The practice of creating and acknowledging the Native and Indigenous lands that SAIC occupies "demonstrates knowledge and sensitivity to contributions from diverse and/or multiple subject positions in relation to both the city of Chicago and broader global communities" (SAIC Research Studio 1 learning outcome) and lays the foundation for creating authentic and reparative relationships with Native and Indigenous communities, artists, and sacred lands.

SAIC's Anti-Racism Committee's Land Acknowledgement subcommittee has curated support materials to help the campus community discuss and integrate the land acknowledgement into their courses, events, gatherings, and programming.

Native Land Digital

The Mission of Native Land Digital is to create and foster conversations about the history of colonialism, Indigenous ways of knowing, and settler-Indigenous relations, through educational resources such as our map and Territory Acknowledgement Guide. This organization goes beyond outdated ways of talking about Indigenous people by developing a digital platform where Indigenous communities can represent themselves and their histories on their own terms. In doing so, Native Land Digital creates spaces where non-Indigenous people can be invited and challenged to learn more about the lands they inhabit, the history of those lands, and how to actively be part of a better future going forward together.
