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AFRICAN AMERICAN STUDIES

AfAm 40C. African American Studies III.

GE (III or IV) and VII

This class offers an introduction to theories in Black Studies. We begin from the argument that while blackness is a social construct, what it means to be black has very real consequences for those of us that inhabit this identity. Our class also recognizes that not all Black people have the same experiences. That is, blackness is signified and resignified in multiple ways across geographies, histories, politics, and time. Our task in this class is to trace ideas and formations of blackness as they emerge through and traffic amongst various social forces. Our class also looks at what political struggles emerge out of Black experience with these “-isms.” In order to do this work, we will be studying black thought across the globe. Together, we'll read a number of Black, African, and Afrodiasporic thinkers and writers, including Toni Morrison and James Baldwin, Aime Cesaire and Kwame Nkrumah, V. Y. Mudimbe, Edward Kamau Brathwaite, Stella Nyanzi, Ifi Amadiume, and Keguro Macharia.

AfAm 144. Special Topics | Race & Art of Writing.

Honorable Mention

This is a course in which you will learn the first principles of critical race theory, specifically, Afropessimism—and how it resonates (and is dissonant) with the first principles of Marxism and psychoanalytic-based (non-Black) feminism. With this skill-set you will be able to discern the structural difference between three different structures or forms of narrative. Narrative structure asks a different question than What the story is about? It asks the question, How is the story being told. The three narrative structures that we will learn about (and which will, in some way, inform our own storytelling) are:

1. Bourgeois narrative (typical Hollywood stories or mainstream novels and memoirs: here the causal principle is based on individual psychology and morality).
2. Political narrative (here the causal principle is based on institutional forces rather than individual psychology and is also motivated by ethics rather than morality).
3. Afropessimist anti-narrative (an interrogation of both 1 and 2, above, because neither of the aforementioned causal principles are up to the task of narrating Black suffering).

AfAm 157. Critical Race Theory.

Honorable Mention

Introduction to Critical Race Theory and key American cases on racial inequality. Using this literature, examines the possibilities and pitfalls of legal claims of race, gender, and sexuality discrimination in the age of colorblindness. Same as CLS C178.

Restriction: Upper-division students only. African-American Studies Majors have first consideration for enrollment. Criminology, Law, and Society Majors have first consideration for enrollment. Social Ecology Majors have first consideration for enrollment.

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ANTHROPOLOGY

Anthro 20A. People, Cultures, and Environmental Sustainability.

GE VIII

Anthropological consideration of global environmental sustainability from the perspective of human cultures and communities. Causes and consequences of population growth, natural resource management, environmental law, environmental ethics. Case studies emphasize tropical rain forests, arid lands of Africa and North America.

Anthro 41A. Global Cultures and Society.

GE III and VIII

Examines science in historical and cultural context (Scientific and Darwinian Revolutions, Manhattan Project, contemporary biosciences) to understand scientific truths and their limits, scientists as social actors, and vital intersections of sciences with religion, politics, gender, and other forms of culture. Same as Intl St 11.

Restriction: Anthropology Majors have first consideration for enrollment. International Studies Majors have first consideration for enrollment.

Anthro 134A. Medical Anthropology.

GE VIII

Introduces students to cross-cultural perspectives and critical theories in anthropological studies of medicine. Special attention is given to diverse ways of understanding bodies, illnesses, and therapeutic practices in our changing world. Same as Chc/Lat 178A.

Anthro 136D. Conflict Resolution in Cross-Cultural Perspective.

GE VIII

Examines theories of conflict management. Analyzes how conflict is mitigated in diverse cultures: at the interpersonal level, between groups, and on the international scale. Students discuss readings, hear from conflict management practitioners, and simulate negotiations. Same as Pol Sci 154G, Soc Sci 183E, Intl St 183E.

Chc/Lat 140A. Sex and Conquest in Latin America.

Honorable Mention

Competing ideas of masculinity and femininity, sexual violence, sexual identities, and gendered hierarchies informed how the Spanish engaged in military and religious domination of Mexican and Andean communities, as well as the forms of native resistance throughout colonial Latin America. Same as Chc/Lat 150A, Gen&Sex 171A, History 160.

