Testing for COVID-19 in Companion Animals

Purpose

Pets cannot contract the COVID-19 virus. It can, however, live on their fur if touched by an infected person, for a VERY short period of time. Staff and Volunteers need to be vigilant about washing and/or sanitizing hands between handling animals and disinfecting surfaces that are touched frequently (clinic exam tables and lobby chairs/floors/counters, door handles, computer keyboards, phones, etc. common in any office or home). **Pets are not at risk of developing the disease at this time.**

A confusing factor is that pets have their own coronaviruses, and always have. These common pet coronaviruses <u>must not</u> be mistaken for the mutated COVID-19 virus. **It** would be good to stop any hysteria by pointing people worried about coronavirus in animals in the right direction to resources like <u>this for cats</u> and <u>this for dogs</u> that explain the common viruses that shelter personnel deal with every day.
