Abstracts consist of 75-250 words, while the number of keywords is 3-5 words. The abstract contains at least the title, introduction, objectives, methods, and research results. **(10pt)**

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INTRODUCTION (14pt)

(11pt) The introduction must contain (in order) the general background, the literature review as the basis for the scientific novelty statement of the manuscript, the scientific novelty statement, and the research problem. At the end of the introduction, the purpose of the study of the manuscript must be written. In the format of scientific manuscripts, there is no literature review as in the research report, but it is manifested in the form of a review of previous literature to show the scientific novelty of the manuscript. The entire introductory section is described in an integrated paragraph paragraph, with a length of 15-20% of the total length of the article.

The writing format from the introductory text to the conclusion is Garamond, 11pt, the spacing between lines is 1.15 spaces and in 1 column. For Indonesian manuscripts, examples of writing thesis/thesis citations (Petro-Nustas, Tsangari, Phellas, & Constantinou, 2013), journal article citations (Sutoyo et al., 2016), book citations (Asmoro et al., 2009), and seminar/proceedings

citations (Sutoyo et al., 2015). For English manuscripts, the writing of the word "and" was changed to "and", the word "et al" was changed to "et al".

METHOD (14pt)

The **Methods** section (11pt) should be written in paragraph form and comprise approximately **10–15% of the total manuscript length**. This section **must be organized into clear subsections** to ensure a logical and systematic presentation of the research process. Recommended subsections include, but are not limited to:

- **Research Design**
- **Research Setting and Participants/Population and Sample**
- **Research Instruments**
- **Data Collection Procedures**
- **Data Analysis**
- **Ethical Considerations** (where applicable)

For **original research articles**, the Methods section should provide sufficient detail regarding the research design, study setting, participants or sample and sampling technique, research instruments, data collection procedures, data analysis methods, and ethical approval (including the approval number, where applicable), enabling the study to be replicated.

For **literature review articles**, the Methods section should clearly describe the literature search and selection process, including the databases searched, search strategy, keywords and search strings, inclusion and exclusion criteria, article selection process, quality assessment (if applicable), and data synthesis methods. Authors are encouraged to follow appropriate reporting guidelines, such as **PRISMA**, for systematic reviews. The review question should preferably be formulated using a recognized framework such as **PICO/PICOT/PECOT** (P = Population/Problem, I/E = Intervention/Exposure, C = Comparison/Control, O = Outcome, T = Time), as a well-defined question helps establish the scope of the review and guides the literature search strategy. Keywords should be based on standardized indexing terms (e.g., MeSH or Emtree) and accompanied by the complete search strings used to identify relevant studies.

RESULTS AND DISCUSSION (14pt)

The Results and Discussion section should comprise approximately 40–60% of the total manuscript length and must be divided into two main subsections: (1) Results and (2) Discussion. The subsection headings (Results and Discussion) should be formatted in 12-point font, while the main text should be written in 11-point font. The Results subsection presents the findings of the analysis in relation to the research objectives or questions in a clear and systematic manner and may be supported by tables and figures where appropriate. The Discussion subsection interprets and explains the significance of the findings, and every research finding must be discussed. The discussion should compare the results with relevant theories and/or previous studies, highlight similarities and differences, provide possible explanations, and emphasize the contribution and implications of the study without merely repeating the results.

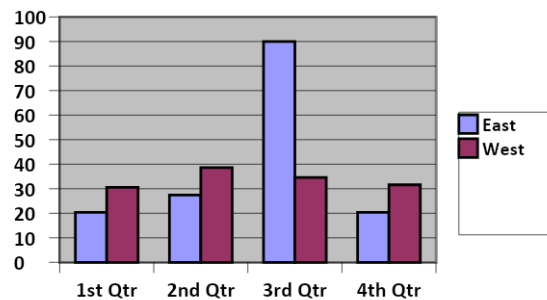


Figure 1. Image title

(11pt) The conclusion section contains research findings in the form of answers to research questions or in the form of the essence of the results of the discussion. The conclusion is presented in the form of paragraphs.

REFERENCES (14Pt)

References (11 pt)

The References section should include only the sources cited in the manuscript, and all in-text citations must appear in the reference list. Manuscripts reporting original research must include a minimum of 15 references, while literature review articles must include at least 30 references. At least 80% of the references should be primary sources, and 80% of all references should have been published within the last 10 years. References must be prepared according to the American Psychological Association (APA) 7th Edition style. Authors are strongly encouraged to use reference management software such as Mendeley, Zotero, or EndNote to ensure consistency and accuracy. For journal articles, authors must include the DOI in the format <https://doi.org/...> whenever available. If a DOI is unavailable, include the URL only for sources retrieved online. Do not include both a DOI and a URL for the same reference. Retrieval dates should not be included unless the content is designed to change over time (e.g., continuously updated webpages or online databases).

The manuscript should be prepared using the official journal template. **Original Research** manuscripts must not exceed **10 pages**, excluding the **References** section. **Literature Reviews**, **Scoping Reviews**, **Systematic Reviews**, and other review-based manuscripts must not exceed **12 pages**, excluding the **References** section.

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