Anthro 180AW. Special Topics | **Anthropology & Medicine & Pandemic.**

GE Ib

Prerequisite: Satisfactory completion of the Lower-Division Writing requirement

Restriction: Anthropology majors only.

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Anthro 180AW. Special Topics | Anthropology, Money, Sex, Power.

ART

Art 9B. Visual Culture: A Culture Divided.

GE IV

Throughout the 1980s and 1990s, controversies flourished in the mainstream media over purportedly obscene art, anti-American writing, and moral decay, among other issues. Examines these new conflicts as they manifest themselves in public life and everyday experience.

Restriction: Art Majors have first consideration for enrollment.

ART HISTORY

ArHis 42D. History of Asian Art: Arts of Islam.

GE IV and VIII

Examines past and present Islamic art, spanning 1,500 years and extending from the Americas through Indonesia. Themes include Islam as a globalizing force, the definition of "Islamic," and the competing roles of religion and politics in making art.

ASIAN AMERICAN STUDIES

AsianAm 53. Asian Americans and Race.

GE III and VII

Analyzes the Asian American experience in comparative perspective, which includes comparisons of different ethnic and racial groups, and across gender and class. Possible topics include labor, economy, politics, migration, nation, popular culture, gender, family, sexuality, and multiraciality. Same as Soc Sci 78C.

AsianAm 55. Asian Americans and the Media.

GE IV and VII

Investigates popular representations of and cultural productions by Asian Pacific Americans and Asians in the Americas from the late-nineteenth century to the present. Cultural media may include political cartoons, film/television, popular music, visual art, blogs/Web sites, and performance.

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AsianAm 130. Undocumented Immigrant Experiences.**GE III and VII**

Examines the experiences of undocumented immigrants and the policies that structure their educational, economic, social, and political participation. Same as Chc/Lat 164A, Crm/Law C187, Sociol 177C.

AsianAm 151D. Vietnamese American Studies.**Honorable Mention**

Studies the resettlement of Vietnamese in the United States following their exodus from Southeast Asia. Topics include the Vietnam War, the 1975 evacuation, boat and land refugees, the shaping of Vietnamese communities, and Vietnamese American literature. Same as Soc Sci 178D.

AsianAm 162. Asian American Women.**Honorable Mention**

Examines the representations and experiences of Asian American women from diverse perspectives. Explores the commonalities and differences among various groups of Asian American women, with particular focus on history, culture, values, and family roles. Same as Soc Sci 177B.

BIOLOGICAL SCIENCES

Bio Sci 9K. Global Change Biology.**GE II**

Field trips and lectures that address ways in which humans are altering the global environment, with consequences for the ecology of animals, plants, and microbes.

Bio Sci 191CW. Writing/Senior Seminar on Global Sustainability III.**GE Ib**

Students attend weekly seminar to discuss current issues in global sustainability. Weekly attendance at Global Sustainability Forum also is required. Seminar utilized to analyze Forum presentations and to prepare senior research paper. Prepare/write research paper under direction of faculty member. Same as EarthSS 190CW, Socecol 186CW.

Prerequisite: Prerequisite: Bio Sci 191B or EarthSS 190B or Socecol 186B. Bio Sci 191B or EarthSS 190B or Socecol 186B. Satisfactory completion of the Lower-Division Writing requirement.

Restriction: Seniors only.

BioSci 193B. [Campus As A Living Lab III.](#)**Honorable Mention**

Students study sustainability concepts and theories and how they apply to our most pressing environmental, social, and economic challenges. Concurrently, they work on hands-on projects to improve the sustainability of campus operations and systems.

Prerequisite: BIO SCI 193B

Restriction: Upper-division students only.

CHEMISTRY

Chem 14. Sense and Sensibility in Science.**GE II and Va**

Gives an overview of scientific methods and heuristics through group exercises and discussion. Discusses the benefits and limitations of applying rational scientific approaches to real-world examples from philosophy, cognitive and social psychology, game theory, economics, political science, law, and negotiation.

CHICANO AND LATINO STUDIES

Chc/Lat 61. Introduction to Chicano/Latino Studies I.**GE III and VII**

An introduction to the study of the historical foundations of the Chicano/Latino experience. Addresses such topics as empire, migration, immigrant settlement, economic integration, race, gender, and the formation of group identities.

