14:13:36 Yeah, we won't talk about that, but. I mean, so, but, we could, we can relate on some stuff.

14:13:59 Wow!

14:13:45 So anyhow, but, you know, I've been thinking about doing this podcast for, few years and whenever I thought of you know who were some interesting people I could interview I thought oh I have to I should interview Maya just I should see if she would if she will do an interview with me I could do not I thought about that yeah because I thought your job was, you know, cool and every time you shared something new with your

14:14:04 voice, I thought I would listen to it and sometimes I'd share it or whatever. So, but yeah, but it was just it's kind of I was excited for you was exciting.

14:14:18 Face to face. On Zoom. And, so anyway, so you are a voiceover artist.

14:14:27 Is that how you identify yourself? Okay.

14:14:26 I am. Oh, I say voiceover artist. I say voice actor. I still act with my face and my body too.

14:14:35 But voiceover I can do from home, which is pretty nice.

14:14:46 Yeah.

14:14:38 Yes. And you know, for the listeners, I'll just, so my is in our closet and I'm in, I'm in the corner of a room because my, she has better sound than me.

14:14:49 Because she's in her Bye.

14:14:50 I do. I also have more audio equipment. It's very fancy.

14:14:54 Yes, yes, I mean my you know the mic I just bought at Best Buy, you know, so that's how that works but anyhow It's a blue Yeti.

14:15:01 Well, Mike, is it? What you got there? Yeah, it is. That's everyone's starter, Mike. It's great.

14:15:06 I know. Yep.

14:15:07 People hate on the Yeti, but like. You know, parts of, okay, we're, we're going to crack into video games this early.

14:15:13 That's okay, that's okay.

14:15:13 I didn't think I was going to start here. The the Final Fantasy 7 remaster and Hades both had large parts of voiceover recorded on the Yeti because they were due to finished recording in 2,020 planning on being in studio and they couldn't be.

14:15:25 Oh.

14:15:27 So they were shipping those mics out and with that microphone and a treated space you can do just fine people get so judgey.

14:15:35 And well, also they I think they look the coolest because you can get them in different colors and they look like an old school microphone.

14:15:38 Do.

14:15:41 Oh yeah, yeah, I love the old silhouette.

14:15:46 No, it's for you. It's for your enjoyment. Yeah.

14:15:41 So. That was I was I was into the aesthetic even though this isn't a video podcast, but you know from for my desk.

14:15:53 A wave cut here too! Oh, that's why we get along. Cool.

14:15:51 It looks cool on my desk with all my notes and cat hair and stuff. So anyway. Okay. Yeah, I see some on my laptop right now, actually.

14:16:00 So anyhow, so your voiceover artist, how did how did you become a voiceover artist? You didn't go back as far as you want.

14:16:07 Oh, we have to go back. Hello, I've acted forever. And I moved to New York with very little money in a suitcase like many of us do.

14:16:19 And I auditioned for a lot of theater and eventually started to audition for a little bit of film and TV and once in a while on backstage I'd see something for voiceover and like I'm a big sci-fi nerd so they'd be like we need a space to.

14:16:32 And I'd roll up and be like, yeah, I'll murder you in space. And we're like, oh, we like you second best. You're very good.

14:16:39 I know.

14:16:38 We're going with this person we know and be like, okay, bye. It actually ended up being.

14:16:44 That I got my first really, really big deal job. From talking to people I knew in the New York City video games community.

14:16:54 So like I had slowly started to get some equipment at home. I had got the microphone you're hearing me now on as a gift for my partner.

14:17:03 I started to expand. And upgrade my equipment at home and I'd audition for like narrative podcasts or I was doing something for a while where there'd be voices and they'd move the camera along different comic books.

14:17:20 Huh?

14:17:19 So I would do like little one off characters. Like I was never Spiderman, but I was like the side character's mom asking the kid to come in for dinner for a couple panels.

14:17:29 Huh.

14:17:29 But I had all this experience acting. I went to school for acting. I had all this experience on stage.

14:17:35 So putting myself in someone else's position wasn't new to me and I'm a trained singer so I already have a lot of experience manipulating my voice and trying to get it to do different things.

