Addressing inequalities and challenges to social inclusion through fiscal, wage and social protection policies

Statement

Pirates are Vanguarders of Social Justice

Modern political Pirates are a conglomeration of like-minded subcultures who espouse political transparency, freedom of information, and a host of other social justice virtues. Pirate organizations from around the world banded together to form the Pirate Parties International Headquarters in 2010. Our organization espouses a democratic political environment with an open policy of inclusion and equal rights of participation. We seek fair and just governance through online mediums that enable mass representation and power-sharing. We document all of our meetings and interactions in order to be completely transparent about how decisions were made. Our members propose innovative models for just governance that will involve everyone in society and hinder corruption. We cherish liberty, whereby all individuals in a society are provided with equal opportunities to earn sufficient wealth to live healthy and comfortable lives by means of modest working conditions. Our views go hand in hand with the sustainable development goals for the UN 2030 agenda to improve human life throughout the planet. Global equality requires the ability of everyone to communicate freely with one another and obtain critical information from society, while protecting their own private information. We encourage the Commission for Social Development to consider the following recommendations to address inequalities of social inclusion through policies that will foster internet freedom and expand participation of a wider array of people in similar multinational online projects.

We Diminish Technology Divide

While technology advances in recent decades allow more people access to wireless communication devices, most people still lack access to hardware with free internet access. Impoverished people also require technology that will serve their basic needs. Every person deserves free access to communication and information that does not compromise their privacy and freedom. Communication is key towards improving economies, healthcare systems, promoting social inclusion, and eradicating poverty. Information technologies transform how economies function. Pirates are working to create direct democracy tools and forums, which will expand the ability of everyone to participate in decision-making and to use internet resources for their benefit. We require further interventions to provide hardware (phones, tablets, and computers) and unmonitored internet connections to those with limited financial resources. Interventions could take the form of subsidized refurbished hardware and grants for training activities to motivate people to participate in online forums. Pirates work to develop websites and software for direct democracy that will enhance the power of ordinary people. We request additional assistance to enable more people to utilize these tools. Beyond just giving devices to those who lack them, we must train people to use them; and most importantly motivate them to adopt digital solutions that will overcome path dependency. On a global scale, motivating traditional communities to take advantage of modern, technological resources- whose initial benefits may seem obscure- is our greatest challenge.

We Support Online Grassroots Social Justice Campaigns

Since our inception, Pirates have collaborated on a number of whistleblowing campaigns to prevent copyright expansion, invasion of privacy, and threats to democracy. We conduct social media campaigns, have routine bi-weekly online meetings, annual General Assemblies, and organize ongoing conferences, such as the Think Twice conferences and the Pirate Security conferences. The aim of these meetings is to bring together activists who are volunteering on social justice campaigns, to assist them to share ideas and help boost their audience. Most of our members are young idealistic people, who feel very strongly about public service, contribute their own funds and volunteer to support the movement. Our philanthropic efforts have limited effects, especially as large corporations, special interest groups, and governments have seemingly endless resources to thwart our campaigns. We call on the Commission for Social Development to help us collect and allocate funds for grassroots social justice activities. Technology can liberate people if we provide them with the resources to collaborate effectively. It is incumbent on this global body of non-governmental organizations to support social justice projects organized by ordinary people that benefit the entire world.

We Prioritize Horizontal Decision-Making

Democratic decisions should be based on all members of an organization, not just its leadership. We believe a leader's role is to facilitate a process by which everyone is involved- not to dictate as an authoritarian. Technology has fundamentally changed the ways that we can motivate social inclusion. Pirates utilizes digital environments as much as possible to ensure that horizontal-decision making takes place. Online tools allow us to have maximum impact with minimal resources and to incorporate participants from a vast international community, including those lacking financial resources to attend events in person. We believe that the voices of all of our members should be equally considered. We adopt an asynchronistic model for physical meetings, meaning those who participate online are able to participate equally as those who are physically present. We ensure that periods between meetings are coordinated through decision-making software. Some of the programs that we use to promote collaborative decision making are Redmine, Loomio, Lime Survey, Mumble, Discourse, Liquid Feedback, Pirate Pads, and other open source online tools. We should always be asking ourselves how we can enable as many people as possible to contribute and benefit from digital governance. We aim to enable marginalized sectors of society by providing them with digital technology solutions that they can use to their advantage.

We Motivate Social Inclusion Policies

There are too many relevant fiscal, wage, and social protection policies that our members support to promote social inclusion than could be summarized in this brief statement, such as online regulation monitoring, universal basic income, and assistance for forced migrants. Our organization does not have a monolithic policy or manifesto, and we respect diverse opinions that are presented amicably and within our statutes of participation. We encourage all of the readers of this statement to collaborate with us towards developing innovative solutions for social justice by participating with us in our online dialogues.
