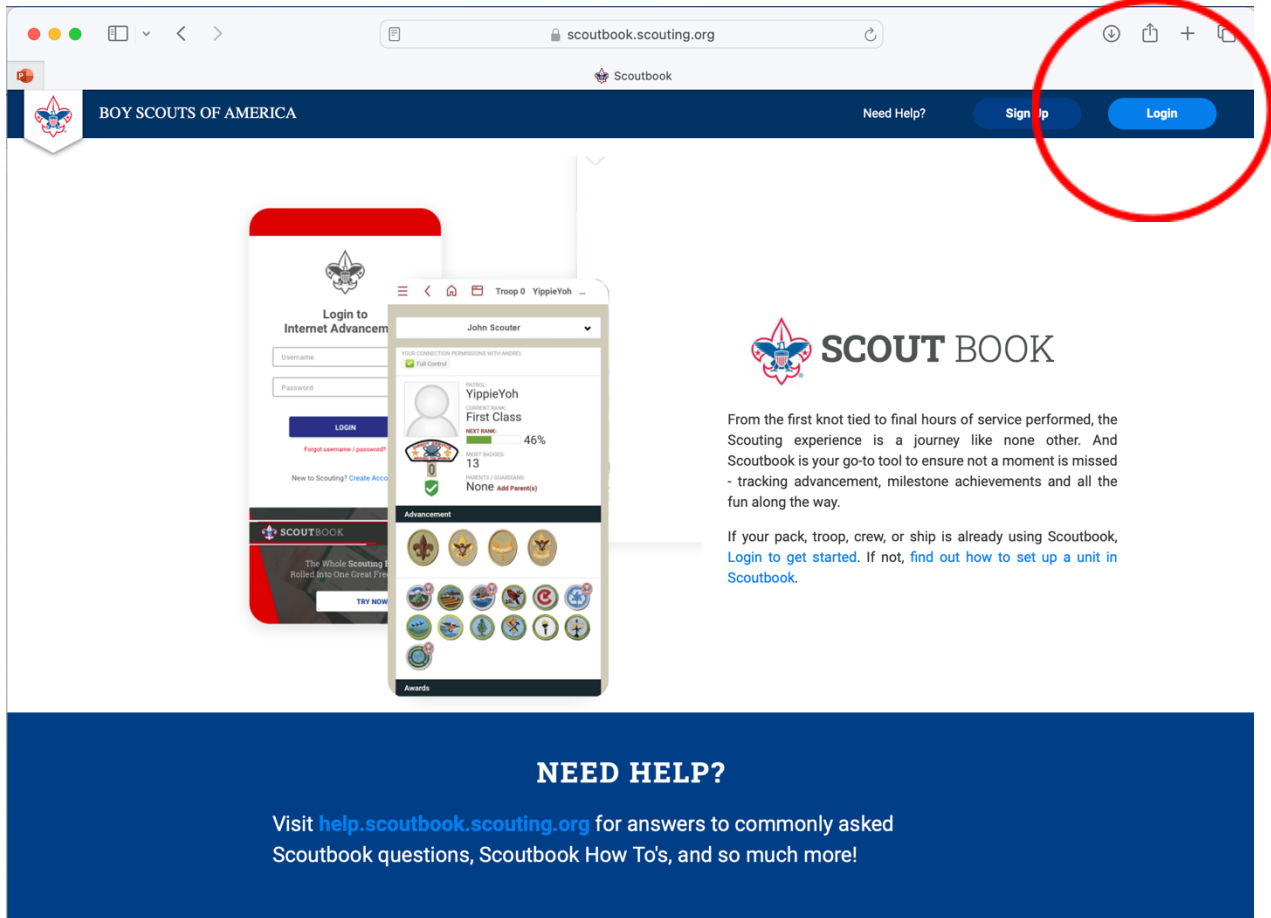

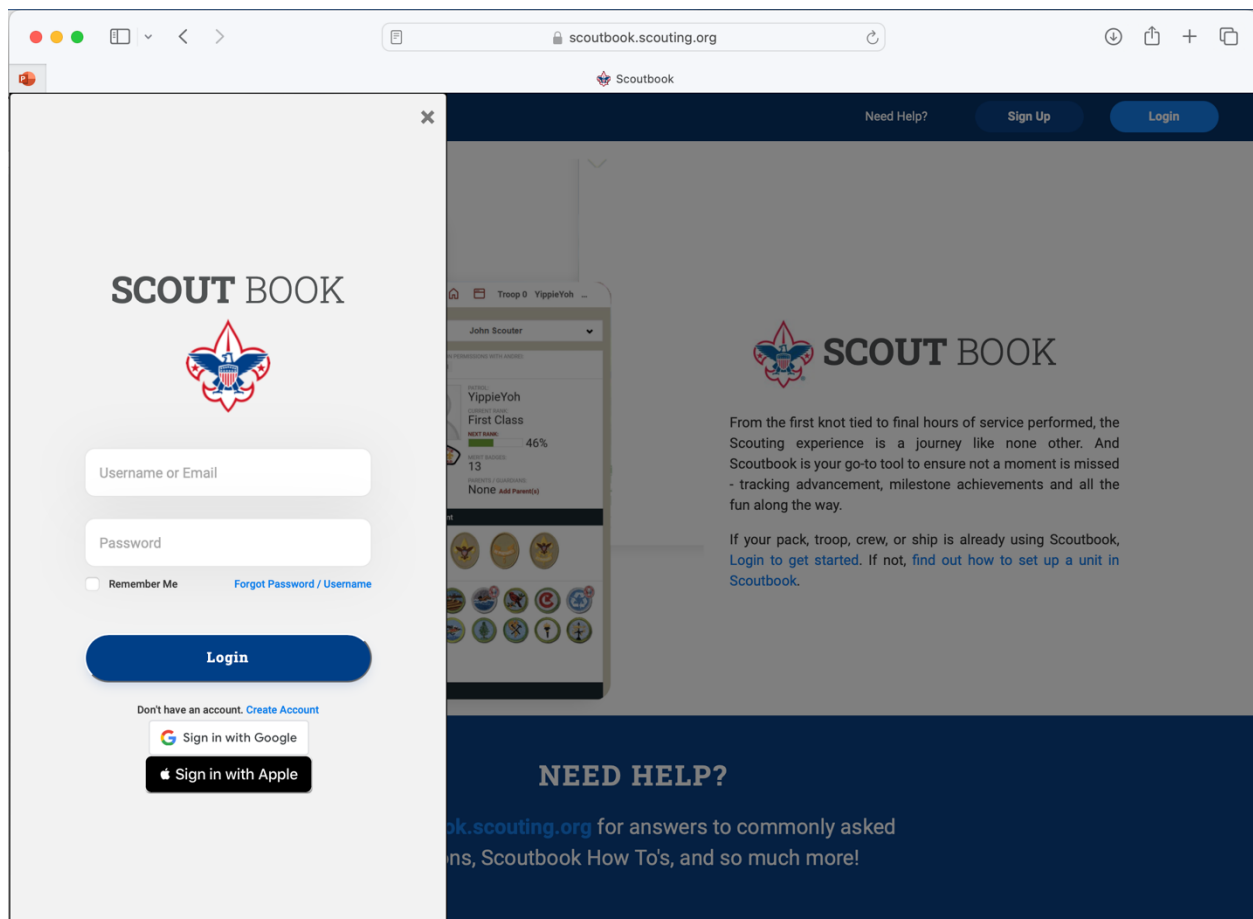

Each individual person has their own scouting account. When you sign your child up for scouting, BSA automatically creates an account for you as well (the parent/guardian that signed up the scout). Scoutbook then sends

an email to you, asking you to connect your (adult) account with your scout's account, so you can enter awards that have been earned, administer the account, etc.

Can't log in?

