Love one another, laying down our lives for each other

Sermon on April 3; work on this lesson March 28-April 2; meet with your growth group to discuss April 3-9

Lesson 10 - 1 John 3:19-24

Confidence as a child of God comes as you believe in Christ, obey Him and love others

Sermon on April 10; work on this lesson April 4-9; meet with your growth group to discuss April 10-16

Teaching Goal: Loving others in deed and truth and believing in Jesus gives us confidence in our relationship with God.

Application Goal: Pray confidently because you are in God and He is in you, as evidenced by your belief in Jesus and your love for others.

Launching Question

How does your level of confidence in your relationship with God affect your prayer life?

1 John 3:19-24

1. Make as many observations as you can from this section and write down any questions you think of from this section. This will help you to further observe the passage as you seek to answer your questions from the passage. It's okay if you cannot answer all of the questions you come up with. Write down some of your favorite observations and questions to share with your group.

1 John 3:18-19

2. 1 John 3:19 says, "By this we shall know that we are of the truth and reassure (better translation might be "persuade" or "convince") our heart before him..." From the context, what is this verse referring to that convinces us we are of the truth?

1 John 3:20

- 1 John 3:20 could be interpreted one of several different ways. The verse says, "For whenever our heart condemns us (or convicts us), God is greater than our heart, and he knows everything." Here are a couple of the options:
 - From verse 19 we know that we persuade and convince our hearts that we are of the truth and are in God when we are loving others in deed and truth. So, whenever our hearts condemn us, we trust what God says about us and what He has done for us in Christ rather than trusting our own hearts. After all, God knows everything! He knows our ups and downs and is greater than us. He is faithful to cleanse us because of Christ's blood.

Daniel Akin writes in the Christ-Centered Exposition commentary, "Even though Christ has propitiated all our sins by His perfect atoning work, we may experience a condemning heart or guilty conscience, something the great and omnipotent God does not want us to have. So when my conscience sends me on a guilt trip, I look in faith to the God who is greater than my vacillating heart and who assures me of my total and complete forgiveness through the perfect work of Jesus" (Exalting Jesus in 1, 2, & 3 John, p. 84).

When we don't want to love others in deed and truth because it is hard and costly, or when we are tempted to hate others, then our hearts are condemning us. However, God is greater than our hearts. He is perfectly able to love the downtrodden and broken sinner. He knows all things. In this sense, the verse is saying when your heart is condemning you because you don't want to love others, you should repent and trust God because He is greater.

From the Pillar Commentary: "In summary, verses 19-20 function as a stern warning against that meanness of heart which objects to our expending material resources to meet the needs of fellow believers, and provide a foil for the positive reinforcement of generosity offered in verses 21-22" (Kruse, Colin G. <u>The Letters of John</u>, p. 141).

Week 2: Making time to learn from Jesus and to love others

We have to learn to make time for the important things in life. We need to take time to be thankful and to appreciate God and His good gifts. We need to make time to gather with God's people. We need to make time to rest. We need to make time to take in God's Word and talk to God. We need to make time to speak of Christ with others and to serve them.

Teaching Goal: Understand that the Holy Spirit will always lead you to confess that Jesus came in the flesh. **Application Goal:** Reject false testimony that rejects Jesus and hold fast to the true testimony about Jesus from the Holy Spirit.

Launching Question

What false messages do you see promoted the most in our culture in 2022?

1 John 4:1-6

Application Goal: Believe in the Son of God and share in the life of God!

"The Spirit, the water and the blood"

"Some have pointed out that, being sinless, Jesus had no need of being baptized. He does not belong there. And that is true. He no more belongs at a baptism for repentance than He does on a cross for sinners. In both events He identifies Himself with the sinners He came to save. Our Lord's baptism says, 'Look at the Holy Spirit of God descending on Him and anointing Him.' It says, 'Listen to the voice of the Father and His announcement concerning Him.' Jesus was not a mere man. He is the Son of God who is the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world (John 1:29)." (Akin, Daniel. Christ-Centered Exposition: Exalting Jesus in 1, 2 & 3 John, p.131.)

