1. Desire for Community & Connection

- Strong emphasis on building a sense of belonging, camaraderie, and solidarity with like-minded individuals.
- People want to connect, feel inspired, and not feel alone in the fight for democracy.

2. Demand for Direction & Action

- Members want clear direction and concrete ways to take action not just meetings, but meaningful engagement like volunteering, protesting, or contacting officials.
- There's a call for focused, coordinated action against threats to democracy.

3. Access to Information

- Participants seek easy access to updates and upcoming opportunities, especially those with busy schedules or limited availability.
- They value transparency, clarity, and timely communication.

What's Going Well

- **Strong Early Organization & Energy:** Many praised the fast startup, frequent meetings, and momentum ("bi-weekly meetings right away," "love the energy").
- Meeting Structure Improving: Several noted that each meeting is getting more focused, better organized, and more efficient over time.
- **Subgroups and Committee Work:** Appreciation for the creation of working groups and the sense of direction they provide.
- Positive Tone & Community Building: Comments highlighted how the meetings feel unifying and empowering ("SDAI is giving a voice and a means to make positive change").

X Areas Needing Improvement

- **Urgency vs. Planning:** Some feel progress is too slow given the national stakes ("The house is burning down"), urging faster action and less over-planning.
- **Communication & Role Clarity:** Concerns about poor communication from leadership, unclear expectations, and overlapping requests especially for volunteers and committee leads.
- **Action Over Talk:** Desire to move beyond discussion into concrete, strategic community action that reaches beyond the already-engaged base.

Criticism & Constructive Feedback

- **Singing at Meetings:** Widely unpopular described as uncomfortable, "culty," off-putting to younger members, and detracting from the professionalism and purpose of the group.
- **Church Venue Sensitivity:** Some expressed discomfort with meeting in churches, especially with religious symbolism prominently displayed.
- Agenda & Speaker Flow: Suggestions to end on a high note, limit individual performances, and keep chants/songs short and purposeful.

What's Working and Valued

- **Strong desire for continued momentum:** Many appreciate the current direction and organization, and want to keep the energy up between meetings.
- **Guest speakers are impactful:** The presentation by Dr. Arendshorst on nonviolent action was especially appreciated. Respondents want more educational, inspirational speakers.
- **Bi-weekly meeting rhythm is helpful:** There's support for a mix of in-person and Zoom meetings to maintain engagement and build community efficiently.
- **Protest and organizing information is important:** Attendees want more guidance on protest safety, legal rights, and coordination with state/national efforts.

X Suggestions for Improvement

Meeting Structure

- Keep meetings tight, focused, and on time.
- o Reduce committee updates and lengthy prepared remarks.
- Stick to a clear agenda with top-down flow.
- Avoid repetition (e.g., handing out mission/goals instead of repeating them aloud).
- Open time for brief public comments, with limits to avoid off-topic speeches.

Content & Focus

- o Include brief current events/news highlights to keep members informed.
- Offer brief tutorials or demos (e.g., on tools like the 5 Calls app).
- o Provide education on key issues and how to take action effectively.
- Focus more time on outreach strategies to engage people outside the base ("break the silo").

• Engagement & Communication

- o Build community with more frequent, clear communication.
- Provide direction and clarity for volunteers and subgroups.
- Improve reporting back on organizational impact and results.

Youth Inclusion

 Several noted the lack of younger members and encouraged a focus on content, speakers, and tone that could better attract younger generations.

Concerns

 Meetings can feel too ceremonial or long: Criticism of "pomp and circumstance" and a desire for more interactive time.

- Need for action over commiseration: Attendees want less talk about how bad things are and more focus on strategic plans and action.
- Zoom + dual-location meetings can be disjointed: A few noted logistical challenges and want more consistency.

Notable Ideas

- Monthly in-person meetings with bi-weekly Zooms.
- Highlight 3 key news stories per meeting.
- 3-minute protest safety tips from the security team.
- Limit team updates to a single sentence + optional Q&A.
- More bulletin board-style ways for members to share ideas outside mic time.
- Consider a national general strike (one passionate suggestion).

💡 Takeaways

- Friday protests and volunteer meetings are the clear pillars of engagement.
- Post card writing, art parties, and virtual events add variety and attract a mix of participants.
- "Other events not listed" was cited often—suggesting better event tracking or naming could help improve clarity and reporting.
- There's strong involvement across multiple types of engagement, reflecting an active and diverse base.
