1954 - British withdrawal from Egypt

1955 - Conservative election victory for Anthony Eden

Launch of ITV to rival BBC

Britain opts out of the EEC at the Messina Conference

1956 - Suez crisis, Britain is humiliated and Eden's popularity goes down

1957 - Harold Macmillan replaces Anthony Eden as Conservative Prime Minister Independence achieved by Ghana and Malaysia

1958 - Formation of the Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament (CND)

1959 - Conservative election victory for Harold Macmillan

Feature film "Sapphire" starts to bring to light the issues of race relations

1960 - Blue Streak missile abandoned in favour of American Polaris

Macmillan's "wind of change" speech

Independence granted to Cyprus and Nigeria

1961 - Britain applies to join the EEC (Macmillan)

Enoch Powell's "Rivers of Blood" speech, warning against mass immigration

1969 - Voting age reduced to 18

Start of the "Troubles" in Northern Ireland

Divorce Reform Act 1969 (Easier for couples to separate "irretrievably broken down")

1970 - Surprise election victory for Conservatives under Edward Heath

Equal Opportunities Act 1970 passed

Equal Pay Act 1970

1971 - Decimalisation of the currency

Further reform of divorce laws

1972 - Bloody Sunday occurs

Unemployment rises above 1 million for the first time since the 30s

1973 - Oil price crisis and energy shortages

British accession to the EEC alongside Ireland and Denmark

Sunningdale Agreement for power-sharing Northern Ireland

"Three Day Week" imposed

1974 - Edward Heath narrowly defeated in February election, Harold Wilson returns to PM Collapse of Sunningdale Agreement after Loyalist Workers' Strike

1975 - EEC referendum brings a 2:1 majority for the "yes" vote

Margaret Thatcher becomes Conservative leader

Sex Discrimination Act (reinforced Equal Pay Act 1970)

1976 - Wilson resigns and James Callaghan becomes PM

Britain forced into deep spending cuts by terms of IMF loan

1977 - SALT 1 (Strategic Arms Limitation Talks)

Silver Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II

Start of Concorde flights to New York

1979 - "Winter of Discontent"

Devolution for Scotland and Wales rejected in referendums

Conservative election victory for Margaret Thatcher

1980 - Independence granted to Rhodesia (Zimbabwe)

1981 - Members of Labour split off to form the SDP (splitting voters)

Riots in Brixton and Liverpool

Big gains in opinion polls by Liberal-SDP Alliance

Hunger strikes

1982 - Victory in the Falklands War

Unemployment above 3 million

1983 - Conservative election victory for Margaret Thatcher

Michael Foot's manifesto the "Longest suicide note in history," replaced by Neil Kinnock USA invades Grenada, humiliating Britain

1984 - IRA bombing at Brighton hotel, targeting Margaret Thatcher

Miners' strike and Battle of Orgreave

Hong Kong, Sino-British

1985 - Miners' strike called off

Negotiation with Soviet Union leader Gorbachev

Anglo-Irish agreement

Single European Act

1986 - Michael Heseltine resigns after the Westland affair

Deregulation of financial markets in the "Big Bang"

1987 - Conservative election victory for Margaret Thatcher

Stock market crash in London and New York

End of the Cold War

1988 - Fall of the Berlin Wall

SDP Liberal alliance ceased via the formation of the Liberal Democrats

Introduction of the poll tax

1989 - Sky TV broadcasts

Hillsborough disaster

Britain joins the ERM (Lawson designed)

1990 - Margaret Thatcher "betrayed" by her own party and is forced to resign

Conservative election victory for John Major 22 seat majority

Poll tax scrapped after rioting and replaced with the council tax

1991 - Mortar attack on Downing Street by IRA

Gulf War, maintaining special relationship, but Saddam Hussein was left in power

1992 - Black Wednesday, problems arising from the ERM (Exchange Rate Mechanism), lead to a crisis with with the pound sterling value. Interest rates were put up to 15% to stay in the ERM and many ordinary people suffered. After Britain pulled out of the ERM, the ERM subsequently collapsed

Sleaze and scandals (David Mellor)

Maastricht Treaty - single currency and EWTD opt outs, Conservative Eurosceptics rebel Major wins election victory again

1993 - Coal privatisation

Downing Street Declaration (MT saw IRA through a security prism, JM negotiated)

1994 - Death of new Labour leader John Smith, Tony Blair becomes Labour leader Scott Report, illegal machinery dealing to create weapons in Iraq

1995 - Balkan War ends after 3 years

IRA ceasefire suspended and new bombing campaign begins

Dayton Peace Treaty (Ohio) ends Bosnian War

John Redwood challenges John Major for the leadership and loses

1996 - Mad Cow Disease

IRA ceasefire renews

Railway privatisation

1997 - Landslide election victory for "New Labour" and Tony Blair

Death of Princess Diana

Hong Kong is handed to China

William Hague elected Conservative leader, replacing John Major

1998 - Good Friday Agreement brings an end to Northern Ireland troubles Human Rights Act 1998

1999 - Launch of the euro in nine EU states (not Britain)

Devolved parliaments for Scotland and Wales established

NATO bombing campaign expels Serb forces from Kosovo

2000 - Intervention by British forces in Sierra Leone for stabilisation

2001 - Labour election victory with a slightly lessened, but still large majority

9/11 and the War on Terror begins

NATO invasion of Afghanistan and overthrow of the Taliban

lain-Duncan Smith replaces William Hague as Conservative leader

2002 - UN resolution direction against WMD in Iraq

2003 - Iraq War begins (dodgy dossier and David Kelly commits suicide out of guilt later) lain Duncan-Smith replaced as Conservative leader by Michael Howard

2004 - Hutton Report published

EU adds Hungary, Poland, Slovakia and Slovenia to its member states

2005 - Third successive election victory for Tony Blair and Labour David Cameron becomes Conservative leader 7/7 terror attacks occur in London (56 killed)

2006 - G8 summit at Heiligendamm

2007 - Power-sharing government agreed upon for Northern Ireland
Tony Blair resigns and Gordon Brown becomes the new PM
Collapse of Northern Rock and growing financial crisis
