INTRODUCTION

This template must be used as a guide for the format and layout of writing articles to be published in the IHJ. Authors must follow all the writing rules regarding typeface, size, design, number of words, systematics, and writing references. The author must also ensure that the article uses excellent and correct Indonesian or English. The paper's contents must include abstracts and contacts in the font: Times New Roman, size: 11, and line spacing: Single (1,15). In addition, authors are required to use this template file (NOT create a new file) to avoid mismatches in the layout of the entire page (paper size, margins, etc.).

In the last paragraph, an author must clearly state the work's objectives. The author must provide an adequate background, avoiding a detailed literature survey or a summary of the results (Mayer 1975a, 1975b, 1980). References must be cited in, e.g. (Anderson et al. 1990, Salehizadeh et al. 2004), in which the reference manager is recommended.

METHOD

The methodology may consist of material; research procedures; instruments and data analysis; Modeling. Each part of the methodology can be written in different subsections, using different levels.

The equation may appear in text or as a separate item, in such cases it should be indicated by numbers in parentheses in the margin of the right column. The equation is referred to in the text as the Equation. (1), and so on.

The results and discussion contain the findings of the study and its discussion. All findings must be backed up by adequate data. This section should answer the research hypothesis stated in the Introduction.

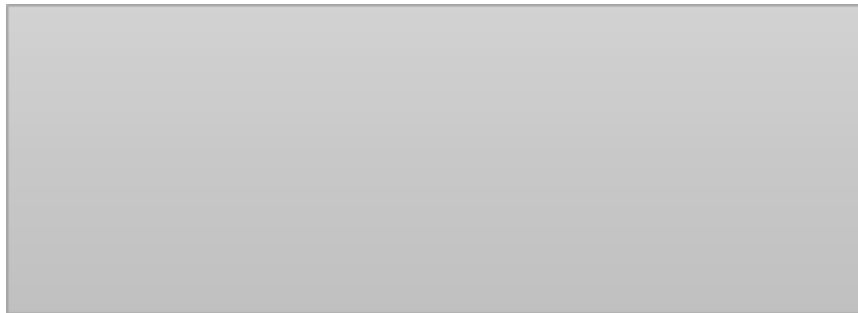


Figure 1. Example for figure
