6-12	My Political Autobiography can be used as an in-class or at-home assignment to help students engage in a discussion of their political beliefs by reflecting on the connections between their experiences, their values, and their political views. 9-12	Provide students with the tools necessary to have civil and informed conversations about the Israel-Palestine conflict through an activity that leads students to recognize biased media coverage and helps students thoughtfully express their viewpoint. 9-12	Americans are more similar across the political spectrum than they often believe, also known as the "Perception Gap." Revealing the Perception Gap is one of the most effective interventions to reduce polarization. Follow this lesson to improve classroom civil discourse by reducing anxiety about cross-partisan discussion, while students learn there are well-supported positions between the polar opposites. Short Activity - 10 minutes or less

6-12	With students, watch one of the videos from the menu. Each video either models dialogue across lines of disagreement or explains the science behind how to bridge divides. Conduct a brief discussion by asking questions such as "What is your reaction?" and "What's something new you learned?" 6-12	Use exit ticket or partner protocol to assess and encourage students' development of five bridging mindsets, including resisting the urge to "win" and listening deeply.	See Better Arguments Exit Ticket Exercise or Current Events Exercise *
