What did you like about the readings? (100-200 words)

Discuss <u>AT LEAST</u> two (2) specific things you liked about the readings. <u>Be sure to include direct quotations and page numbers for reference</u>. What stood out to you in these readings? What was understandable and interesting, and what did you learn in these readings?

What did you not like about the readings? (100-200 words)

Discuss <u>AT LEAST</u> two (2) specific things you did not like or understand about the readings. <u>Be sure to include direct quotations and page numbers for reference</u>. What was confusing or unclear? What didn't work for you? What did you disagree with? After finishing the readings, what questions were you left with?

How are the readings related? (100-200 words)

Discuss <u>AT LEAST</u> two (2) specific ways in which the readings intersect with one another. <u>Be sure to include direct quotations and page numbers for reference</u>. Do your best to find the similarities/differences between your readings, as well as any previous readings discussed in class.

What Will You Take Away From Today's Readings? (100-200 words)

List <u>AT LEAST</u> two (2) things you learned from the readings and how and why you plan to introduce these new concepts into your creative writing. <u>If you include direct quotations from the text, be sure to include page numbers for reference</u>

Questions for Discussion:

List <u>AT LEAST</u> two(2) questions for class discussion here. Since these questions are intended to foster discussion in class, <u>do not</u> compose closed questions (i.e. questions that can simply be answered by a 'yes' or 'no'). Instead, strive for open questions that will foster discussion (example: What does Moore mean stating that essays should be 'personal' and not 'private?')
