## Using Flipgrid to Storytell

Directions: Produce a personal story for your classmates.

Ages: 9-12 grades

1. Give directions for the final story based on StoryCorp from NPR:

We will begin to explore storytelling.

- 1. We approach storytelling without writing things out completely first.
- 2. We use theme as an editing tool.
- 3. There is no set prescription for how much or how little detail is necessary, or how it MUST be structured— it is your story.
- 4. Your stories involve CHANGE.
- 5. The story has to matter to the teller.
- 2. All students listen to the same story and share their reactions in a Google classwork question.

Discuss as a Google Classwork Question

You will discuss anything from the thoughts below and will respond to one classmate:

- One thing you think made the story a STORY
- A favorite line or image— something you saw really vividly
- Did you know how it would end? How did Dante make us wonder what would happen?
- 3. Students choose their own story to listen to from StoryCorp on NPR.
- 4. Students used Flipgrid to make observations about the story that they chose. Student observation
- 5. Students recorded a story on a Google doc using the Voice typing Tool and then edited the text before sending it to me.
