Contiuing on this slightly sinister theme, the quagsire from before seems bent on retrieving the GS ball at any cost.

Jeepers, imagine seeing THAT in your bedroom window at night!

"Oookaaaay..." "Why do I not feel comforted?"

Yes, this solo salamander will not be perturbed and continues to bug Ash and the gang even after being hit by chikorita's Rayman attack. It grabs the GS ball, causing the others to give chase, while team rocket are also de-balled, causing them to follow as well.

Well, this is apparently a town named Cherrygrove city, so I wouldn't exactly trust the naming conventions of this area...

Then after the mons are caught properly, they are properly foiled... again with minimal effort from the twerps. Okay, well at least NOW, after that big heaping helping of jack squat, we finally get to see what the quagsire wanted with the round things. I'm actually kind of curious, what ancient secrets were they hiding? So the twerps follow the mons, Eric Stuart gives us the line reading of his career...

...and then we find out what the fuss was about: They wanted round things because they look like the moon. Well! I'm sure that's the last time a disappointing pay-off will be associated with the GS ball!

**Thoughts** 

I don't have many thoughts on this episode, mainly because none were really generated over the course of the episode. Man, this one was dull!

It's a real shame too, because it's one of the only times the GS ball played any kind of real significance in an episode, and it had to be in this utterly boring mishmash of loosely connected scenes that just felt like it didn't know where on earth it was really

going. I can do a synopsis all day long, but when the bare bones of your plot is "The GS Ball is stolen and the twerps do nothing of consequence until it's returned to them." t think you need a second pass at the draft.

Not only is this disappointing for misusing the GS ball, though, it also misuses a game location too! Yeah, Cherrygrove wasn't the most exciting town in Gold and Silver, but it was where you first fought your rival who of course is MIA here, it was where you first got your town map which, I don't know, COULD HAVE PLAYED A PART IN FINDING BLUE MOON FALLS, and they could have used pokemon that, I don't know, you could have actually captured in the area! Yeah, Quagsire don't appear in Cherrygrove in any of the gens. You know what does, though? Corsola, a pokemon so linked with clean water it got a depressing evolution in Sword and shield to reflect climate change! The choices here are just so dumb and bizarre, and all that couple with poor animation and a really clumsy dub...

Makes this a filler with no redeeming qualities. You know what that means? Yep, Rock me, by Arceus!

#### Trivia

Well first of all the fact that Cherrygrove is referred to as a town in the show and is so tiny in the games is doubly weird as it's location is based on the real life japanese city of Nagoya, which is HUGE. Seriously, it's the fourth largest city in Japan, did the developers have a grudge against Nagoya or something?

Now, though I may dunk on this episode, credit where it's due, the premise of animals being used as an indicator of clean water is based on a real phenomenon called bioindicators, or in other words, "if this animal's in the water, you don't have to worry." Even having it be quagsire is pretty clever too, as amphibians such as salamanders are often used as bioindicators in rivers just like in the episode.

Speaking of salamanders though, this fact freaked me out a little: did you know that Quagsire are probably the closest pokemon in design to their real life counterpart, aside from maybe Herdier later on? Apart from the blue color and being bipedal, Quagsire are pretty much literally Giant Salamanders, which are native to Japan and are believed to be one of the origins of the Kappa myth. But come on, Suede, you might say, look at when ash is holding one! There's no way they're that big in real life!

GIANT. SALAMANDERS. That should make all those Quagsire fans out there happy!

**Synopsis** 

I guess we're giving a hearty "screw you" to Cherrygrove city and moving across the bridge of unimportance. Golly, it's an unbroken bridge, haven't seen many of those in the series...

I WAS JOKING, not praying to the plot gods! Well now the trio is suitably pickled, as Brock is all

"Well, we do have staryu and squirtle who have shown themselves to be more than capable of pulling us across-"

"Don't be silly, Misty! Where's the whimsy in that?"

"Did someone say whimsy?"

...O...Kay, so we've apparently spliced dimensions into one of those absurd british children's stories from the 60's, complete with this bootleg Ghibli protagonist. Jabs aside, I actually really like her design, and... sigh, Brock does too...

Luckily Arielle here is willing to share her loveseat and the gap is overcome. Then Ash is all "Gee, thanks for the ride but do you think you could stop those things from just staring at us like that? They're starting to freak me out!" Then misty's all

"Last I checked that's the definition of an orchard, so I'll let you decide for yourself, Misty."

Then to continue the connection to your standard Ghibli fare, we now observe Arielle's Arcadian lifestyle, beginning with her delightfully quirky pollination procedure.

"YA THINK?"

We then get a neat explanation of how cross-pollination works since Ash doesn't know how it works, lacking in education that he is. Though I don't know, I'm pretty sure I learned about pollination before age ten, mind you I also knew what a carnivore was...

