Hot Topic 1: Getting a vaccine while pregnant is increasingly urgent as ICU beds fill up

# What are we hearing?

- July 2021 <u>real world data</u> show that pregnant people who got the vaccine were not at increased risk for miscarage. The CDC is recommending that pregnant people get the COVID-19 vaccine as soon as possible.
- Until now, people were concerned about the lack of clinical trial data on how pregnant people respond to COVID-19 vaccines. However, based on the real world data, we know the vaccines can protect pregnant people against severe disease and hospitalization for COVID-19.

## What should you know?

- Pregnant people are at higher risk of getting very sick with COVID-19 than people who
  are not pregnant, yet only 23% of pregnant people are vaccinated, which is very low.
  (CDC)
- Researchers have looked at the data and have not found a link between getting a COVID-19 vaccine and having a miscarriage. (AP)
- Pregnant people are 3 times more likely than non-pregnant people to be admitted to the ICU because of COVID-19. (KHN)



#### Share these messages:

- Pregnant people should get a COVID-19 vaccine. The COVID-19 vaccines are safe for pregnant people and do not increase the risk for miscarriage. (<u>KHN</u>)
- Pregnant people are far more likely to get very sick from COVID-19. Pregnant
  people are 3 times more likely to end up in the ICU from COVID-19 than those who are
  not pregnant (KHN). Vaccines are the best way to prevent severe illness and
  hospitalization.
- The FDA continues to monitor the vaccine after the FDA approves a vaccine. They
  continue to ensure that manufacturers are safely and effectively producing the vaccines.




- Over 147,000 pregnant people have already been vaccinated in the U.S., with no
  reported life threatening consequences in the Vaccine Adverse Event Reporting System.
  Researchers have not found a link between vaccination and miscarriage, preterm birth,
  stillbirth, small for gestational age (SGA), or congenital abnormalities. (CDC)
