Eurytus	King of Oechalia. Taught Hercules archery. Offered daughter Iole as prize, refused her when Hercules won. Later, Eurytus' horses disappear. Son Iphitus goes to Hercules to demand horses, is killed. Hercules must serve Omphale.
Eurytus and Cteatus	The Moliones; Conjoined twins of Molione and Actor/Poseidon. W/ Hercules fought uncle Augeas, later fought Hercules and were killed.
Gorgophone, Idas	Daughter of Perseus and Andromeda. Married Perieres of Messenia, had Tyndareus, Aphareus, Leucippus, Icarius; Perieres died, she married Oebalus of Laconia and had Arene. Aphareus and Leucippus inherited Messenia, but former got more. Aphareus founded Arene, named after wife. Castor and Pollux abducted and married Leucippus' daughters Phoebe and Hilaera, so Leucippus' nephew and rival suitors Idas and Lynceus killed Castor. Idas also sought Marpessa with Apollo, and she chose Idas. Idas and Lynceus died fighting Dioscuri, so Nestor obtained land.
Galanthis	Nurse of Alcmene. Eileithyia/Lucina crossed her arms/limbs in order for Hercules not to be born as Hera ordered; Galanthis said "it's a boy", shocking Eileithyia so she uncrossed; Hercules was born, Galanthis was turned into a weasel
Glaucus	Deified by eating a magic sea herb.
Halirrhothius Hippolytus	Poseidon's son. Raped Ares' daughter Alcippe; Ares killed him. Ares tried (innocent) on the Hill of Ares, Aeropagus. Father Theseus' wife Phaedra advanced upon him. He rejected, she told Theseus he raped her, Theseus cursed him with 1 of 3 curses from Poseidon. Fell out of chariot because of sea monster from Poseidon
Hyas, Hyades	Hyas killed by wild boar, sisters Hyades died of grief, Zeus turned them into Hyades
Hyrieus	Son of Alcyone and Poseidon. Hired Trophonius and Agamedes to build a treasure chamber for him. They built a secret entrance in it and used that to steal. Hyrieus laid a snare; Agamedes was caught in it, Trophonius cut of Agamedes' head to disguise his identity and escaped. Hyreius may be the father of Orion: Zeus and Hermes visited, gave him a wish. He wished for children: Zeus and Hermes filled a sacrificial bull's hide with their urine/sperm, told him to bury it. 9 months later, Hyrieus found Orion inside.
Hypsipyle	Leader of Lemnian women. Neglected Aphrodite's shrines. She made them stink. Husbands left for Thracian women, so Lemnians killed all men except Hypsipyle's father Thoas. Stink went away. Argonauts came and they married them. She wed Jason
Iolaus	Nephew of Hercules, son of Iphicles and Automedusa. Helped Hercules with Hydra and crab named Karkinos. Task didn't count
Ixion	Killed wife Dia's father Deioneus because he stole Ixion's horses when he didn't pay bride price. Zeus brought him to Olympus. Ixion lusted for Hera. Zeus created a fake Hera, Nephele, out of clouds. Ixion and Nephele's son Centauros mated with Magnesian mares on Mt. Pelion, creating centaurs. Ixion was thunderbolted, tied to spinning fiery wheel.
Laelaps, Teumessian	Laelaps was dog who always caught her prey. Given from Zeus to Europa, passed down to Minos and Cephalus. Creon sent Amphitryon to hunt Teumessiam fox, giant fox that could not be caught that preyed on children of Thebes. Amphitryon set Laelaps on fox; paradox, so Zeus turned them to stone. Laelaps became Canis Major, Fox became Canis Minor
Fox Leuccippus	She was the daughter of Pandion and Galatea. Similar story to Iphis, changed into a man by Leto.
Leuce	Hades brought nymph to underworld and changed her into a poplar after death.
Leucothea and Palaemon	Originally named Ino and Mericertes. Hera turned husband Cadmus insane because Ino cared for Dionysus. Ino jumped into sea w/son Melicertes and deified.
Marpessa	Sought after by Apollo and mortal Idas, chose Idas out of fear that Apollo would abandon her in old age
Minthe	Nymph of Underworld. Hades loved her, brought her to upper world. Bragged, killed by Persephone
Neleus	Wouldn't purify Hercules, so he killed him and 11/12 sons, e.g. shape-shifter Periclymenus. Son Nestor became king
Nemesis and Zeus	Zeus as a swan chased Nemesis as a goose. Nemesis lays the egg that produced Helen, Clytemnestra, Pollux, and Castor.
