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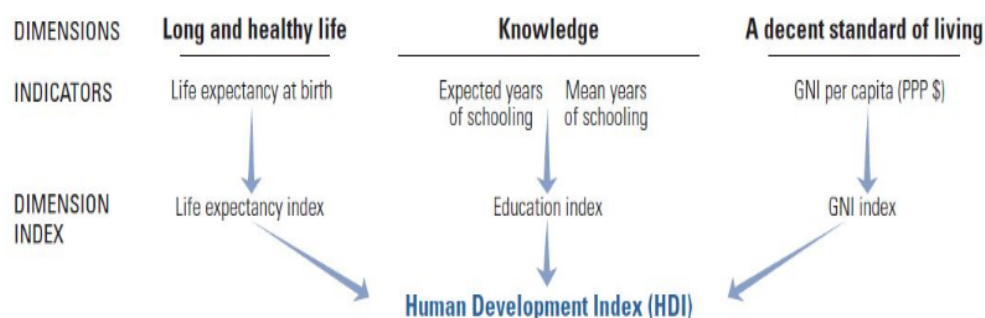


Fig. 1. *The structure of the Human Development Index (HDI),*
