

FIVE-YEAR BAR PARTNER TOOLKIT

The five-year bar has been denying immigrant families access to the health and social services safety net for more than 25 years. Congress needs to hear from you about the consequences for your community. We've prepared this toolkit to make it easier for you to educate lawmakers.

STEP #1: REVIEW KEY RESOURCES & PARTNER STATEMENTS ON 5-YEAR BAR

- Talking points in <u>English</u> and <u>Spanish</u> Short, digestible talking points to use with partners and policymakers

- <u>Sign-on letter</u> (May 2022) 750+ national, state and local organizations from all 50 states plus DC sent a <u>letter</u> to Congress in support of the LIFT the BAR Act

STEP #2: PERSONALIZE YOUR MATERIALS AND REACH OUT TO PARTNERS

- A social media toolkit These posts for Twitter, Facebook / Instagram, and WhatsApp, and accompanying graphics, can be to build awareness over time
- <u>Email to your network</u> This draft email can be used to send to your coalition partners to engage them on the issue
- Pitch note To inform area reporters about the issue
- <u>Press release</u> About your sign-on letter to the local House delegation, which you can
 use to engage local media
- Op-Ed Template Op-Ed on to personalize and submit to local and state papers

STEP #3: REACH OUT TO YOUR CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION

- <u>Congressional meeting request</u> Draft email to send to the staff of your Congressional Member requesting a meeting
- Congressional meeting guide This guide includes all the information you need to
 prepare for a meeting to educate your member of the House or Senate about the
 five-year bar, what to do during the meeting, and key steps for follow up
- Messages for meetings (in <u>English</u>) (in <u>Spanish</u>) For advocacy conversations with policymakers or journalists