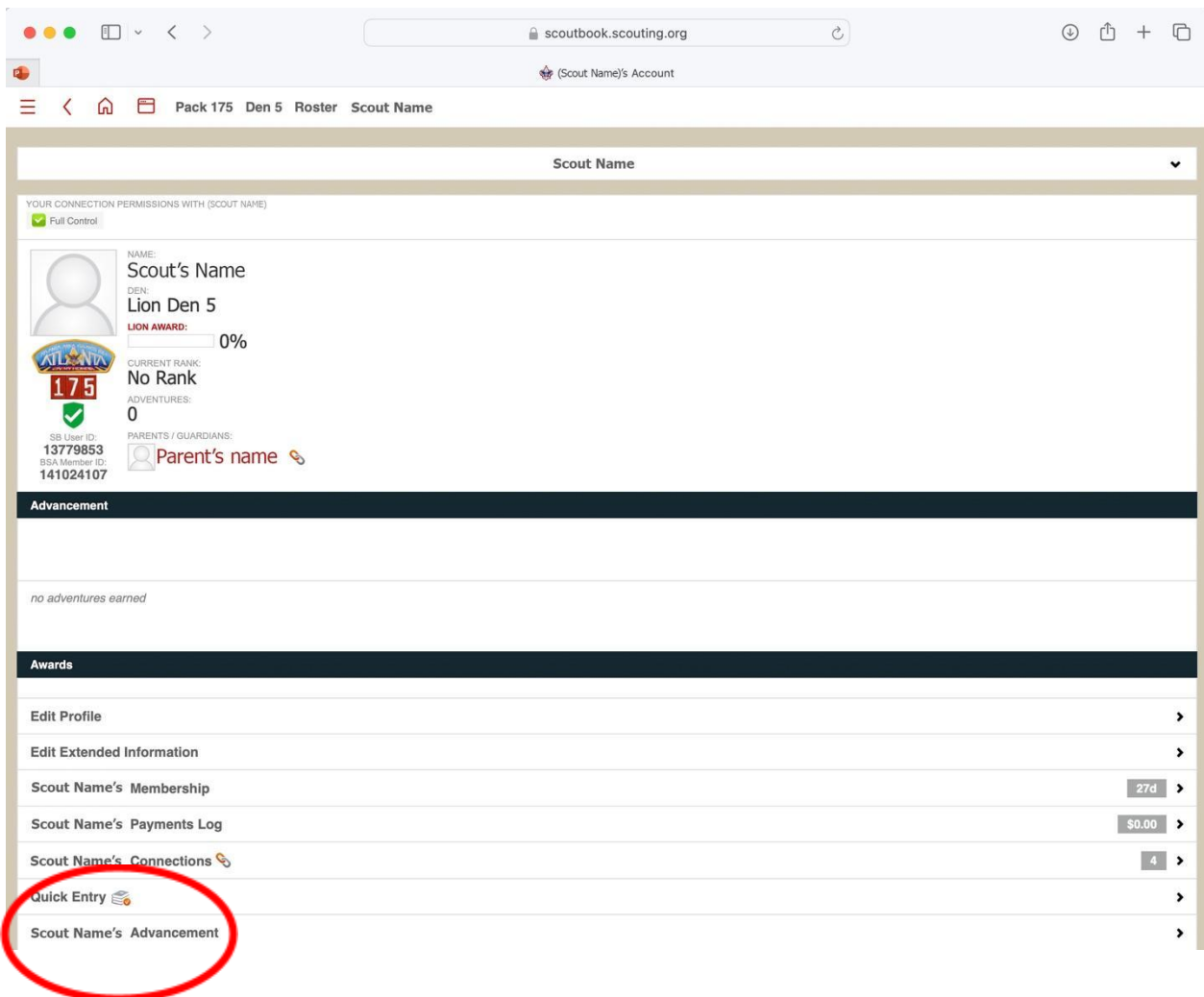
If you cannot access your account, please try “Forgot Password / Username” or let the Cubmaster know and they can have Scoutbook resend the invitation to connect your accounts. After logging in, click on your scout, which should be listed under “My Family”:

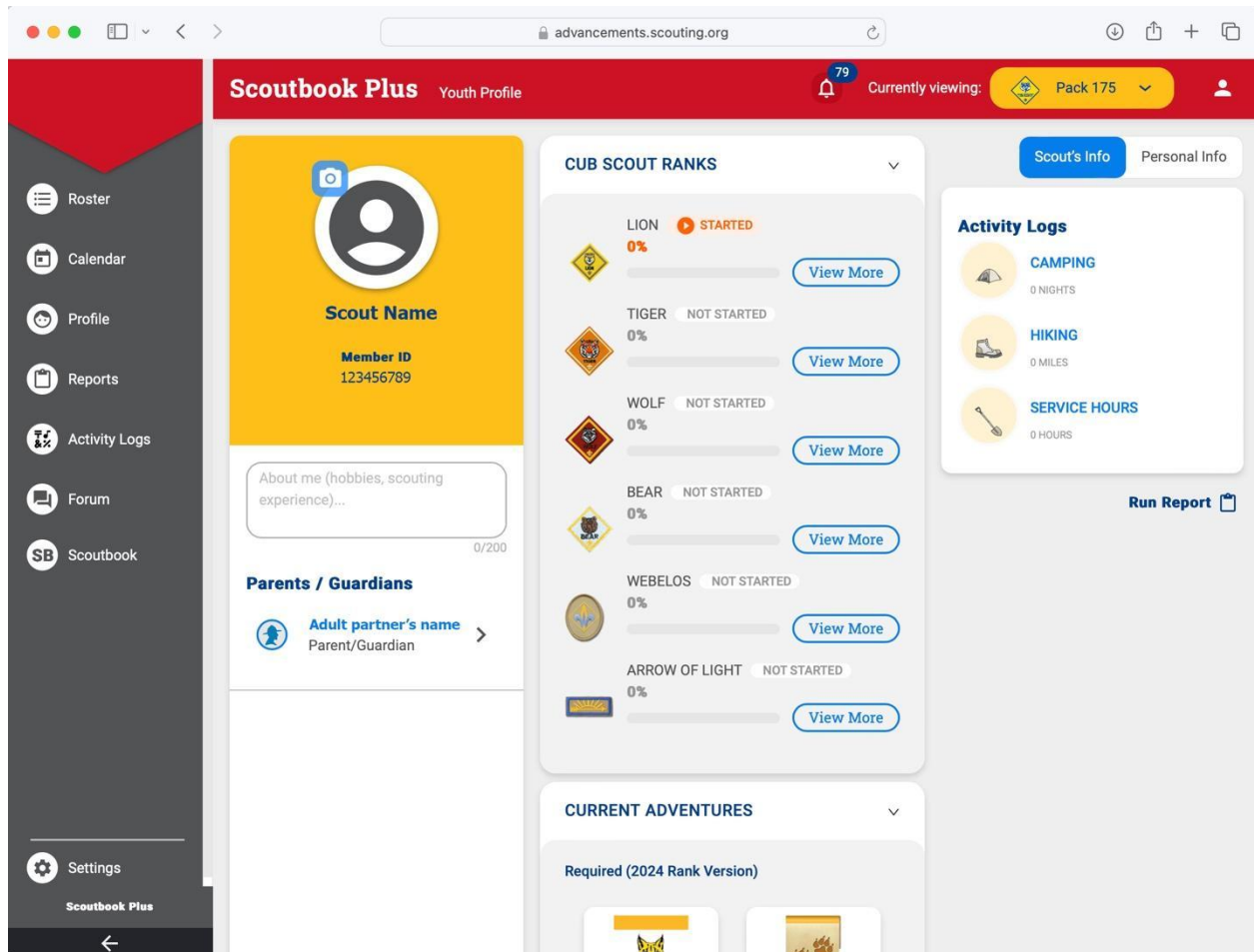


Scroll down, and click on “(Your scout name)’s Advancement”:



You will now be transferred to “Scoutbook Plus”

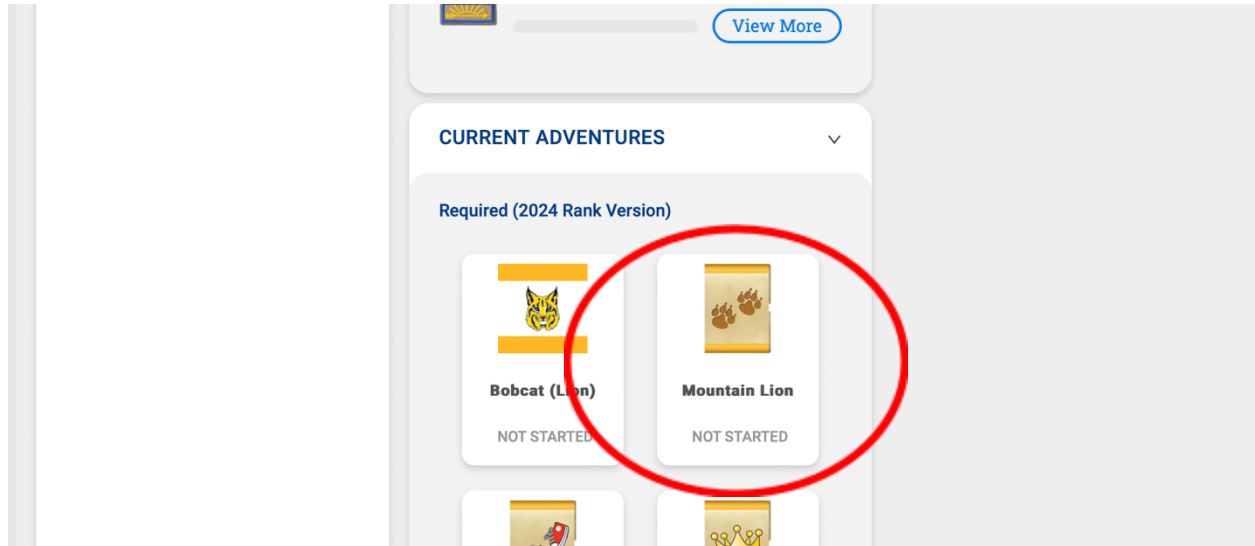
When you complete individual requirements, a full adventure, hike, campout, or service hours, enter it here.