14:17:43 Right.

14:17:45 But I met a game developer in New York. Who asked me if I was interested in doing voiceover and I was like, oh yeah, absolutely.

14:17:55 I'm trying to. And he was like, Don't go anywhere. I have a game for you in like 4 years and I was like

14:18:09 Okay.

14:18:01 Okay. And then 4 years later, he comes back around and just the writing in the game he had already been working on when he met me in person and heard me talking, some of which was me being silly at karaoke venues.

14:18:20 Hmm.

14:18:17 Resonated with how he had already written this character. Which was just so cool, so to be sure that it was the right fit, he sent me the audition that he would have sent to any one.

14:18:28 And when I recorded it and sent it back, I got some adjustments. Hey, can you do this slide more like this?

14:18:34 Can you do this more like this? Oh no, what if, what if I can't get this thing I've really been hoping to do and looking forward to.

14:18:48 Oh.

14:18:42 So I send it back with the adjustments and he calls me on the phone and his old-time Hollywood was congratulations you're the player character in my newest game Sound like John Mulaney, he didn't sound like John Mellaney.

14:18:53 Yeah.

14:18:54 You know, they prepare the standard rich and famous contract, you're going to be the The player character in Rosewater and I was like, And.

14:18:59 Huh. Oh, Rosewater, that's what I've seen you posting about. Yeah.

14:19:05 Rosewater is a point and click adventure from Grendis Love Games. It's coming out later this year and the rest of the cast is absolutely stacked because it is made under a union contract.

14:19:16 And I can I can talk more about that, but I. I got my first really big thing because I had already been preparing most of my skills and then I was at the right place right time and I met someone looking for me.

14:19:29 Hmm.

14:19:28 Then with that kind of credibility. It's so much easier to book more things because someone else has trusted me.

14:19:36 Not to steer their ship but to like be the face of their game to be the voice of their game.

14:19:39 Yeah.

14:19:49 Yeah.

14:19:42 Being the player character takes way more sessions than being like a goblin who gets killed. And you have to have the Arc of that character makes sense.

14:19:54 And one of the other things that added to why they chose me was they knew I'd played games. I consumed the style of games.

14:20:03 This is, so this is a point and click adventure. So if you go up to a character or an object, it'll give you different options.

14:20:09 You're in a store and you want to be nice to the shopkeeper. You want to be mean to the shopkeeper or you can steal from the shopkeeper.

14:20:16 Understanding that those are going to be the options in the script and you kind of have this. Cascading tree of things that can happen.

14:20:22 Hmm.

14:20:23 If you're explaining that to someone who's never played the game before, it's going to eat into your sessions and take up valuable time.

14:20:39 Hmm.

14:20:30 Rather than I already knew what that would mean and I can go oh yeah the thing that we just said didn't happen it's not like a script in a play it's different and I can just reset and we'll record more.

14:20:42 That was a long-winded answer. I'm sorry. Ha.

14:20:44 No, that's very interesting. Well, that sounds like a Tuesday and adventure. I choose your adventure novel when you're a kid.

14:20:50 Oh, absolutely. I read lots of those.

14:20:51 I just wanna say. Oh, I did too. And, Actually, I worked at a bookstore recently and they're coming, they sell them again, the old ones and they're very popular with the kids.

14:20:58 Really?

14:21:04 Sure.

14:21:00 Yeah, so of course I was trying to upsell, choose your own adventure books. Successful at that but I was also you were you were talking about player characters I know what's I grew up playing video games I don't play them now because I know I'll get too addicted honestly but for listeners at home player characters are the characters that you can manipulate or direct things to do.

14:21:22 And I know what an NPC, a non player character is what Ryan, what's his name?

14:21:29 I wanted to say God's name, but it's his name. I wanted to say God's name, but it's Ryan Reynolds in free guy.

14:21:33 Yeah

14:21:35 He was at NPC. That's why I learned that's where I learned that acronym.

14:21:40 Oh, thanks, Ryan. He's helping.

14:21:39 Thanks to free guy. So. Yeah, thanks, Reynolds. Yeah.

