
Pvt. First Class Edward P. Stamborski, 26, Slightly Injured in French Territory

A telegram was received by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Stamborski, 317 Congress street, that their son, Pvt. First Class Edward P. Stamborski, 26, was slightly wounded in action on the first day of the invasion of France.

Private Stamborski was a member of the famed First infantry division and is serving as a military police. He has been in service since January, 1942, and arrived overseas in August of that year. He also participated in the invasion of North Africa and Sicily. Previously he had been stationed at Scotland and England. The last letter received by the family was dated June 1.

He has two brothers in service, Tech. Sgt. Tony Stamborski who is home on a delay enroute to San Francisco and Sgt. Raymond Stamborski of the marine corps stationed at Miramar, San Diego, Calif.

RESULTS IN DEATH OF OSHKOSH PRIVATE

Edward P. Stamborski, Recently Rejoined with His Company, Is in Accident in Belgium

An official notice from the war department informed Mr. and Mrs. Robert Stamborski, 317 Congress street, their son, Pvt. First Class Edward P. Stamborski, 26, died as a result of injuries received in a vehicle accident in Belgium, Sept. 23.

Decorated once before with the purple heart award for wounds received in D-day action, Private Stamborski, in a letter dated Sept. 22, the day before the accident,



informed his parents he was back with his company and was again receiving mail from home. He said he had not received any mail since some time in August when he was released from the hospital. On the day of invasion of France, in June of this year, he received shrapnel wounds in the left shoulder and left hip. He was hospitalized in England. Since his release he had traveled through France and Belgium and rejoined his division there.

Graduate of O. H. S.

Edward P. Stamborski was born in Oshkosh, April 16, 1918, and attended St. Joseph's elementary school. He graduated from Oshkosh High school. He was active in basketball and baseball. Prior to his entering service he was employed by the Catholic Cemetery association and the F. M. Spellman Fuel Company.

Under selective service he was inducted in January, 1942. Private Stamborski had been overseas for the past 26 months. He was a military police in the infantry and saw action in North Africa and Sicily, served in England and later saw action again in France and Belgium.

Two of the surviving brothers are also in service. Tech. Sgt. Anthony Stamborski is in New Guinea and Sgt. Raymond Stamborski is with the marine corps in the central Pacific area.

Also surviving besides the parents and two brothers in service are two other brothers, Felix, Berlin, Wis., and James, a student at St. Bonaventure-minor seminary at Sturtevant, Wis.; two sisters, Mrs. Regina Huber, Fort Atkinson, Wis., and Sophie Stamborski, at home here, and two nieces.

Memorial services will be arranged later at St. Josaphat's Catholic church of which he was a member.