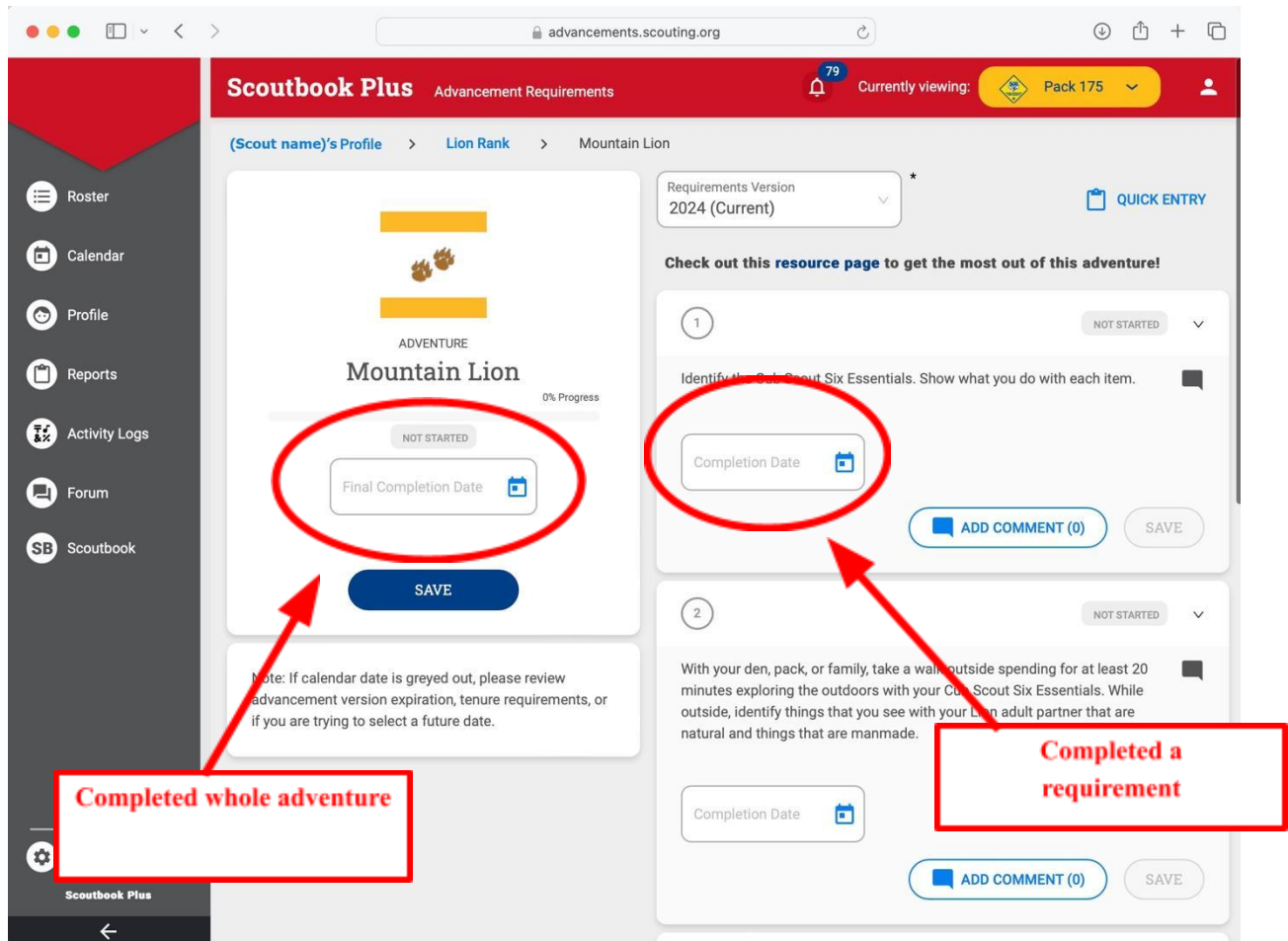
Scoutbook is transitioning to Scoutbook plus, hence why it looks like two different websites. Some things are still done in Scoutbook, some are now done in Scoutbook plus. (Sorry for the confusion.)

On your scout's Scoutbook Plus page, you can input and track your scout's advancement. You can also track the hikes, camping, and service hours they've completed during scouting-related events.

Scroll down to “Current Adventures” and click on the adventure you wish to mark as completed (or partially completed):



Add the date of completion for the whole adventure (on the left) or for one or more requirements within the adventure (on the right):



Your den leader or the Cubmaster will then “approve” the completions.
(This happens occasionally, about once per week.)

Remember, for all requirements:

- You - the adult partner - get to decide when your scout completes each requirement.
- Once a scout has completed the requirements and it has been entered, can not be undone or taken away from the scout, nor does it have to be re-earned for any reason.
- In our pack, we suggest requirements do not need to be done exactly per the wording of the requirement, but rather the requirement should

be interpreted more loosely to best help the scout understand the lesson/takeaway in a way that is fun and engaging, and help the scouts be successful.

- Assume each requirement always has “do your best to...” in front of it. The goal is to do what we can to the best of our abilities, not to complete the requirements perfectly. Requirements may need to be re-interpreted based on your scout’s individual needs.
- Requirements are designed to be age appropriate, and parents/adults should be careful to not re-interpret them in ways that push any scouts beyond their abilities or in ways that they will not be successful and have fun.