14:21:44 But, so anyway, so for people who are listening, I have no idea what we're talking about.

14:21:47 But.

14:21:47 I did I did book some NPCs before I booked my big player character. And one of them I got from it was an open call in the internet.

14:21:57 Oh yeah.

14:21:57 I met the person having the open call briefly at a games event New York. But I booked my first video game role in Strange Land, which is also point and click, but that one's like psychological horror, you're plumbing the depths of your own mind.

14:22:08 Oh nice. That's my genre. Is it gory?

14:22:12 I mean. I'd say it's more lcky than its gory.

14:22:17 Okay, okay, like blue blood.

14:22:21 Sorry, I got that stuck in my brain trying to think of the grossest things I could remember from looking.

14:22:25 No, it's okay. Like.

14:22:28 But yeah, and I was really proud of, of that because he, he Dave from Wajati Games is so generous with his time and his understanding that he'll go on Twitter and just break down here so many people auditioned.

14:22:41 Here's so many people auditioned for this role. Here's how many people had unusable audio.

14:22:46 Here's how many people missed a direction. It's it's so generous. I love the insight from every time he has a casting call, but also I had submitted an unhinged alternate take.

14:22:58 There was nothing in the Character description, I was just like, what if? What if one of them just had like a 1930 s Brooklyn accent for no reason?

14:23:07 Yeah, right.

14:23:12 And we didn't get to squeeze that accent into the game, but I felt like my unhinged choices were paying off because no one else was going to send an audition that sounded like that.

14:23:21 Only I can bring them that.

14:23:23 You know, so I have a tangent. I want to do that. Go off on tangents.

14:23:26 Oh, absolutely.

14:23:26 But you just said what you just said reminds me really quick of one time I went to go see Diana gobbledon speak about the Outlander series that she writes.

14:23:35 Oh yeah.

14:23:35 This is when this this is in 2014 so this is right when the series was gonna premiere And I don't know if someone asked her or she just decided to tell us how this series came to be.

14:23:52 Sure.

14:23:45 She was an academic writer. Or does academic and she study birds? I think she has a PhD in birds exactly but she wanted to try writing a novel And so since she's a researcher, she, she's, hmm, Scotland, hmm, and she'd seen an episode of Dr.

14:24:04 Who, and there was a scene where there were some guys in kilts because he time travels. This is a very old episode, Dr.

14:24:10 And so she went and that's what that's when she got that idea and then she went and did some research on Scotland and then she just started to write a scene where a woman with a New England accent entered a bar full of men and kilts.

14:24:20 But like an old, but I think she was maybe like from the thirties or forties or something and then She just wrote it and she just didn't know where it was gonna go, but that's how it turned into like this time travel.

14:24:33 Romance, adventure, sci-fi, fair fantasy thing. But yeah, but that's what you were saying.

14:24:38 You start with one idea. I need to start growing it out from there.

14:24:43 What if someone has came in with this voice that you were, that you were just saying, you know, it's Yeah.

14:24:47 Well, I just decided she was gonna walk in and actually there's there's a character in Doctor Who talks like this who inspired me.

14:24:53 Yeah.

14:24:53 It's coming full circle where He time travels to New York in the 30, s and she's Tallola with 2 L's in an H.

14:25:00 And, Yeah, that's absolutely the doctor who, inspiring everyone.

14:25:04 Yeah, I used to watch it when I was little with my dad, the one with the long scarf.

14:25:08 Oh yes! Tom Baker?

14:25:10 That was this. Yeah, but I think I don't remember. Sure. I don't know.

14:25:14 Is that a name? He had the really long scarf. All kinds of fans recreate that scarf now.

14:25:15 She just had the really long scarf. Very rudimentary. But sci-fi effects.

14:25:22 How funny.

14:25:27 Oh, nice. Okay.

14:25:22 I got on board when my college boyfriend bought the DVDs with Christopher Eckleston on them so then I watched Him and tenant and I watched all of Matt Smith and then I Dipped out, I think.

14:25:37 Can only be obsessed with so many things that once. Doctor Who had a long turn.

14:25:38 Yeah. Yeah. So, so you've done video games.

14:25:46 You've done commercials too.