So who knows with that boy. But yes, after Brock explains that we're basically witnessing floral intercourse (I guess he would be the one to know about that, being the prospective breeder and all) and Arielle explains that she conrols the ledyba with this SUPER SPECIAL WHISTLE DO NOT STEAL HINT HINT, Team rocket swoop in with a

bit combining antiques roadshow and the price is right to attempt to snatch it. Man, I wish I knew who Jessie's impersonating here, and why is this not a thing in the west? A combination of those two powerful day-time TV staples could devour the airwaves!

But yes, they make off with the whistle but shockingly the ledyba don't listen to them! It's almost like pokemon only obey their trainers or something! Then Team Rocket actually make a decent call for once and use Lickitung's supersonic to confuse the group and grab pikachu. Too bad pikachu won the RNG and lands the move but then the ledyba hurt themselves in the confusion by running away. Of course Arielle then returns them safely OR cries in impotent despair.

I guess she never actually caught them...? Maybe? Oh well, so how will they recover the bugs? Why with another little used pokemon making itself useful again! Too bad even in the anime, you can't have just one bat and the plan fails. Then Ash brings out heracross but it's sidetracked by a freshly headbutted tree. Meanwhile we actually catch up with team rocket post blast-off and they discover the whistle has other properties.

Then the Ledyba show up and meowth gets Arbok to obey him by using the whistle. Not sure if that step is even necessary considering the rockets have shared pokemon in the past but whatever works. They string up the bugs only to get pepper sprayed by the swarm, and as they travel we find Arielle has concerns that the ledyba won't obey her. To this Ash responds with "Don't worry! You're the one who trained them, they'll always listen to you! Take it from me, a trainer who never once had a problem with pokemon that used to obey me suddenly getting stroppy! Er, well, even if they don't you could always trap them in ice for a day or so!" "What?"

But after an admittedly adorable flashback reassures Arielle, they find Arbok continuing to make itself surprisingly useful, and a battle ensues.

Yes, I'll get to that, wait for the trivia. It looks like all is lost even though BROCK YOUR ONIX IS RIGHT THERE IN YOUR POCKET, sigh, I really need to stop expecting Onix to come out in these scenarios I'll just call it the Onix-ception. Whatever, the ledyba finally acknowledge their master's voice, Pikachu forces lickitung to forget supersonic as it never uses it again, that's pretty dark, and all is well. Arielle then vows to use the whistle less and less since they're obeying verbal orders now which MAKES NO SENSE A WHISTLE IS USED TO SAVE YOUR VOICE NOT OPPRESS YOUR ANIMALS HAVE THESE PEOPLE NEVER BEEN ON A FARM YOU USE A DOG WHISTLE SO YOU DON'T TEAR YOUR THROAT TO SHREDS YOU MORONS-

# **Thoughts**

While this one had some good moments, the writing and pacing kept it from taking off.

Easily the best part of this episode was how they used several pokemon we hadn't seen in ages and utilised them in clever and surprising ways. Lickitung, Arbok... even Zubat got a neat moment even if it didn't go anywhere. I also liked the concept, but that won't be a surprise to anyone who's followed this series for a while, I freaking love Pokemon being used for everyday jobs. Also the character design was neat and the ledyba were adorable.

But unfortunately there wasn't much on offer aside from that. The plot meanders and seemed to grasp at straws for weak conflicts to pad out the time, the gags were pretty lame and skewed a lot younger than usual...

And as mentioned in the synopsis, there were a lot of really easy solutions to problems in the story that really should have been addressed. Overall I didn't hate it and it has value, but it just wasn't my cup of tea. That's a Poke ball.

#### Trivia

All right, let's get this one over with:

Here it is backwards.

That takes guts to put on a national broadcast, even if it was trickier to reverse audio back in the 90s. Apparently the reason for the venom towards the company is not for any of the reasons anime fans have a strained relationship with it, but rather because Eric Stuart, the voice of James, was no longer getting paid for the short commercials featuring his voice. I mean that does suck, but really? The devil? Well, at least they paid their VAs a higher wage in general.

Speaking of venom, though, I thought I'd quickly point out that arbok being "charmed" by the whistle was a reference to a very long-standing form of street performance known as snake charming, where a performer makes it seem like they're hypnotising a snake to dance to their whistle-like instrument known as a pungi, usually a cobra, hence the connection to Arbok. Funnily enough, it's not the song that makes the snake dance, it's actually the movement of the pungi itself that the cobra follows, so meowth's whistle really shouldn't have done anything. It's kind of like how everyone thinks the red color is what makes bulls mad when really it's the movement of the fabric.

Lastly, when the ledyba seem to pepper spray Team Rocket and the twerps find them by following the smell, this is not stun spore or a similar pokemon move but actually based on the real life defense mechanism of ladybugs, where when they're threatened they roll over and excrete a foul-smelling yellow poison to deter predators. I'd say you could try this yourselves on a lady bug you find, but that would be animal cruelty so just watch a video.
