# I. TEEN PREGNANCY PREVENTION PROGRAMS (TPP) HHS/OASH/OPA

<u>The Teen Pregnancy Prevention Program</u>, administered by the Office of Adolescent Health (OAH), is *defined* as an "*evidence-based*"\* grant program which funds comprehensive sex education programs for children aged 10 to 19.

# II. ADOLESCENT PREGNANCY PREVENTION PROGRAMS (APP) HHS/ACF/FYSB

Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention Programs, administered by the Family and Youth Services Bureau (FYSB), provide grants for sex education programs that are sometimes called "abstinence plus" programs which focus on "both abstinence and contraception," "emphasize risk avoidance teaching youth to voluntarily refrain from non-marital sexual activity," and "abstinence education and mentoring to promote abstinence."

WARNING: While grant requirements may state that curricula/programs are to "promote abstinence" and "emphasize risk avoidance" in order to receive funding, content analyses show that many programs normalize teen sex, encourage sexual pleasure-seeking, condone early sexual debut and promote high-risk sexual behaviors rather than promote abstinence. Read more...