14:25:47 I have. I I've done some commercials actually what I think is very funny is the commercials I book aren't the ones where the voice is talking directly to the viewer.

14:25:58 I book commercials where I'm a character in the commercial. I audition for the other ones, but something about that.

14:26:02 Oh, okay. Okay.

14:26:06 Acting the ones that I'm the best at are the ones where I have an objective in the scene So.

14:26:11 Oh, interesting.

14:26:16 It's okay.

14:26:13 I don't I don't think I can talk about which brands I'm not sure which things are out yet but the, yeah, that's the thing I've noticed.

14:26:23 I, I, when I book commercials, I'm the manager checking in on someone or I'm the employee or something like that.

14:26:32 Oh, interesting. But it's not fun to play, right? Yeah. Yeah.

14:26:33 It's just, oh absolutely and you know it's still a commercial I got no issue with that.

14:26:39 Okay.

14:26:40 I think it's just very funny that nope character work, that's what you do. Okay.

14:26:44 Well, I saw, you know, I looked at your website. I've seen it before, but I looked at it again another day and so you've done I saw that you were on an episode of, it was that show on Peacock.

14:26:55 Howker phase!

14:26:56 What was it? Oh. Pokerface, yes. I haven't watched it yet, but I wanted to see it, but, how did you get that role?

14:27:02 Just old school auditioning or?

14:27:13 Yeah.

14:27:02 Oh, so old school auditioning and please. Like send me a signal if this gets to inside baseball because acting doesn't operate like any other job market.

14:27:17 In order to get auditions for most roles on TV and in movies that you'd see in the cinema, you need representation.

14:27:26 So I have an agent and I have a manager. For my on camera. When it comes to voiceover, I have more agents, but we can talk about that later.

14:27:34 And then they talk to people who are called casting directors. And they can work on one show or multiple shows.

14:27:40 And then there's the like directors and the creators from each TV show. Sometimes TV shows the episode has a or the directors will change episode to episode sometimes So casting directors will say, I need, so in Pokerface, I am the illustrious barber number 3.

14:28:00 Can't trust that third barber. So casting will put out a thing that says, I need.

14:28:07 I need people to fill this barber shop. Here's what I think they look like. Well, look like our like sound like what have you.

14:28:14 And then this, this only goes Not to a secret, but like it's it's not publicly available.

14:28:21 It goes to the representatives that they have contact with and it goes up on kind of like a It's called it's called Breakdown Express.

14:28:30 Don't worry about it. It it goes out to the Act, they're the agents of the managers.

14:28:32 The community. Yeah, okay.

14:28:34 So then the agents and the managers. Go, oh, well I think these people look the most like what you need and their skills show they can do this thing and they have the look that fits in the world.

14:28:44 And then like 3 to 5% of those people. Get the audition.

14:28:49 Hmm.

14:28:51 So we've gone up from the episode has written. We know these characters exist. Casting directors says I need them.

14:28:55 Huh?

14:28:57 Agents and managers send them headshots and resumes, say these ones, then casting rights back and goes 3 to 5% of these ones.

14:29:04 Huh.

14:29:04 Thank you. So I get an audition, it says I'm part of the 3 to 5%.

14:29:08 Nice.

14:29:08 Yeah, it means I have something to do. So I audition. And this one I kind of got in a batch.

14:29:16 I got a few different people who were in the barbershop and they had me read the lines differently.

14:29:20 And you know, if I, I'll look at the amount of the script you get, sometimes it's like a third of a page.

14:29:25 Huh?

14:29:26 And a lot of the time it's a fake name and especially it's the first season of poker face so you can't You can't know what the sense of humor is like.

14:29:35 Like if I told you Oh, I have an audition for 30 Rock next week. I know exactly what that show looks and sounds like, right?

14:29:41 Right, right.

14:29:42 But it's something new, so you try to make your best guess.

14:29:46 So I taped my best guests at few of the people in the barber shop, then that gets sent back.

14:29:51 Then casting goes, hey, we like you, we like you, probably the top 10%. Hold those days, you're not officially booked yet, then you wait and you just chew your fingers off.

14:30:02 No.

