Poetry writing can be stimulated by a book of simple prompts (almost like a Mad-Libs but not meant to be funny) Called **The Magic Words by Joseph Fasano**. He organizes the prompts by subject and/or emotion (fear, love, summer, siblings, morning, disappointment, happiness, grief, etc.
