

Syllabus for SOS-3040

DRUGS AND SOCIETY

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Drugs and Society examines the impact of substance use and abuse on the individual and on society. The course provides a balanced account of the physiological, psychological, and sociological aspects of this subject, interpreting its complex nature. Among the areas covered are current and historical approaches to treatment and prevention of substance abuse as well as the legal and ethical issues surrounding the topics.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

After completing this course, you should be able to:

1. Describe significant historical developments contributing to our current problems with drugs.
2. Identify the nature of prevailing social attitudes and beliefs pertaining to the regulation of drugs.
3. Explain the complex societal forces related to licit as well as illicit drug use.
4. Describe the pharmacological bases of drug actions.
5. Provide evidence of personal insight into ethical issues related to selected aspects of drug use.
6. Analyze the nature and complexity of treatment and rehabilitative approaches.
7. Identify alternatives to drug use.

COURSE STRUCTURE

Drugs and Society is a three-credit online course, consisting of **six** modules. Modules include objectives, study materials, and activities. They consist of weekly readings, six written assignments, one ungraded introduction discussion, and six graded online discussions. In addition, the course requires you to take a proctored midterm examination and to submit a Final Project.

ASSESSMENT METHODS

For your formal work in the course, you are required to participate in online discussion forums, complete written assignments, take a proctored midterm examination, and complete a final project. See below for more details.

Discussion Forums

In addition to posting an introduction to the class in Module 1, you are required to participate in **six** graded online discussions, each focusing on a contemporary drug-related issue.

Communication with the mentor and among fellow students is a critical component of online learning. Participation in online discussions involves two distinct assignments: an initial response to a discussion question and at least two subsequent comments on classmates' responses. Meaningful participation is relevant to the content, adds value, and advances the discussion. Comments such as "I agree" and "ditto" are not considered value-adding participation. Therefore, when you agree or disagree with a classmate, the reading, or your mentor, state **and support** your agreement or disagreement. You will be evaluated on the quality and quantity of your participation. Responses and comments should be properly proofread and edited, professional, and respectful.



Written Assignments

You are required to complete **six** written assignments. The written assignments are on a variety of topics

associated with the course modules.

Questions are built around textbook readings. The questions are designed to determine your understanding of the course material as well as to provide you with an opportunity to present your personal observations and insights into the complex and often controversial nature of drug use in our society.

Carefully read the assignment questions before you begin each study assignment. Your responses should be well developed and cohesive, conveying your thorough understanding of relevant course material. Formulate responses in your own words (do not merely copy answers from your reading materials). Formal footnotes are not necessary. However, you are expected to appropriately cite any text materials used in your response.

Edit your assignment before submitting. Make certain that you have answered **all** required questions and every part of each question. Check your document for spelling, punctuation, and grammar. Make sure that all sentences are complete.

Prepare your written assignments using whatever word processing program you have on your computer. Include your name at the top of the paper, as well as the course name and code and the semester and year in which you are enrolled.



Midterm Examination

For a list of key concepts that may appear on your exam, refer to the study guide available in the Examinations section of the course Web site.

Drugs and Society requires you to take a closed-book, proctored midterm examination. It is two hours long and consists of fifty multiple-choice questions (worth 50 points) and five short essays (worth 50 points). It covers all material assigned in Modules 1-3. To prepare for the examination, review all relevant study assignments as well as material you covered in your relevant written assignments.

For the midterm, you are required to use the University's [Online Proctor Service](#) (OPS). Please refer to the "Examinations and Proctors" section of the Online Student Handbook (see [Student Handbooks](#) in the General Information area of the course website) for further information about scheduling and taking online exams and for all exam policies and procedures. You are strongly advised to schedule your exam within the first week of the semester.

Online exams are administered through the course Web site. Consult the Course Calendar for the official dates of exam weeks.

Statement about Cheating

You are on your honor not to cheat during the exam. Cheating means:

- Looking up any answer or part of an answer in an unauthorized textbook or on the Internet, or using any other source to find the answer.
- Copying and pasting or in any way copying responses or parts of responses from any other source into your online test. This includes but is not limited to copying and pasting from other documents or spreadsheets, whether written by yourself or anyone else.
- Plagiarizing answers.
- Asking anyone else to assist you by whatever means available while you take the exam.
- Copying any part of the exam to share with other students.
- Telling your mentor that you need another attempt at an exam because your connection to the Internet was interrupted when that is not true.

If there is evidence that you have cheated or plagiarized in your exam, the exam will be declared invalid, and you will fail the course.

Final Project

You are required to submit a final project in which you will thoroughly discuss and analyze a class of drug covered in this course. The paper is worth 20 percent of your final grade for the course. GRADING AND EVALUATION

Your grade in the course will be determined as follows:

- **Online discussions (6)**—15 percent
- **Written assignments (6)**—35 percent
- **Midterm exam (proctored, modules 1–3)**—30 percent
- **Final project**—20 percent

All activities will receive a numerical grade of 0–100. You will receive a score of 0 for any work not submitted. Your final grade in the course will be a letter grade. Letter grade equivalents for numerical grades are as follows:

A	= 93–100	C+	= 78–79
A–	= 90–92	C	= 73–77
B+	= 88–89	C–	= 70–72
B	= 83–87	D	= 60–69
B–	= 80–82	F	= Below 60

To receive credit for the course, you must earn a letter grade of C or better (for an area of study course)

or D or better (for a course not in your area of study), based on the weighted average of all assigned course work (e.g., exams, assignments, discussion postings, etc.).

- Read carefully the entire Syllabus, making sure that all aspects of the course are clear to you and that you have all the materials required for the course.
