- Answer the following questions. Be sure to number them.
- Include specific evidence and from the poem.
- Include strong <u>reasoning</u>.
- 1. Examine the differences in *language* between the first and second stanza. (Consider, in particular, the **verbs** used.)
 - a. What do you notice?
 - b. What function does this difference serve?
- 2. How does the person in the second stanza (the one who putters around the garden) feel about the one mentioned in the first (the explorer)? How can you tell? Give evidence and reasoning.
- 3. What would you say the theme of this poem is? Support with evidence and reasoning. (A few sentences will do.)
