Source 1:Talmud

"Anyone who blesses the moon in its proper time, it is as if she greets the Shekhina (Feminine Divine Presence)."

Discussion Questions:

- How is greeting the new moon like greeting the Shechinah (divine presence)?
- What are some ways that you already honor the Moon? What are ways that you would like to incorporate Rosh Chodesh/ Moon rituals into your life?

Source 2: Ecclesiastes 3:1

"For everything there is a season and there is a time for everything under the sky- a time to be born and a time to die, a time to plant and a time to reap that which is planted, a time to kill and a time to heal, a time to break down and a time to build up, a time to weep and a time to laugh, a time to mourn and a time to dance. A time for throwing stones and a time for gathering stones, A time for embracing and a time for shunning embraces; A time for seeking and a time for losing, A time for keeping and a time for discarding; A time for ripping and a time for sewing, A time for silence and a time for speaking; A time for loving and a time for hating; A time for war and a time for peace."

Discussion Question:

 King Shlomo brought his wisdom of the rhythms of time, what would you add to this? What season of life are you currently in?

Source 3:Slonimer Rebbe in Sefer Netivot Shalom:

"One could say that the idea of Israel counting [its months] according to the moon is that the moon has time when it is at the peak of its darkness and you don't even see a glimmer of light, but even at that peak of darkness you know that it will start to give light again and even return to its fullness. So, too, with the life of the Jewish people, which follows the example of the moon; the order of life for the Jewish people is that it has consecutive periods of darkness, and so many of its days are in exile where they suffer many evil challenges. However, Israel counts according to the moon so that even at the peak of their darkness, they know that they will return to give much light as they once did."

Discussion Question:

- Can you recall a time that you experienced much "darkness", yet returned to give light again?

Source 4: Self-Love, by Ester Perel

"Erotic self-care begins with diminishing our inner-critic and giving ourselves simply the permission to feel beautiful, to enjoy our own company, to be more compassionate and realistic with ourselves."

Discussion Questions:
