## Judicial Expansion Constitutional Amendment (JECA)

One role of the Judicial Branch is to enforce laws (Article 4, Section 1a); however, the Constitution provides the Court with few instruments to carry out this role, often leaving the ordinary citizen powerless to keep government in check. This document aims to fix that.

- 1. A citizen body is defined to be a citizen, governmental organization, or a private organization.
- 2. The Supreme Court may hear citizen disputes in addition to intergovernmental disputes.,
- 3. A citizen body may file a citizen dispute in which a citizen body has broken the law or breached the constitution.
  - a. If it is a breach of a law on proper conduct in reddit or discord, it should only be considered after multiple offenses, and it has been brought to the moderation's attention 2 or more days ago and they have not done anything about it.
  - b. If the defense is found guilty, they are to be punished according to the following list. The first applicable choice applies:
    - i. Punishments specified by the Constitution.
    - ii. Punishments specified by legislation.
    - iii. Punishments specified by precedent in a similar court case.
    - iv. At the Court's own discretion, if no specified punishment exists.
- 4. A citizen body may submit an appeal of a case decision made by a lower court if they feel it is unjust. This is different and separate from an appeal for a ban or deletion
  - a. This is to be taken to the court immediately above it, where, with 2/5 approval, it will be heard.
  - b. If there are multiple higher courts, the decision on an appeal case can also be appealed.
- 5. The Judicial Branch may reclassify cases if they feel that they were filed incorrectly.
- The Supreme Court can create new case types without constitutional amendments, however, they may be blocked by a majority vote from the legislature, or a public referendum.
  - a. In the case of the referendum, it may only occur after a petition against the new case type has received signatures from 10% of registered voters.
- 7. The legislature may write laws that create crimes or provide punishments, however, they will not apply retroactively and normal restrictions apply.
- 8. No double jeopardy. This means that someone can not be punished twice over the same crime, or tried twice if found innocent the first time.
- 9. Lower Courts may have any of the powers given to the Supreme Court, if the Supreme Court so wishes, except for the power to hear Recall or Judicial Review cases.

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
