

The Winesett Awards open in the Spring Semester.

Projects completed by Radford University students from Spring 2024 through Fall 2024 are eligible, as well as draft projects underway in the Spring 2025 semester.

Applications must include:

1. A draft or final version of your research project, in Word, PowerPoint, or PDF format. The project must include a bibliography of sources used in its creation.
2. An essay describing the following related to your research project:
 - Research strategies
 - Use of any library services and resources
 - Evidence of personal learning and development of your research skills.

This essay is given the greatest weight in the judging process, see criteria below. Essay should be between 400 and 600 words.

3. [A Statement of Support](#) completed by your class instructor. This is a separate form your instructor must fill out in order for your application to be considered complete.

Please do not submit any other materials, such as portfolios or sources.

Selection Criteria

A panel composed of librarians/library staff, teaching faculty from different colleges, and (if available) a student advisory board member will judge entries based on how well they demonstrate the following:

- Originality, depth, breadth, or sophistication in the use of library collections
- Exceptional ability to select, evaluate, and synthesize library resources and successfully use them in the creation of a project or paper
- Evidence of personal learning and development of research skills

The essay describing your research techniques will be given the most weight in the judging process.

Rubric for Judging Library Research Award Applications

The objective of the awards is to recognize creative and original library research. Winning papers/projects should illustrate exemplary use of Radford University Libraries tools and resources and development of information-gathering skills.

The selection committee will review your paper/project as though it were an assignment for a course. Although this part of the submission is weighted less than your essay, it is important that the submission itself is a strong example of academic achievement.

Expectations for achievement will be commensurate with the applicant's class year and the requirements of the discipline.
