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VERMONT VETERANS SHARE THEIR STORIES Over 50 veterans speak in community storytelling series

Richmond, Vermont – November 18, 2025: In the first two weeks of November, a series of community events brought together approximately 300 Vermonters to listen to the voices of over fifty veterans, each sharing personal stories of their time in military service and how those experiences have affected them. These nonpolitical events were facilitated by Vermont-based nonprofit Vets Town Hall, in partnership with local organizations and individuals.

Beginning with an event in the State House and ending in the Charlotte Grange, the series of Vets Town Halls aimed to increase understanding between veterans and non-veterans in our state. Other locations included Bennington, Brattleboro, Colchester, Rutland, and Saint Johnsbury.

Speakers touched on a wide range of subjects, including reasons for joining, wartime experiences, camaraderie and friendship, post-traumatic stress, military sexual trauma, resilience, the importance of humor, skills and values gained through military service, and how military service impacted a veteran's family. At times, veterans spoke through tears, whereas at other times, the speaker and attendees shared laughter at a humorous reflection.

"What was meaningful to me is to listen to the veterans speak from their hearts, some for the first time," says Frank Wetherby, emcee of the Bennington Vets Town Hall at the Vermont Veterans Home. Frank served in the US Army from 1965 -1986.

Vets Town Hall is a small 501(c)(3) based in Vermont that works to bring these events to communities across the country.