Chc/Lat 62. Introduction to Chicano/Latino Studies II.**GE III and VII**

Provides an introduction to the arts, literature, and culture of Chicano/Latino communities. Analyzes representations of and cultural production in Chicano/Latino communities through such media as folklore, literature, art, film, architecture, dance theatre, performance, music, poetry, mass media, and language.

Chc/Lat 63. Introduction to Chicano/Latino Studies III.**GE III and VII**

Examines contemporary public policy issues in Chicano/Latino communities. Each offering addresses at least three of the following themes: migration, immigrant incorporation, identity construction, language policy, health policy, politics, sexuality, gender, labor, class, and education.

Chc/Lat 64. Introduction to Race & Ethnicity.**GE III and VII**

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Examines major theories that attempt to explain the roles of race and ethnicity in U.S. politics. Same as Pol Sci 61A.

Chc/Lat 150. US Intervention in Latin America.

Honorable Mention

Explores political, economic, social, and cultural ties that bind Latin America to the United States. Focuses on U.S. intervention and Latin American response from early nineteenth century to present day. Case studies include Mexico, Guatemala, Cuba, Chile, and Central America. Same as Pol Sci 142J, Intl St 177D, History 166.

Chc/Lat 150A. Sex and Conquest in Latin America.

Honorable Mention

Competing ideas of masculinity and femininity, sexual violence, sexual identities, and gendered hierarchies informed how the Spanish engaged in military and religious domination of Mexican and Andean communities, as well as the forms of native resistance throughout colonial Latin America. Same as Anthro 140, Gen&Sex 171A, History 160.

Chc/Lat 152B. Community, Social Justice, and Health Equity Research for Action.

Honorable Mention

Focuses on community as a unit of identity, community, well-being, and social justice perspectives and initiatives to promote community health. Addresses community change and improvements in community well-being, with a focus on health equity research for action. Same as Pubhlth 115.

Prerequisite: Pubhlth 1 or Pubhlth 2 or Chc/Lat 61 or Chc/Lat 62 or Chc/Lat 63.

Chc/Lat 157. Cuban Society and Revolution.

Honorable Mention

Explores the causes, development, and legacy of the 1959 Revolution. Themes include economic dependency, democracy, race, gender, culture, and the always volatile relations between Cuba and the United States. Same as Pol Sci 153G, Intl St 177E, History 166C.

Chc/Lat 164A. Undocumented Immigrant Experiences.

GE III and VII

Examines the experiences of undocumented immigrants and the policies that structure their educational, economic, social, and political participation. Same as AsianAm 130, Crm/Law C187, Sociol 177C.

Chc/Lat 178A. Medical Anthropology.

GE VIII

Introduces students to cross-cultural perspectives and critical theories in anthropological studies of medicine. Special attention is given to diverse ways of understanding bodies, illnesses, and therapeutic practices in our changing world. Same as Anthro 134A.

Chc/Lat 183. Multicultural Education in K-12 Schools.

GE VII

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Provides a theoretical and empirical overview of educational issues affecting low-income immigrant and U.S. born minority student populations in an increasingly diverse and changing society. Same as Educ 124.

CRIMINOLOGY, LAW, AND SOCIETY

Crm/Law H80. The Properties of Property.

GE III

Develops an understanding and critique of private property. Draws from interdisciplinary sources to explore the foundations of private property, the institutions that support it over time, and possible alternatives to it.

Restrictions: Campuswide Honors Collegium students only.

Crm/Law C187. Undocumented Immigrant Experiences.

GE III and VII

Examines the experiences of undocumented immigrants and the policies that structure their educational, economic, social, and political participation. Same as AsianAm 130, Chc/Lat 164A, Sociol 177C.

EARTH SYSTEM SCIENCE

EarthSS 23. Air Pollution: From Urban Smog to Global Change. **GE II and (Va or VIII)**

Air pollution occurs on regional to global scales. A wide range of air pollution sources and physical, chemical, and meteorological sciences behind air pollution are introduced. The consequences of air pollution to our society are also discussed.

EarthSS 190CW. Global Sustainability.

GE Ib

Students attend weekly seminar to discuss current issues in global sustainability. Weekly attendance at Global Sustainability Forum also is required. Seminar utilized to analyze Forum presentations and to prepare senior research paper. Prepare/write research paper under direction of faculty member. Same as Bio Sci 191 CW, Sococol 186CW.

