

Moral Dilemma: Wealth and Legal Representation

4. If you were Steve, how would you feel about the fairness of your trial?
5. If you were Alex, would you voluntarily limit your legal resources to ensure fairness for Steve?
6. As a leader, how would you explain this decision to the general public, especially to the Americans who aren't rich, how these trials are fair?
