Creator: These records were created by Deacon Maccubbin and Jim Bennett in their role as the proprietors of Lambda Rising Bookstore, and its leadership of the Lambda Literary Report, and as the founding organizers of Gay Pride Week (1975-1979), and of Earthworks, Inc.

Biographical note:

Activist and Lambda Rising bookstore founder L. Page "Deacon" Maccubbin was born in 1943 in Norfolk, VA. After dropping out of his third year at the University of Virginia, he joined the National Guard in 1964, but soon became involved in anti-war activism and, by 1968, decided to resign from the Guard to protest the Vietnam war. After missing monthly drills, he was ordered to active duty but refused those orders in a public demonstration. He submitted to arrest and was sent to a military holding detachment at Fort Belvoir. After eleven months in confinement, he was discharged from the Army and settled in Washington, DC. In 1971, Deacon bought a small consignment shop for \$100 at 1724 20th St NW, turning it into Earthworks, a tobacco and paraphernalia shop. The store was in a building known as the Community Building, which also housed the DC Switchboard, the Washington Area Free University and other counter-culture organizations. Deacon took over management of the building and, over the years,

brought in additional organizations, including the women's newspaper Off Our Backs, the Drug Offenders Rights Committee, the Bread & Roses Music Co-op, the New Playwright's Workshop, the Washington Blade and the Gay Switchboard. In 1974, Deacon rented a 300-square-foot space on the first floor adjacent to Earthworks and opened Lambda Rising bookstore, the first gay bookstore in DC. He started with 250 gay titles, and the bookstore quickly became a LGBTQ+ community hub. Lambda Rising ran the first gay-oriented television commercial ever aired anywhere in the world in February 1975. In 1977, the bookstore moved to a larger 900-square-foot location at 2012 S Street NW and launched a popular mail-order service and catalog called "The Whole Gay Catalog." In 1984, they moved to their final location, a two-story 5,000 square-foot commercial property at 1625 Connecticut Ave. NW. Lambda Rising opened new locations in Baltimore's Community Center in 1984, in Rehoboth Beach in 1993, and in Norfolk, VA in 1996. In 2003, Lambda Rising bought and revitalized Oscar Wilde Bookshop (the world's first gay bookstore) in New York City, saving it from closure. Deacon and his husband, Jim Bennett, made the decision to close all Lambda Rising locations in 2009, citing the rise in both online shopping and the now-wider availability of LGBTQ+ literature.

In addition to his work with Lambda Rising, Deacon was the founder and chair of the Washington Area Gay Community Council (WAGCC). In 1975, WAGCC launched the planning process for the second gay community center and published Just Us, the first guide to DC's gay community. That same year, Lambda Rising hosted the first ever annual Gay Pride Day in DC, a 2,000 person block party that was organized for five consecutive years. In 1979, Deacon turned Gay Pride Day over to a nonprofit, which became the modern-day Capital Pride Alliance. In 1989, Lambda Rising also began publishing a review of LGBTQ+ literature called the Lambda Book Report. The Lambda Literary Awards began in 1989, and control was turned over to the newly-formed Lambda Literary Foundation in 1997.

Deacon met his husband, Jim Bennett, in 1978. Jim became Lambda Rising's assistant manager and played an integral role in bookstore operations for 20 years, rising to Vice President for Retail Operations. On February 26, 1982, they were joined in holy union at First Congregational Church. In 1992, they were the second couple to register as domestic partners in DC, but Congress blocked DC from implementing those registrations. A few years later, Congress having lifted their block, Deacon and Jim re-registered and, on February 26, 2015, following the Supreme Court's Obergefell decision, they finally got their legal marriage license.

Scope and content of collection:

This collection documents the activities of L. Page "Deacon" Maccubbin, the founder of

Lambda Rising, Washington DC's first gay bookstore, and his husband, Jim Bennett. Materials include papers, records, newspaper clippings, and correspondence for Lambda Rising, in addition to records and press releases on Maccubbin's other projects. Papers related to Lambda Rising comprise event flyers and promotional materials, awards received by Maccubbin and Lambda Rising, several folders of correspondence from incarcerated people to Lambda Rising, business and financial records, contracts, employee handbooks, court files, newspaper clippings, and photographs of the bookstore. Lambda Rising materials span from their opening in 1977 to their closure in 2009. Other formats include a small number of negatives, photo discs, and artifacts such as license plates, holiday cards, and sketches.

Additional topics include the origins of Capital Pride; the founding of the Lambda Literary Awards and Lambda Literary Foundation; and the opening of Lambda Rising stores in Baltimore, Rehoboth Beach, DE, and Norfolk, VA. The collection also includes periodicals, advertisements, newspaper clippings, drawings, and photographs concerning general LGBTQ+ history in DC and nationwide.
