

Gravesites: descriptions and photographs

The gravesite is generally, unfortunately, too unkept for any identification of the persons it holds – so this information is purely descriptive. Graves are marked from right to left while facing west. All images are mine.

GRAVESITE 1:



Grave 1 lacks any identification of the deceased, with the exception of, presumably, the year of death of the buried person. It is undetermined whether this is a family plot or individual.



Indentation on the west side of the kerb set indicates the past existence of a headstone which is now missing.

GRAVESITE 2:



The grave has no inscription, only the base of the headstone remains.

GRAVESITE 3:



The grave is massively overgrown, has no inscriptions and only has a small dent where the headstone would stand. The headstone could be the stone which appears half-buried in the ground – it could not be a footstone as it is on the west side of the plot.



The casket is visible through a sunken part of the plot on the south side of the kerb set. A possible headstone or a cover slab is misplaced.



The east side of the grave bears no inscription nor dent implying a stone.

GRAVESITE 4:



The family grave of the Miszner family is the only one left identifiable as it has been repaired in the memory of the members who were killed during the Holocaust. It is the only gravesite which faces west.



GRAVESITE 5:



The grave is massively overgrown yet bears no inscriptions. The headstone is missing, possibly under the mass of dirt and plants.



The east side of the kerb set is cracked down the centre.



A small stone rectangle laid upon the cover of the kerb set shows no inscription.



Miscellaneous stones, possibly foundations stone of Gravesite 4 or other graves, as they have ribbed sides showing signs of masonry.



Ribbed sides on stone, no inscription on any side.

GRAVESITE 6:



Grave is now composed exclusively of the kerb set, set diagonally (south-west – north-east).



Clear line denoting a previously existing element.

GRAVESITE 7:



The north side of the grave is completely demolished and uncovered, no inscriptions or headstone.

The inside of the grave is overgrown, showing no sign of casket. It is full of trash and bricks.

Possible Gravesite 8:



Rectangular stone with no inscription, firmly buried in the dirt. It is rotated (south-west – north-east).