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EAS 120. Special Topics | Gender in Postwar Japan. **Honorable Mention**

EAS 170. Special Topics | Chinese Masculinities. **Honorable Mention**
Same as Gen&Sex 189.

ECONOMICS

Econ 169. Special Topics | Environ-Devenomics. **Honorable Mention**
Restriction: Economics Majors have first consideration for enrollment. Quantitative Economics Majors have first consideration for enrollment. Business Economics Majors have first consideration for enrollment.

Econ 169. Special Topics | Income Inequality. **Honorable Mention**
Restriction: Economics Majors have first consideration for enrollment. Quantitative Economics Majors have first consideration for enrollment. Business Economics Majors have first consideration for enrollment.

EDUCATION

Educ 50. Origins, Purposes, and Central Issues in K-12 Education. **Honorable Mention**
An introduction to the role of education in U.S. society and to central issues in K–12 education. Education is studied from four different perspectives: social, historical, philosophical, and political.

Restriction: Education Sciences Majors have first consideration for enrollment.

Educ 124. Multicultural Education in K-12 Schools. **GE VII**
Provides a theoretical and empirical overview of educational issues affecting low-income immigrant and U.S. born minority student populations in an increasingly diverse and changing society. Same as Chc/Lat 183.

Educ 140. Courts, Classrooms, and Controversies in Education Policy. **Honorable Mention**

Examines policies and laws defining the K-12 U.S. education system and the politics and controversies surrounding the political decision-making process at the federal, state, and local levels. Discusses original intent versus effects on organization of schools and educational equity.

Restriction: Education Sciences Majors have first consideration for enrollment.

Educ 142. American History and Education Policy: An Intimate Relationship. **Honorable Mention**

Examines the interplay between history, politics, and policy. Students examine the interactions between sociopolitical development and environmental contexts (e.g. familial, social, school, cultural) and contemplate the power of normative values in the formulation of education policy.

Restriction: Education Sciences Majors have first consideration for enrollment.

Educ 144. The American Charter School. **Honorable Mention**

Explores the legitimacy of the charter school as a viable educational reform movement. Critical themes include the role of choice and privatization in public education and charter schools as a vehicle for fulfilling the promise of educational equality.

Restriction: Education Sciences Majors have first consideration for enrollment.

Educ 146. Education, Learning, and Culture. **Honorable Mention**

Exploration of learning and development through a cultural lens, drawing from a range of research traditions and disciplines to broaden understandings of theories that inform teaching and learning in formal and informal settings.

Restriction: Education Sciences Majors only.

Educ 148. Complex Pedagogical Design. **Honorable Mention**

In this Cal Teach capstone course, students design lesson plans and complex instructional units, using approaches such as mathematics and science integration, problem-based instruction, project-based learning, technology, representations, scientific and mathematical analysis/modeling, authentic assessment, contextualization, and designing equitable learning environments.

Prerequisite: (PS 105 or BioL 101) and Educ 55 and Educ 143AW

Educ 130. Children's learning and Media. **Honorable Mention**

Examines how popular media may impact how young people learn, develop, and communicate by looking at research related to the impacts of a wide range of popular media including television, video games, digital environments, mobile devices, and other multimedia. Same as IN4MATX 164.

Restriction: Education Sciences majors only. Informatics Majors only. Informatics Minors only.

Educ 150. Changing the High School Experience.

Honorable Mention

Analysis of problems in high school education (e.g., student disengagement and underachievement of disadvantaged) and proposals for changing curriculum, instruction, and school organization. Students suggest own reforms and analyze effective/ineffective school practices.

Prerequisite: 1 unit of Educ 199.

Restriction: Education Sciences Majors have first consideration for enrollment.

CIVIL AND ENVIRONMENTAL ENGINEERING

Engrcee 40. Fundamentals of Economic Analysis for Scientists and Engineers. GE III

Introduction to microeconomics and cost benefit analysis. Integration of economic, social, and behavioral considerations into the engineering design process. Applications to contemporary problems via case studies.

ENGLISH

English 11. Society, Law, and Literature.

GE III or IV

Examines how works of literature represent and influence the relation between law and society. The primary readings will be works of literature, but selections of works of law, politics, and sociology may also be assigned.

