

At this year's AGM, the ARANZ Council will seek the approval of members to increase the association's membership fees. The last change to membership fees occurred in 2020 when fees were raised from \$55 to \$60 for an individual membership, and before that no change had been made since 2011. The changes to membership fees will ensure that ARANZ is able to continue working on behalf of its members in a sustainable way, and to enhance our existing activities.

Here is the proposed fee structure:
