I. TEEN PREGNANCY PREVENTION PROGRAMS (TPP)

[The Teen Pregnancy Prevention Program](#), administered by the Office of Adolescent Health (OAH), is *defined* as an “*evidence-based*”^{*} grant program which funds comprehensive sex education programs for children aged 10 to 19.

II. ADOLESCENT PREGNANCY PREVENTION PROGRAMS (APP)

[Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention Programs](#), administered by the Family and Youth Services Bureau (FYSB), provide grants for sex education programs that are sometimes called “abstinence plus” programs which focus on [“both abstinence and contraception.”](#) [“emphasize risk avoidance](#) teaching youth to voluntarily refrain from non-marital sexual activity,” and “abstinence education and mentoring to [promote abstinence.](#)”

WARNING: While grant requirements may state that *curricula/programs* are to “**promote abstinence**” and “**emphasize risk avoidance**” in order to receive funding, content analyses show that [many programs normalize teen sex, encourage sexual pleasure-seeking, condone early sexual debut and promote high-risk sexual behaviors rather than promote abstinence.](#) [Read more...](#)