From our current moment of political upheaval in which the very foundations of American democracy have been challenged, and roundly shaken, this class explores several topical areas through the study of law and literature together that are germane to understanding American constitutional democracy today: among them, public discourse in a time of misinformation; religious liberties; lying; violent rhetoric and violent acts; and reproductive rights and justice. In our explorations this quarter, we will read and write about Supreme Court cases, legal and philosophical thought, and works of fiction, both novels and short stories.

English 101W. Seminar in Critical Writing | *Women Alone in Writing.*

GE Ib

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In "Women Alone in Literature," we will examine the early 20th-century moment when women were fighting for legal rights and economic independence alongside increasing lesbian visibility, and reciprocal queer panic. We'll consider these questions through two major British modernists, reading Virginia Woolf's speech/ essay "A Room of One's Own," and E. M. Forster's novel *Howards End*, both of which meditate on women's property ownership. In addition to historical context for these two texts, as well as movement categorizations like "Modernism," we will discuss relevant interpersonal drama between the two queer Bloomsbury Group members.

Prerequisite: Three courses selected from English 8, English 9, English 10, English 11, English 12, English 15, English 16, English 17; or LIT JRN 20 and LIT JRN 21 and one course selected from the above list. Satisfactory completion of the Lower-Division Writing requirement.

Restriction: Upper-division students only. English Majors have first consideration for enrollment.

English 102C. Special Topics | Asian American Literature and Critique.

Honorable Mention

This course will introduce students to some key topics, theories, and texts in Asian American literary and cultural criticism, as well as research methodologies. We will begin with institutional history, taking a look at the origins of the Asian American movement in Bay Area radical politics and, later, its developments through New Communist Movement circuits and institutionalization in Asian American studies programs and departments (including the protests that led to UCI's department). We will then track key cultural documents and statements from this inaugural insurgent period that continue to shape how Asian American literary and cultural studies are practiced, as well as how Asian American cultural politics beyond the academy have unfolded. The back half of the course will jump forward in time to look at two ways in which Asian American politics, geography, and cultural production have transformed since the 1990s: the emergence of Asian America in "mainstream" discourses and social formations, the difference Asia's geopolitical "rise" has made. We will approach this conjuncture, which we might call the "Asian American contemporary," through the lens of genre: science fiction in particular.

FILM AND MEDIA

Film&Mda 130. Special Topics | Asian American Documentary.

Honorable Mention

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We begin with the elements and evolution of documentary film language and genres in the United States as a foundation for understanding how Asian American media artists utilize mediums of film and video toward particular communication goals.

We will also trace movements of documentary subjects and techniques in the context of American Americans' historical exclusions, racialized representations, and social roles in nonfiction films. As we view a range of works by and about Asian Americans, we will consider how various makers engage strategies for production style and content, audience engagement, subjectivity, emotional truth in evolving environments of technology and access, social movements, ethnic notions. Students will pose their critical understanding of documentary film operations and social meaning to the considerations and challenges a producer faces to develop a documentary film.

Prerequisite: Satisfactory completion of the Lower-Division Writing requirement.

FIm&Mda 145. Popular Culture and Media | Latin Media & Pop Honorable Mention

This course examines the presence and participation of Latinxs in U.S. media and popular culture from both a historical and contemporary perspective. By examining Latinx participation in radio, film, television, new media, and popular culture, this course will provide a general survey of Latinx media in the U.S. We will examine the production, representations and cultural meaning of Latinxs in media and reflect on the impact of Latinx media production on identity formation. Special attention will be paid to the intertwined questions of race, ethnicity, gender, sexuality, language, class, and politics.

Prerequisite: FIm&Mda 85A. Satisfactory completion of the Lower-Division Writing Requirement.

FIm&Mda 145. Special Topics in Interdisciplinary Studies | Black TV Comedy. Honorable Mention

GAME DESIGN AND INTERACTIVE MEDIA

GDIM 41. Games and Society.

GE III

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The study and critical analysis of computer games as art objects, cultural artifacts, gateways to virtual worlds, educational aids, and tools for persuasion and social change. Emphasis on understanding games in their historical and cultural context. Materials fee. Same as I&CS 60.

Restriction: Computer Game Science Majors have first consideration for enrollment. Game Design and Interactive Media students have first consideration for enrollment. School of ICS majors have second right of consideration.

