggests a well-organized operation involving a substantial crew and specialized equipment.

The incident has sent shockwaves through the Asheville community, raising concerns about the safety of local businesses. Citizen Vinyl has declined to comment on the ongoing investigation.



Mall of the Damned

Host: Alright, listeners, buckle up. Tonight, we're diving deep into the heart of darkness – or rather, the heart of Greater Asheville's very own Innsbrook Mall. Built in '66, Innsbruck was Asheville's first modern enclosed mall. Now, it's a decaying husk, a skeletal reminder of a bygone era. But this ain't your average ghost story. We're talking something way more sinister.

We've got reports of shadows dancing in empty corridors, electronics going haywire, a general sense of dread that hangs heavy in the air.
