The brainchild of the ingenious and complex mind of Brianna Remeika, the short play is written specifically for the One Act Festival, a two-day event over March 10th and 11th. The tale follows several kids with illnesses, ranging from cancer to mental illnesses, as they attempt to heal via a self help group. Erica Gosselin, a 9th grade math teacher, got into a car accident during her junior year of college. This is her story.

Q: What do you remember from during the accident?

A: I don't remember the accident actually happening; what I remember is seeming to wake up. I was lying on my back on the ground, and I remember thinking, "Why am I on the ground, outside of the car? What just happened?" So, I remember coming to, the feeling of waking up, and it seemed like a nightmare, you know? Because I'm lying on the ground, and I'm looking at the bottom of the car, and I'm staring at my feet. I was folded in half with the weight of the car resting on me. So, if you can imagine, I'm lying there, and it was really cold, I'm lying on the cold, wet ground, staring at my feet and realizing that I'm folded in half under the car. It seemed like slow motion, and I remember thinking, "Okay... I've been in an accident. What about the people who were in the front of the car? Where are they, and how am I going to get help?" This all happened in the middle of the night on a country road. I just woke up and seemed to find myself in the middle of a nightmare. The fear was almost more than I could bear. I remember being really, really fearful that I was going to lie there and just die. I didn't hear my friends; I was with my boyfriend at the time and his sister, who was driving, and I couldn't see them or hear them. For all I knew, they were hurt as well. I just remember being extremely afraid.