The Spirit testifies to who Jesus is as He moves the Biblical writers to record the truth about who Jesus is and what He did. The Spirit testifies in the hearts of all who believe, illuminating our hearts, giving us understanding and conviction about who Jesus is and what He did *for us*. As the quote above from Akin says, the water points to Jesus' baptism and to His ministry that was initiated at His baptism. The blood is the witness that the false teachers of John's time were denying the most. A false teacher named Cerinthus claimed that Christ's spirit left him before Jesus died, thus denying that the Messiah actually died for our sins (MacArthur Study Bible, 1 John introduction notes). John is refuting that false teaching. Jesus willingly laid down His life (John 10:18). God in the flesh, God the Son, died on the cross, fully bearing the wrath of God the Father (1 John 2:2).

We have these three witnesses powerfully declaring that Jesus of Nazareth is the Christ, the Son of God, the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world. The Holy Spirit, Christ's baptism and His death on the cross all declare to us that this is the One in whom we should place all of our faith!

6. What is the sin that leads to death that John is talking about? Consider the context of John and what he has taught us so far about spiritual death.

"Sin that leads to death"

1 John 5:16-17 teaches us about praying for fellow Christians who commit "sins that do not lead to death." What kind of death is he talking about? Physical death or spiritual death? It seems like spiritual death, separation from God, is the focus here. What is this sin that John is referring to that does not lead to spiritual death? And what is the sin that leads to death? We know from Romans 6:23 that "the wages of sin is death." All sin brings death. So John must not be saying there are some sins that do not require forgiveness or that, if left unforgiven, would not lead to death. That would contradict the rest of Scripture. The only way someone avoids spiritual death is to believe in the Son of God so that he or she might have life (1 John 5:13).

From the context of the book of 1 John, we know that true children of God will confess their sins and will practice obedience and love for other Christians. They do not abide in death, but rather they abide in life. Here we see that one of the means God uses is intercessory prayer. When we see other Christians sinning, we know it is God's will to help them to confess that sin and to turn from it. We pray for them, trusting that their sin will not lead them to death. Christ has taken the wrath of God for them and has forgiven them!

What is the sin that leads to death? It is the sin of continually rejecting Christ. This heart of rejecting Christ is shown in a life of practicing sin, hating Christians, and not believing the truth about Christ. Daniel Akin writes that the sin that leads to death is "total rejection of the gospel and Christ. This is the sin of the false teachers who willfully and habitually oppose the witness of God concerning the person and the work of His Son, Jesus Christ (cf. 1 John 2:19). This one is not called a brother. He is an apostate." (Christ-Centered Exposition - Exalting Jesus in 1, 2 & 3 John. p.144.)

It seems that this sin that leads to death that John is saying he is not telling them to pray for is the sin of the antichrist, the false teacher. This one is condemned. As Jude 13 says, these are the ones "for whom the gloom of utter darkness has been reserved forever." Jesus talked about a sin that is not going to be forgiven in Matthew 12:31-32, which is blasphemy against the Holy Spirit.

If you are willing to repent and trust in Jesus, confessing Him as Lord, then you are not guilty of the sin that leads to death and is not going to be forgiven. If you are following the spirit of the antichrist, denying Christ and leading others astray with your false teaching, then it is very possible that you are already condemned.

when we have an important ministry to each other - when we see our brothers or sisters in Christ sinning, we should pray for them!

Launching Question

Quote from Daniel Akin, Christ-Centered Exposition - Exalting Jesus in 1, 2 & 3 John, p. 146: "Jesus, by His work on the cross, obtained my salvation. Now, by His work in heaven, He maintains my salvation (cf. Hebrews 7:25). Jesus Christ, the eternally begotten of God, protects me and keeps me safe. Therefore, ... 'the evil one does not touch' me. The word 'touch' has the idea of grabbing hold of something with the intent to harm. Alexander Ramsay says, 'He is well kept whom Christ keeps; the enemy of souls cannot lay hold of him: he assaults him but cannot seize' (quoted in Vaughan, 1, 2, 3 John, 134). Satan may grab at us and tempt us through doubt, friends who fall away, idols, fleshly enticements, and worldly allurements, but because of the power of Christ he cannot get us. There again is a beautiful logic in this verse. The Devil does not touch the Christian and harm him in any ultimate sense because he is protected by the Son. And because the Son keeps the believer safe, he cannot persist in or continually practice sin. It is contrary to his nature. It is contrary to his Protector."
