Lone Working Policy

Purpose

The purpose of this policy is to alert volunteers to the risks presented by lone working, to identify the responsibilities each person has in this situation, and to describe procedures which will minimise such risks. It is designed to give volunteers a framework for managing potentially risky situations.

Definition

The Health and Safety Executive defines lone workers as those who work by themselves without close or direct supervision e.g. people working separately from others, people who work outside normal hours.

Potential Hazards

For volunteers working alone, they face the same risks in their work as others doing similar tasks but additionally, they may encounter the following;

- Accidents or sudden illnesses when there is no-one to call for help or first aid.
- Violence or the threat of violence
- Attempting to do tasks which cannot safely be done by one person alone.

Measures to reduce the risks associated with lone working

To reduce the risk of lone working, at least 2 members of INSERT YOUR FO GROUP NAME HERE MUST undertake a risk assessment to assess the following;