14:30:07 Oh

14:30:03 And then my manager calls me back and like, you fucked it, yeah. Yeah, and my episode is directed by Natasha Leon who is the star of the show.

14:30:11 Oh, nice. Okay.

14:30:14 She was amazing. She was making absolutely filthy jokes at 9 in the morning, but she was also doing some very technically impressive things like We were in a barber shop and the camera was moving down the room and focusing on characters in front of and behind the mirror.

14:30:31 Hmm.

14:30:31 Which means you have to move where the camera is focusing repeatedly and when she was doing the rehearsal shot, Natasha Leon was pulling her own focus.

14:30:40 I need you to understand that's like she just held a camera and walked on tiptoe and ballet shoes.

14:30:46 Hmm. Wow.

14:30:46 Down the floor like that is that is Not easy. And obviously she's a very talented actor as well.

14:30:55 But just seeing that I was floored. I had such a great experience on set and, I loved watching the show.

14:31:03 It's It's a really good time.

14:31:05 How long between the time you were cast? Did how long between that and then when you actually filmed?

14:31:13 Okay.

14:31:11 So that one I had a couple weeks in between. But like sometimes TV is next day 2 days or sometimes the entire project gets put on hiatus because Who knows the A-lister attached to the movie has to go shoot something for a perfume in Spain and then they come back it's a lot of hurry up and wait.

14:31:29 Okay.

14:31:32 You just have to be ready. Then you have to tell your your agents and managers. Okay, here's the couple days this year.

14:31:43 Hmm.

14:31:40 I'm not going to be around. I'm going to a wedding or whatever it is. But I've shot auditions from hotel rooms.

14:31:57 Yeah.

14:31:47 I have I have made a blanket for it and recorded voiceover for like a bunch of dinosaurs in my blanket for to audition because you like I'm never a hundred percent on vacation.

14:32:01 Okay. You said you did, you said you did a voice over for what? For dinosaurs?

14:32:09 Oh, okay. Huh.

14:32:07 I did not book the dinosaur job, but I was travelling, I was seeing my family. I I borrowed my sister's microphone that she uses to play D and D, which is like yours, but not as good.

14:32:18 Okay. Well.

14:32:19 So it's the blue snowball. They made a little blanket for it. And I was like, this is how this dinosaur would talk.

14:32:26 Oh my gosh, that's what I thought you said.

14:32:26 This is how this dinosaur would talk. Hi, let me book jobs, please.

14:32:33 Yeah, it's The thing is like if it's

14:32:38 It's hard to gauge sometimes like Oh, I'm on vacation, so if it's a non-union commercial that would only be on Instagram, I'll be on vacation.

14:32:48 I won't audition for that. But like I get an audition for HBO or Looney Tunes or something, right?

14:32:54 Well then I'll tape it in the hotel, that's fine.

14:32:57 Yeah, yeah. So does your do you look for opportunities yourself and as well as your agent or do you just rely on your agent?

14:33:07 Okay.

14:33:05 I do. So that's actually when we were scheduling I told you that My schedule is getting busier because I'm starting to shoot a horror movie.

14:33:14 I found this horror movie by myself. And it was, it's so funny because someone put up a casting call in a Facebook group, I think it was.

14:33:24 Huh?

14:33:24 And it was just very vague like here's the type. And you know, I send off, I have.

14:33:31 Huh. Huh.

14:33:29 I have a Google template for this where it's like, here's all of my materials, here's this link, that thing, that link, here's my headshot and resume.

14:33:37 Just hey, so are you looking for someone who might be me? Here's my stuff. Let me know if it's me.

14:33:44 Peace, Maya. And this time it turns out they were looking for someone like me.

14:33:51 And it's really cool, so I start shooting for my horror feature on Saturday.

14:33:57 Can you see the name? Where is entitled?

14:33:59 The name's in Russian and I'm not good at Russian. It's called Momochka.

14:34:04 Yeah.

14:34:03 Momotica? Hmm. I had a roommate who was, Ukrainian, you taught me, Ukrainian and Russian, which is.

14:34:15 That's what I hear. I couldn't tell you why though, not my strong suit.

