

Intimate Care Policy

- Practitioners will ensure privacy of a child is maintained at all times. Child will be changed in toilet cubicle with change box or in the visitor toilet, should staff member require sink facilities
- Parents will ensure their child has a change of clothes in their bag
- Practitioners will follow best practice using correct guidelines;
 - Infection control
 - Nappy changing
 - Health and Social Care Standards
 - Managing medication in day care of children
 - Rights of a child
- Practitioner will be aware of any skin sensitivities a child may have
- Practitioner will encourage child to wipe with wipe (if appropriate). Practitioner must explain and ask child should they need to support child with wipe
- Practitioner will be aware of specific toilet care plan a child may have
- Reassurance will be given at all times
- Practitioner will encourage child to change clothes, support will always be offered
- Should a child refuse help, and unable to change own clothes, parent will be contacted to support and change child. Practitioner will sit with child offering reassurance.
- All soiled clothes will be placed in a bag on child's peg
- On collection, parents will be advised that their child was wet/soiled during the session and a fresh set of clothes will be required
