Defending State Legislation against Lawsuit	NCJW California sent out an action alert urging members to speak out in support of the Reproductive FACT Act, a bill they helped successfully pass the state legislature. It targets crisis pregnancy centers, requiring all facilities providing pregnancy-related care to disclose if they are licensed and to share the full range of reproductive options available to individuals by law. State Legislation	NCJW California pushed for, and ultimately celebrated the signing of several bills that they supported in the state legislature, including AB 775 – the Reproductive FACT Act, demanding transparency from any clinic providing pregnancy related care. The bill targeted Crisis Pregnancy Centers, anti-choice clinics that are often unlicensed. Specifically, the legislation would require licensed facilities that provide services related to pregnancy and family planning to let women know about how and where they could access affordable and timely abortion, contraception, and prenatal care services. Lobby Day	NCJW Florida advocated against harmful anti-abortion legislation in the state legislature in over a dozen lobby visits. They specifically focused on a 24 hour mandatory delay bill, which would most impact young women, women of color, and women struggling to make ends meet. They also encouraged their lawmakers to address health coverage for low-income Floridians given the legislature's failure to expand Medicaid.
