Problem solved:

What can be done:

Pick a project that promotes collaboration between each member but one that is easy to understand for the young K-Kids. This can include making dog toys out of t-shirts, writing cards, etc. (Check out the easy tab of the directory!). While performing the service project, have your members talk to the kids and simply have fun with them. Doing so will show to them how enjoyable it is to serve and possibly inspire them to continue joining chapters of Kiwanis. All of this can only be possible if your club makes the connection.
