ABSTRACT

Please place your abstract here (in italic). The abstract is a very brief overview of your ENTIRE study. It tells the reader WHAT you did, WHY you did it, HOW you did it, WHAT you found, and WHAT it means. The abstract should briefly state the purpose of the research (introduction), how the problem was studied (methods), the principal findings (results), and what the findings mean (discussion and conclusion). It is important to be descriptive but concise--say only what is essential, using no more words than necessary to convey meaning. The Abstract should be 150 to 250 words in length.

1. MANUSCRIPT PREPARATION

Manuscripts should be prepared using THIS Microsoft Word template. Centered at the top of the first page of a manuscript should be the complete title of the manuscript, name(s) of author(s) affiliation(s), mailing and email address(es), then the abstract under the heading *ABSTRACT* (left justified in italic, Times New Roman, 10 points), not exceeding 15 lines, keywords under the heading *Keywords:* (not more than eight keywords, in bold and italic, Times New Roman, 10 points) and followed by the text. The text should be typed and single-spaced, using a font similar to the one used in this text (Times New Roman, 10 points). Paragraphs should be separated by double spacing.

1.1 Language Used

Manuscripts must be written in English. Manuscripts that are not fully written in English will be rejected outright and will not be submitted for review.

1.2 Manuscript Organization and Length

MJCA accepts different types of manuscript including, but not limited to, original research papers, review papers, methodology papers and case studies. The organization of the manuscript may vary depending on the type of manuscript submitted. However, in general, it normally contains the following sections: Introduction, Literature Review / Related Works, Methodology, Results, Discussion and Conclusion. Each manuscript should not exceed 20 pages including figures and tables.

1.3 Sections and Subsections

The sections should be numbered 1, 2, 3, etc. while the subsections should be numbered as 1.1, 1.2, 2.1, 2.2.1, etc. respectively. Capital letters should be used for the section titles. For subsections, the first letter of each word should be in capital letter, followed by small letters.



1.3.1 Autonumbering

The template comes with autonumbering enabled. Please use the autonumbering feature to help in numbering and formatting the sections, subsections and references.

1.4 Figures and Table




Fig. 1: Example of an illustration of figure 1

Figures or tables and the corresponding text should be placed on the same page if possible. Otherwise, it may be placed on the immediate following page. Its size should be smaller than the typed area. All figures and tables must be referenced in the text. Fig. 1 and Table 1 below show an example of a figure and a table respectively.

1.4.1 Labeling of Figures and Tables

A figure should be labelled with "Fig." and a table with "Table". It must be assigned an Arabic numeral as figure or table number; the figure number and title should be placed below the figure, and the table number and title should be placed on top of the table. The first letter of the title should be in capital letter. Figures and tables should be placed in the middle of the page between left and right margins.

References should be numbered, and the numbering must be in the order of appearance in the text. When referring to a reference in the text, write the references number in square brackets, eg: [1], [2] and so on. It is best for the authors to use a reference manager such as Mendeley, End Note, or Zotero.
