## **Mini-dictionary**

to keep a record = to keep a written list of details to come by = to visit somebody in an informal way a lock of hair = a piece of hair which has been cut from your head to go clear: the meaning of this expression is ambiguous. Some interpretations of this expressions are to tell the truth, to disappear, to escape. In interviews, Leonard Cohen himself admits that the expression is ambiguous. to meet the train = to go to the train station to meet a person who is arriving by train Lili Marlene = the name of a famous song from World War One. Lili Marlene was the love of a German soldier. a flake = a little piece to stand in somebody's way = to obstruct somebody for good = for ever, permanently **Task 2:** Use the mini-dictionary above to help you to interpret the song.