GENDER & SEXUALITY STUDIES

Gen&Sex 50C. Gender & Popular Culture.

GE IV and VII

In this introductory course, students will gain an understanding of how popular culture functions as one of the many sites through which gender identities are constructed and interrogated. Students will read and engage with feminist scholarship on music, television, film, fashion, and social media. They will gain a critical vocabulary that will enable them to make sense of how and why popular culture is inescapably political. Moreover, the course will not just examine representation for its own sake, but will pay attention to the institutions and processes that enable visibility in mainstream culture, including record labels, advertising agencies, and social media platforms.

Gen&Sex 100B. Feminist Theory.

Honorable Mention

Introduction to historical traditions in theory and various conceptual frameworks informing scholarship in gender studies, sexuality studies, and women's studies as a field of critical inquiry.

Gen&Sex 157. Special Topics | Blackness as Gender.

GE IV

Important themes in U.S. history in the twentieth and early twenty-first centuries. Topics include corporate capitalism, empire, immigration, race, gender, consumer society, World Wars, Progressiveness, New Deal, Great Society, civil rights, women's movements, Vietnam War, conservative politics, and economic stratification.

Prerequisite: Satisfaction of the UC Entry Level Writing Requirement.

History 70C. Problems in History: United States | US Labor History.

GE IV

An introduction to the historical problems, the issues of interpretation, the primary sources, and the historical scholarship of the history of the United States, with an emphasis on developing skills in historical essay-writing.

History 100W. Special Topics | Oil & Capitalism.

GE Ib

Philos 163. Social Epistemology.**Honorable Mention**

Sociol 62. Families and Intimate Relations.**GE III**

Sociological theories/research on marriage, kinship, intimacy, and divorce. Emphasis on comparing family patterns in different social classes, ethnic groups, and societies, and on relating family life to the economy and other social institutions. Topics include gender roles, child-rearing, historical change. Materials fee.

Sociol 152W. Global Peace.**GE Ib**

Why do countries fight wars? Will world peace ever be possible? Focuses on social structures that might lead to global peace, with an emphasis on the role of culture and narrative in bringing peace locally, nationally, and globally.

Sociol 173W. Social Inequality.**GE Ib**

Sources, functions, and dynamics of the unequal distribution of wealth, prestige, knowledge, and power in American and other societies.

Restriction: Upper-division students only.

Sociol 174. Protests, Movements, and Revolutions.

Honorable Mention

A survey of models of collective action drawn from sociology, economics, psychology, and political science. Focus on areas such as social movements, strikes, crowd psychology, cults, fads, fashions, public opinion, and symbolic and mythical elements in collective culture. Same as Pol Sci 156D.

Prerequisite: Sociol 1 or Pol Sci 11A or Econ 1.

Sociol 177C. Undocumented Immigrant Experiences.

GE III and VII

GE IV and VIII

UPPP 100. Special Topics | Cities and Climate Change.

Honorable Mention

UPPP 18. Cities and Transportation.

Honorable Mention

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The relationship between urban areas and transportation systems. Economic analysis of cities, transportation and urban form, highway congestion, environmental impacts of transportation, public transit, land use and transportation, and political influences on transportation planning.

UPPP 109 Housing and Urban Development Policy.

Honorable Mention

Surveys public policy issues and develops analytic techniques in the areas of housing and urban development. Examines a range of policy topics including housing assistance to low- and moderate-income families, housing finance system, incentives for economic development, and neighborhood preservation.

Recommended Prerequisite: Previous course work in economics.

UPPP 115. Global Poverty and Inequality in the 21st Century.

Honorable Mention

Explores a multidisciplinary understanding of poverty and inequality in the 21st century and assesses impact of education, health, technology, and other interventions. Course offered online only. Same as Intl St 115.

UPPP 117. Environmental Justice.

Honorable Mention

Engages students to critically analyze and evaluate environmental problems, environmental responses, and planning and policy debates regarding "environmental justice" - essentially the race, class, and equity implications of environmental problems and policies.

UPPP 170. Health Policy.

Honorable Mention

Considers social and economic aspects of health and disease in the United States. What are the proper roles of the individual, community, and government in improving health and health care? International comparisons will be made wherever possible. Same as PubHlth 122.
