WHAT'S THE STORY?

Set during the Civil Rights Movement in America, the novel follows ten-year-old Kenny Watson and his family on their summer vacation to visit their grandmother in Birmingham, Alabama. While on this vacation, Kenny and his family experience the highs of coming together and supporting each other, and the lows of racial injustices towards the black community. This novel balances the humor of the good natured Watsons, while preserving and honoring the events of the 16th Street Baptist Church Bombing.