14:34:13 Arguably very similar. Uhhuh. Yeah.

14:34:21 But I'm very excited for you and I'm excited to see it when it's done.

14:34:24 Okay, thank you. We

14:34:26 How long will that take to film, do you think?

14:34:28 We're looking at shooting because we're not shooting every day like we would be if we had lots of money.

14:34:34 We have some money. So we're mostly shooting on weekends. So. It'll probably be wrapped around September October.

14:34:47 But again, it's, it's indie, so you never know what's gonna happen.

14:34:44 Okay, okay. And it'll be sold for distribution. Yeah.

14:34:51 But it is very exciting. We have a little bit of a seed investment. We have the EP on board.

14:34:57 The writing is fabulous, my, excuse me, my coat talk. My co-stars are fabulous, so I'm just really excited.

14:35:07 Oh yeah, it was made on next to nothing. Same with, paranormal activity.

14:35:04 Was it the Blair Witch Project in Indy? Project and yes.

14:35:15 Yeah.

14:35:12 I feel like especially in horror. If your, if your storytelling is solid. You can transcend production budget.

14:35:24 Hello, I'm

14:35:18 Yeah. It's like, especially people who love horror, I love more. And, I'm always looking for something on, you know, I have cable, so I'll look for all the war movies just to see if there's something new, even if it's not popular, just because I just love it.

14:35:37 So.

14:35:43 Yeah.

14:35:35 Oh sure, well actually I'm a regular guest on Scream Queens spelled with a Z where horror gets gay and we let's see the episodes I reviewed we watched the shape of water which is more queer than it is horror but there are monsters.

14:35:51 Okay.

14:35:51 There is see we watched one that was about Influencer culture called sissy. It's indie, it's Australian.

14:36:00 Hmm. I'm gonna look for it.

14:36:00 That movie messed me up. I loved it. We watched a musical horror of the little mermaid called the lore and it set in like, 1980, s Eastern European club culture.

14:36:12 Oh my goodness.

14:36:18 Yeah.

14:36:12 It's amazing. Female filmmakers very much staying away from male gaze, but female filmmakers very much staying away from male gaze but like they had grown their parents did run a club so they had this love for that culture.

14:36:24 Hmm.

14:36:25 And it's a rock musical and it's So good. No. I've heard of it.

14:36:35 I haven't watched it.

14:36:39 Sure.

14:36:29 Have you heard of? Have you heard of Kung Fury? Kong. So I was good and I heard today at a beauty school and I don't know how it came up but the guy helping with my hair was telling me all about it.

14:36:45 How great it was and how he dressed he and his girlfriend dressed up as characters for. Halloween and how did we start even start talking about that?

14:36:58 Oh yeah.

14:36:55 I don't even know but it's something you said when you were talking about the 19 eighties and such they said that this Part of this movie is that there are Vikings, they travel to the Viking period where they have laser guns.

14:37:07 Sure. Like you do.

14:37:07 Or something anyway, it just sounded like that through everything in there just like what you described.

14:37:11 Yeah. Oh, that's great.

14:37:20 Oh, okay, sure.

14:37:14 Every decade of eighties or every decade of war represented in one movie it sounded like or sci-fi so But he said it's on YouTube and you can watch the full thing on there.

14:37:24 Delightful! I'll have to go find that.

14:37:24 So I'll just give them a plug, I guess, too. I see. Let's see.

14:37:31 What is, what do you think, what are some of the challenges that you faced doing this position? Doing this business.

14:37:37 Oh sure.

14:37:38 I's not like I'm interviewing you for a job. I didn't mean to say position.

14:37:42 This career. Yeah.

14:37:42 Well, I really think my resume speaks to my ability to do a bunch of different accents, which you totally need on your podcast interviewing real people.

14:37:47 Yes. Yeah.

14:37:51 So when I audition for theater. I'm in the room. Like, a couple weeks ago I was auditioning for a Shakespeare production.

14:38:01 No.

14:38:00 I didn't book it. It's fun. You don't book most things. It's just the way it is.

14:38:04 But you can See the people behind the table. So I'm doing my monologue from the winter's tail.