Nerites	Only son of Nereus and Doris. Aphrodite loved him beforeshe became an Olympian. Nerites wanted to stay with his family in the sea, even though Aphrodite offered a pair of wings. Aphrodite turned him into a shellfish and gave the wings to Eros. The Nereid Nerea got Poseidon to change him back. In other accounts Nerites was Poseidon's charioteer, Helios turned him into a shellfish
Nyctimene	Daughter of Epopeus king of Lesbos. Raped by her father, fled to woods, refused to show her face. Minerva turned her into an owl
Ophion and Eurynome	Ruled Olympus; Cronus wrestled him, Rhea wrestled her, they were cast into the Ocean. Eurynome was an Oceanid
Orestes	Returned to Argos, met with Electra at Agamemnon's grave, disguises as a stranger accompanied by Pylades and killed Clytemnestra and Aegisthus as ordered by Apollo, pursued by furies. Menelaus doesn't protect Orestes so they plan to kill Helen and Hermione. Apollo settles situation and orders Orestes and Hermione to marry and Pylades and Electra to marry. Hermes protects him to Athens, tried by Athena. Jury of 12 is tied, changes names of furies to Eumenides "Kindly ones" and rules that all trials must be settled in court. Euripides continues off Aeschylus that Apollo ordered him to go to Tauris and retrieve statue of Artemis and bring to Athens. Fated to be gone a long time if he fought. Competes with Great Ajax for Achilles' armor, wins. Counselor, thought up Trojan horse. Helped retrieve Palladium, Neoptolemus, Rhesus' horses, Hercules' arrows from Philoctetes, all needed to win (Horses couldn't drink from Scamander river).
Nestor	Son of Neleus. King of Pylos. Argonaut, fought centaurs, Calydonian boar hunt. Old wise, advice-giving.
Diomedes	Son of Tydeus. Athena gave him superhuman strength, ability to discern gods on the battlefield. Warned not to challenge any but Aphrodite. Attacked Aeneas, then Aphrodite helping him, then Apollo. Apollo rebukes him. Athena later withdraws her former ban on attacking gods, Diomedes wounds Ares. Traded armor with Glaucus because Tydeus hosted him.
Idomeneus	Crete. Posiedon imbued him with raging power.
Patroclus	Achilles's friend. Took Achilles armor, fought as him, killed by Hector. Achilles angered, rejoins battle, kills Hector. Funeral Games: Diomedes wins chariot, dispute over Antilochus winning second (he fouled Menelaus). Epeus beats Eurylaus in boxing. Great Ajax and Odysseus tie in wrestling. Odysseus wins race by praying to Athena, Diomedes and Great Ajax draw for combat. Polypoetes wins pig iron shot put. Meriones beats Teucer in Archery because only Meriones prays to Apollo. Agamemnon receives spear throwing prize without doing anything, gives prize to herald.
Great Ajax	Son of Telamon. Fought single combat w/ Hector. Loses Achilles' armor, driven mad by Athena, kills cattle, then self.
Little Ajax	Son of Oileus. Raped Cassandra in Temple of Athena. Greek seer Calchas revealed that Athena would destroy the ships. She did, he clung to a rock helped by Poseidon, then boasted that he would escape in defiance of the gods. Poseidon struck the rock with his trident, Ajax died.
Teucer	Greek Archer.
Phoenix	Old Myrmidon leader under Achilles. Embassy with Odysseus, Great Ajax, to ask Achilles to rejoin.
Helen	"Face that launched a thousand ships." Won by Paris.
Hector	Oldest son of Priam and Hecuba. Trojan leader. Wife Andromache, son Astyanax. Killed by Achilles, body dragged around, Apollo protects corpse. Priam ransoms.
Paris/ Alexander	Priam and Hecuba. Fated to cause Troy's destruction, left on Mt. Ida, raised by shepherds. Wife nymph Oenone. Returned to Troy, judged apple dispute. Won Helen. Challenged single combat, lost heart when Menelaus came. During duel, whisked away by Aphrodite. Fatally wounded by Philoctetes, only Oenone could save him, too late.
Priam	Father Laomedon offered daughter Hesione to Hercules. Didn't get her, Hercules killed Laomedon and all sons but Podarces aka Priam. Podarces sold as slave, bought by Hesione, changed to Priam. Married Arisbe, then Hecuba, concubines. Troy's king. Neoptolemus, Achilles and Deidamia's son, killed Priam's son Polites and then Priam.
Aeneas	Son of Anchises and Aphrodite.
Pandarus	Trojan Archer. Convinced by Athena after Paris and Menelaus' duel to fire at Menelaus, Athena only wounds him.

Calypso	Nymph of Ogygia, refused to let Odysseus go. Forced to do so by Hermes

Eumaeus	Loyal cowherd. Son of a king, kidnapped by pirates helped by a maid, Laertes bought him in Ithaca. Welcomes Odysseus disguised as traveler.
Philoetius	Loyal herdsmen
Medon	Herald. Tells Penelope of suitors' plans to kill Telemachus
Mentes	Odysseus' old friend. Athena takes his form to advise Telemachus to banish suitors and journey to Pylos and Sparta
Mentor	Odysseus' old friend. Athena takes his form to join Telemachus on his journey to Nestor.
Pisistratus	Son of Nestor, joins Telemachus from Pylos to Sparta.
Antinous	Bad suitor. Hits beggar Odysseus w/ stool. Dies first. Father Eupithes encourages parents to attack Odysseus, only he is killed by Laertes.
