# Course Goals:

- 1. Understand the purpose, nature, and sources of law in the United States.
- 2. Describe the civil & criminal justice systems, analyze their operations, and assess their effectiveness.
- 3. Differentiate between the roles and responsibilities of the federal and state judicial systems and assess their effectiveness.
- 4. Compare and contrast the roles and responsibilities of local, state, and federal law enforcement agencies.
- 5. Identify correctional theories and evaluate their effectiveness in federal and state correctional systems
- 6. Identify and analyze the purposes of the Bill of Rights, the 14th Amendment, and other relevant provisions of the Constitution, as well as the Supreme Court's application of such principles over time.

#### Class Rules:

# 1. DISPLAY RESPECT.

# 2. ACT RESPONSIBLY.

Throughout this course, you will come in contact with many cultures, beliefs, behaviors, etc. You will encounter what you may consider strange ideas and practices and it is my hope that they will challenge you to think about your own beliefs and think logically through the applications and results of legal principles and procedures.

# Procedures & Requirements for Completing Assignments:

1. Complete assignments to the best of your ability. Anything less will be graded accordingly.

- 2. Homework assignments are due at the <u>beginning of class</u>. Assignments being turned in due to absences have a maximum of <u>two days</u> to be turned in. After the two days, it is at the teacher's discretion as to whether to accept the work or not.
- 3. Make-up work, including any missed test, is your responsibility. I will repeat that it is **YOUR** responsibility to pick up missed work. Do not expect the teacher to track you down to make up work.
- 4. When making up a test or major quiz, it is your responsibility to arrange transportation to get home. You may also miss any extracurricular activity planned for that afternoon.
- 5. Plagiarism is presenting another author's language and/or thoughts/ideas as your own either through direct quotation or close imitation. Plagiarism is cheating and will be dealt with by giving you a zero and submitting a discipline referral to an administrator. At the university level, plagiarism is grounds for expulsion.
- 6. Late work grading policy is as follows:
  - a. Late work: maximum grade of 70 out of 100.
  - b. If work is over 2 days late, it is the discretion of the teacher to accept it.

<sup>\*</sup>Assessment Mastery Policy: (a.k.a. "Do-over" Policy): If a student received less than a grade of 80 on a major assessment, that student may retake the assessment and receive a grade of up to 80 if the following conditions are met:

- 1. The student did not have an unexcused absence/tardiness on the day of the test.
- 2. The student has completed all assignments pertaining to that unit.
- 3. The student completes test corrections in accordance with the teacher's specifications.
- . The student notifies the teacher within 3 days of receiving the test grade back that he/she is requesting to retake the assessment.

<sup>\*</sup>The "retake" assessment will be at a time outside of class time (before school or after school), set by the teacher.

<sup>\*</sup>The "retake" assessment will be an alternative (not the same exact test as the first assessment).
